Halifax, Nova Scotia 1 2 --- Upon commencing on Monday, March 28, 2022 at 9:32 a.m. **REGISTRAR DARLENE SUTHERLAND:** Good morning. The 3 proceedings of the Mass Casualty Commission are now in session, with Chief 4 Commissioner Michael MacDonald, Commissioner Leanne Fitch and Commissioner 5 Kim Stanton presiding. 6 7 **COMMISSIONER MacDONALD:** Hello, and welcome. Bonjour et 8 bienvenue, and welcome to the Participants who are here in the room with us today 9 and, of course, Participant Counsel and members of the public. We join you from Mi'gma'gi, the ancestral and unceded territory of 10 the Mi'kmaq. 11 As always, we begin by remembering those whose lives were taken 12 or were harmed, their families and all those affected by the April 2020 mass casualty in 13 Nova Scotia. As public health restrictions have lifted in Nova Scotia, today we welcome 14 members of the public joining us in the room for proceedings. A reminder to members 15 16 of the public, if you're watching online, you can register on our website to attend in person if you are interested. 17 So today and over the coming weeks, we will hear from several 18 witnesses. As we do, it would be helpful to remember why this is important and how it 19 20 can contribute to our approach and our work. The Commission is hear to answer important questions about the 21 mass casualty, including what happened, why and how it happened and what findings 22 23 and recommendations can we share to help make communities safer in the future. Our 24 approach includes using Foundational Documents to deliver our mandate in a timely and effective way. The Foundational Documents organize the amount of detailed 25 information gathered by the Commission, so far including interviews of over 150 26 27 witnesses. This means public proceedings creating a factual foundation can be 28

more efficient and more time can be spent focused on exploring why and how the mass
casualty occurred. As you can see on the screen, Phase 1 Foundational Documents
are progressively building up the big picture of what happened.

We still have, as you can see, many more of these documents to share with you during public proceedings in the weeks ahead. The Commission will hear from witnesses to help fill gaps or provide more clarity about the events and information covered in these Foundational Documents.

As you will recall from proceedings earlier in the month, the Participants have had an important role to play in helping us identify material gaps and issues that require witnesses and the witnesses that we should hear from, so witnesses will appear at different times and in different ways. The Foundational Documents are interlinked and witnesses, therefore, can be helpful at different points.

Over the past two weeks, Commission and Participant Counsel have continued to be in regular contact in preparation for hearing witnesses. This approach seeks to create conditions in which it is more likely for individuals who are experiencing or who have experienced trauma to clearly share what they know, resulting in the best and the most reliable information.

Today, the Commission will hear from a witness panel of the first three RCMP officers who arrived on the scene in Portapique on the night of April 18th, 2020. Constables Adam Merchant, Aaron Patton and Stuart Beselt will be questioned by Commission Counsel about their individual and shared experiences on the night of April 18th in Portapique.

Commission Counsel will not be asking questions as if nothing is known about the witnesses' involvement in the events of the mass casualty. To do so would ignore the evidence already in the record, including statements these witnesses provided both to the RCMP and to the Commission, and they have been included in the three Foundational Documents about Portapique.

These statements, as a reminder, are available on our website as

source materials to the Portapique April 18th and 19th Foundational Documents. 1 2 As Commission Counsel has asked their questions, they will -- after Commission Counsel has asked their questions, they will then have a caucus. That 3 simply means a meeting, a meeting with Participant Counsel to discuss what, if any, 4 questions remain to be asked, who counsel proposes will ask those questions and in 5 what order they will be asked. So this is simply to avoid multiple counsel asking the 6 7 same questions of the witnesses and retreading material that is already covered. 8 And we thank Participant Counsel for continuing to work with the 9 Commission on this approach that ensures the Commission is focused on filling any gaps and correcting inaccuracies in the factual record within the mandate of this inquiry. 10 To be clear, remaining questions relevant to the mandate will be asked. 11 As we move forward in these proceedings, the nature of witness 12 questioning will result in changes in the proceedings, changes in our schedule. That is 13 inevitable. The schedule will continue to be flexible and adapt to the needs of 14 15 witnesses. 16 Participants and their counsel, while we try to be as efficient as possible with the use of our time and resources, we will try to ensure that we create the 17 space to hear from witnesses and ensuring flexibility so if there are more questions, 18 evidence, experiences to be shared, we can adjust accordingly. 19 20 As witnesses are added to the schedule, we will hear from them about the relevant material as presented in the proceeding. 21 In the coming weeks, we will also be changing venues for the 22 23 various public proceedings, and that's simply due to the limited availability of venues. 24 And in all matters, in any event, we will update the schedule on our website accordingly to reflect these necessary changes. 25 So with those introductory remarks, we will now call on Commission 26 27 Counsel to begin with today's witness panel. Thank you so much. 28

MR. ROGER BURRILL: Thank you, Chief Commissioner. I'm 1 2 Roger Burrill. I'm with the Mass Casualty Commission, presenting counsel here today. 3 The plan, Commissioners, today, is I propose to call three witnesses, propose to call three witnesses in a panel format. The idea is to speak to the 4 context and the gaps that perhaps have arisen in the Foundational Documents. The 5 Foundational Document we'll be focussing on is the first responders' actions in 6 7 Portapique that was filed as Exhibit 5 in these proceedings. 8 My proposal would be to call the three members of the RCMP to 9 the stage. I then will have them identified, then I'm going to request to the --Madam Registrar to swear them. All of the witnesses has indicated that they are 10 prepared to be sworn in this context. And then I'm going to proceed to question those 11 witnesses, with again, the focus on the Foundational Document. 12 If this is an acceptable procedure to the Commissioners, then I will 13 at this stage request that the three witnesses be called to the stand, Constable Stuart 14 15 Beselt, Constable Adam Merchant, and Constable Aaron Patton. COMMISSIONER MacDONALD: Thanks so much, Mr. Burrill. 16 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** Thank you. Witnesses, please. 17 Gentlemen, I'm going to ask that you identify yourself. Firstly, 18 Constable Stuart Beselt. Could you spell your last name for the record, please, 19 Constable Beselt? 20 CST STUART BESELT: B-E-S-E-L-T. 21 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** And do us the favour, please, of how it's 22 23 properly pronounced. 24 CST STUART BESELT: Beselt. **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** Beselt. I got it right; thank you. 25 Constable Adam Merchant. 26 CST ADAM MERCHANT: Yeah. 27 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** And spell your last name, please. 28

2	<b>MR. ROGER BURRILL:</b> And how do we pronounce that properly?
3	CST ADAM MERCHANT: Merchant.
4	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Thank you.
5	Constable Aaron Patton. Spell your last name, please.
6	CST AARON PATTON: P-A-T-T-O-N.
7	MR. ROGER BURRILL: And how do we pronounce that?
8	CST AARON PATTON: Patton.
9	MR. ROGER BURRILL: That's easiest of the bunch.
10	CST AARON PATTON: Yeah.
11	MR. ROGER BURRILL: All right.
12	I'm going to ask at this stage, then, for the Madam Registrar, if
13	she would swear the witnesses at this point.
14	CST STUART BESELT, Sworn:
15	CST ADAM MERCHANT, Sworn:
16	CST AARON PATTON, Sworn:
17	EXAMINATION IN-CHIEF BY MR. ROGER BURRILL:
18	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Thank you, gentlemen. The whole idea
19	here this morning, perhaps this afternoon, is for you to be as comfortable as possible so
20	that we can have as much information as possible with respect to some of the issues
21	that have been raised in the First Responders and Portapique document, and have
22	been raised, particularly, by some of the Participants with respect to information that
23	you may have.
24	So in an effort to do that, I am going to just sort of ask some
25	individual questions of you so that the Participants and the public will get a sense of
26	who you are, and then we'll move on to discuss the Foundational Document a little bit
27	and some points in it. Is that acceptable to you guys?
28	CST ADAM MERCHANT: Yeah.

1	CST AARON PATTON: Yeah.
2	CST STUART BESELT: Yeah.
3	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay, very good. Let's start, then, with
4	Constable Stuart Beselt. Can you tell us your current position, please, where you're
5	located and what your responsibilities are?
6	CST STUART BESELT: I'm still in Bible Hill. I'm the shift
7	supervisor, and or one of the shift supervisors, and I've been doing that I've been in
8	Bible Hill for in my eight year now.
9	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Your eighth year?
10	CST STUART BESELT: Eighth year, yeah.
11	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. Can you give us a sense, then, of
12	your policing experience, just your background generally, Constable Beselt?
13	CST STUART BESELT: Sure. I started policing in 1998 with the
14	Moosejaw City Police, and I policed with them for 11 years, and switched over to the
15	RCMP in 2009.
16	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. In 2009, were you situated in Bible
17	Hill?
18	CST STUART BESELT: No, Port Hawkesbury.
19	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. And when again did you go to
20	Bible Hill?
21	CST STUART BESELT: In 2014.
22	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. You had indicated a shift
23	supervisor?
24	CST STUART BESELT: Yeah, I've been a shift supervisor since
25	August 2017.
26	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. What's that, please,
27	Constable Beselt?
28	CST STUART BESELT: Team leader, shift supervisor, I'm in

charge of the guys when they're on duty. 1 2 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** Okay. And the guys on duty, would that be known as a "shift"? 3 CST STUART BESELT: Yes. 4 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** All right. Tell me, do you have any 5 special training for that? 6 7 **CST STUART BESELT:** I've had numerous courses over the 8 course of my career for ----9 MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. **CST STUART BESELT:** --- supervision and that sort of thing. 10 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** Okay; all right. And on April 18th, 2020, 11 was that also your position? 12 CST STUART BESELT: Yes. 13 MR. ROGER BURRILL: And when you were involved in this 14 matter in Portapique, you were the shift supervisor? 15 CST STUART BESELT: | was. Yes, | was. 16 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** And on your shift, then, can you just for 17 purposes of giving us a sense, who was your on shift at that time? 18 CST STUART BESELT: Adam, Aaron, and Vicki Colford was the 19 fourth. 20 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** Right. So these two gentlemen you know 21 from your shift? 22 23 CST STUART BESELT: Yes. 24 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** Okay. How long have you worked with these two gentlemen? 25 **CST STUART BESELT:** Well, we worked together for, what, two, 26 three years? 27 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** Okay, two or three years at the time of 28

1 April of 2020, or thereafter?

2	CST STUART BESELT: No, they've since transferred on, but over
3	the course of the time. At that time, Aaron had been there about two years?
4	CST AARON PATTON: Yeah.
5	CST STUART BESELT: Two years. And Adam was about
6	CST ADAM MERCHANT: A year or so.
7	CST STUART BESELT: a year or so with on our team. He
8	was on a different team before.
9	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay, very good.
10	All right, let me just ask Constable Merchant some questions with
11	respect to his background. Where are you currently located, Constable Merchant?
12	CST ADAM MERCHANT: I worked in a plains clothes unit out at
13	Truro right now. Been there for about seven months.
14	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay.
15	CST ADAM MERCHANT: I think.
16	MR. ROGER BURRILL: And your rank, please?
17	CST ADAM MERCHANT: Constable.
18	MR. ROGER BURRILL: All right. And on April the 18th of 2020,
19	your rank and your situation was?
20	CST ADAM MERCHANT: Constable. I was general duty with
21	Bible Hill. Been there since 2016.
22	<b>MR. ROGER BURRILL:</b> In Bible Hill. Before that, you were?
23	CST ADAM MERCHANT: In Antigonish for nine years and some
24	change.
25	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay.
26	CST ADAM MERCHANT: All general duty.
27	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Right on. And tell me, then, your total
28	years of police experiencing?

1	CST ADAM MERCHANT: Right now, it's coming up on 15. At the
2	time, it was around 13.
3	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. And can you mentioned the
4	word "general duty". This is something that's come up in the materials. What is general
5	duty?
6	CST ADAM MERCHANT: Uniform policing where you're taking
7	dealing with all the various calls that come up.
8	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. Is that different from what you're
9	doing now?
10	CST ADAM MERCHANT: Yeah. Now, I'm in an intelligence unit.
11	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. So that's a different
12	CST ADAM MERCHANT: Different.
13	MR. ROGER BURRILL: type of
14	CST ADAM MERCHANT: Yeah.
15	<b>MR. ROGER BURRILL:</b> skill and/or vocation?
16	CST ADAM MERCHANT: Yeah.
17	MR. ROGER BURRILL: All right, very good. On April 18th, 2020,
18	you were a constable at that time
19	CST ADAM MERCHANT: Yes, I was.
20	MR. ROGER BURRILL: engaged in the shift with these
21	gentlemen beside you?
22	CST ADAM MERCHANT: Yes, I was.
23	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. And I asked Constable Beselt how
24	long that had been going on. How long were you involved with the shift with these
25	gentlemen
26	CST ADAM MERCHANT: I think I was on their team for a little
27	over a year, probably, but
28	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay.

10 CST S. BESELT, CST A. MERCHANT, CST A. PATTON In-Chief by Mr. Roger Burrill

1	CST ADAM MERCHANT: I would have worked with them out of
2	the same detachment before that when I was on another team.
3	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay, we'll get to that in a minute.
4	If I can, now, I'll just ask Constable Patton very similar type of
5	questions. I think you were the junior member of the shift, were you?
6	CST AARON PATTON: That's right.
7	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. You're currently located where,
8	please, and what's your rank?
9	CST AARON PATTON: My rank is constable, and I'm located in
10	Igloolik, Nunavut.
11	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. Where's that?
12	CST AARON PATTON: That's very far north, in northern Nunavut.
13	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. How long have you been there,
14	Constable Patton?
15	<b>CST AARON PATTON:</b> I have been there for about a year now.
16	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. And on April 18th, 2020, you were
17	at the Bible Hill detachment?
18	CST AARON PATTON: That's right, yes.
19	<b>MR. ROGER BURRILL:</b> Okay. Constable at this stage as well?
20	CST AARON PATTON: Yes.
21	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Can you tell us when it was that or
22	sorry, how long, what kind of service have you been with the RCMP? How long have
23	been with the RCMP?
24	CST AARON PATTON: Right now, I have about four-and-a-half
25	years' service.
26	<b>MR. ROGER BURRILL:</b> Okay. So you graduated depo in when?
27	CST AARON PATTON: October 2017.
28	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. And your colleagues have

1	indicated that you worked together for about a year before April of 2020. Does that
2	sound about right to you?
3	CST AARON PATTON: Yeah, I worked on the same team as
4	Beselt for my entire time in Bible Hill, the three, three-and-a-half years, and worked for
5	the Adam for about a year
6	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay.
7	CST AARON PATTON: prior to April 18th.
8	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay.
9	I'm going to ask you about the shift scheduling and the shift that
10	you guys were on on April 18th, and in particular, a few questions about Bible Hill
11	detachment.
12	Nightshift was it?
13	CST STUART BESELT: Yes.
14	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. Is that a regular routine for your
15	shift, or is it on and off? Can you
16	CST STUART BESELT: We
17	<b>MR. ROGER BURRILL:</b> describe for us how this works?
18	CST STUART BESELT: We all go days to nights, so we're always
19	doing at least two days, maybe three days, and then three nights.
20	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. And on that shift, I think you
21	described, the three of you and Constable Colford?
22	CST STUART BESELT: Colford, yeah.
23	<b>MR. ROGER BURRILL:</b> Yeah, and that would be four members.
24	Is that the regular complement, or are you able to speak to that for me?
25	CST STUART BESELT: Well, we have teams of six
26	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.
27	<b>CST STUART BESELT:</b> but with transfers, ODS, courses, that -
28	- annual leave, that sort of thing, four is our minimum, six is a full team.

1	MR. ROGER BURRILL: I really enjoy working with the RCMP
2	because they have so many acronyms and initials and so on.
3	CST STUART BESELT: Yeah.
4	MR. ROGER BURRILL: ODS you just mentioned.
5	CST STUART BESELT: Off duty, sick.
6	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Off duty, sick. Okay. Six on a shift and
7	four, I'm just trying to get a sense of what your experience was in Bible Hill. And feel
8	free, all three of you gentlemen, to talk abut that because if it's six and it's four and it's
9	five, just how does that work?
10	CST STUART BESELT: Well, in policing, whether it was the
11	same in Moosejaw. We had teams of eight with minimums of five. You know, like you
12	have so many police officers that you require a minimum for. If you go below that
13	minimum you're looking for overtime,
14	MR. ROGER BURRILL: M'hm.
15	CST STUART BESELT: you know, fill them. But, you know.
16	So basically in Bible Hill, we have a 16 six-member rotation, or
17	six members on the team, and then your minimums are four. So you try never to go
18	below four.
19	<b>MR. ROGER BURRILL:</b> Have you ever gone below four?
20	CST STUART BESELT: Well if you can't find overtime,
21	sometimes.
22	<b>MR. ROGER BURRILL:</b> Okay. Meaning if you can't find overtime?
23	What does that mean?
24	CST STUART BESELT: Well you put out a request for overtime
25	and if you can't find anybody, you run with what you have; right?
26	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. So in the year or so that you were
27	working with these gentlemen prior to April 18 <sup>th</sup> , 2020, how often would you run below
28	the four?

1	CST STUART BESELT: Before that, never. We would always
2	usually find overtime.
3	<b>MR. ROGER BURRILL:</b> Okay. So that wasn't a problem?
4	CST STUART BESELT: No.
5	MR. ROGER BURRILL: I'm going to ask you the opposite
6	question. Do you ever do more than six? Or is that
7	CST STUART BESELT: Yes.
8	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay.
9	<b>CST STUART BESELT:</b> Double shifts, we can have up to 12.
10	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. And would there be any reason or
11	purpose for that?
12	CST STUART BESELT: Wednesdays, Friday nights, we do
13	double shifts. And so it just works the way the schedule works out.
14	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Who is in charge of determining who is on
15	the shift and the compliment on the shift in Bible Hill?
16	CST STUART BESELT: Like, who you know, who puts us on
17	those teams?
18	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.
19	CST STUART BESELT: The staffing.
20	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Sorry?
21	<b>CST STUART BESELT:</b> The staffing in Halifax would assign
22	members and then the District Commander would assign them to a team and
23	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay.
24	<b>CST STUART BESELT:</b> that sort of thing.
25	MR. ROGER BURRILL: If you can, then can you give me a sense
26	of the command chain or whatever in Bible Hill Detachment? How that works? I'm
27	getting the sense that you're a shift of three or four or excuse me, four four to six.
28	But there's other people involved in Bible Hill

CST STUART BESELT: Yeah. 1 2 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** --- policing. Who are they and how does that work? 3 **CST STUART BESELT:** You have your district Commander, which 4 is your staff sergeant. He's in charge of everything. Then you have your Operations 5 NCO, which is your sergeant. He oversees the four teams, general duty teams, and the 6 7 one plainclothes team. So there's five different teams that he's in charge of. MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. So the District Commander that 8 9 you've talked about, would you, as a shift supervisor -- shift member, would you have much contact with him in terms of your daily or nightly work obligations? 10 **CST STUART BESELT:** Well he's in the office Monday to Friday. 11 MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah. 12 **CST STUART BESELT:** So you'd have -- and then if there was 13 something major that was happening, you would touch base with your supervisors. 14 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** Okay. In terms of taking instruction with 15 respect to how you conduct your work load or how you conduct your service delivery, 16 would you have any communication or instruction from that District Commander? 17 **CST STUART BESELT:** Not a lot from the District Commander. 18 Moreso from the Operations NCO. If they -- if it's something major, they might come to 19 20 office or give you direction. **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** How about you, Cst Patton? You have 21 much involvement with the District Commander in Bible Hill when you were there? 22 23 **CST AARON PATTON:** Not really in general operations. 24 MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. **CST AARON PATTON:** Monday to Friday, like Stuart said, he'd be 25 in the office. 26 MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah. 27 **CST AARON PATTON:** So you would see each other quite often, 28

obviously. 1 2 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** All right. Any comment on that, Cst Merchant? 3 **CST ADAM MERCHANT:** No, same. It would be -- you would just 4 talk to him in the office. It usually wasn't operational stuff. 5 MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. 6 7 **CST ADAM MERCHANT:** For that, you'd talk to the sergeant. **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** Thank you then. Tell me then about 8 9 operational stuff, Cst Merchant. Who was it that you would be reporting to or taking instruction from? 10 **CST ADAM MERCHANT:** That would be the -- well, Stu, he was 11 the acting corporal, but then above that, that would have been Andy O'Brien, Sergeant. 12 MR. ROGER BURRILL: Sorry? 13 CST ADAM MERCHANT: Sgt Andy O'Brien ---14 MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. 15 CST ADAM MERCHANT: --- would have been above Stu. 16 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** All right. So is that right, Cst Beselt? Sgt 17 Andy O'Brien would have had ----18 CST STUART BESELT: Yeah. 19 20 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** --- some role in terms of operations at Bible Hill? 21 CST STUART BESELT: Yeah. 22 23 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** And would he have any impact with the 24 shift supervisor, in your case, in terms of engagement? 25 **CST STUART BESELT:** Well it's all chain of command; right? MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah. 26 **CST STUART BESELT:** So they wouldn't have a lot of -- unless 27 there was something major that, you know, Andy in that case, would have identified, he 28

might talk to them directly, but usually he would go through me, and then I would 1 2 address the issue. And then same going up the chain of command. I would talk to 3 Andy and address any issue that I had. 4 MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. We've got the name O'Brien for 5 the NCO. Could you give us the name of the District Commander at that time? 6 7 **CST STUART BESELT:** It was Al Carroll at the time. **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** All right. How many shifts at Bible Hill? 8 9 Do you recall? How many shifts total at Bible Hill Detachment? CST STUART BESELT: Teams or? 10 MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah. Teams. Forgive me. Sorry. 11 **CST STUART BESELT:** Yeah, there's four teams. 12 MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah. 13 **CST STUART BESELT:** And one plainclothes team. 14 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** Gotcha. All right. Tell me about 15 coverage area for the Bible Hill Detachment, geographically. Where ---16 **CST STUART BESELT:** We do everything in Colchester County 17 from Tatamagouche, Five Islands, you know, Shubenacadie east there. The entire 18 county, other than the town of Truro and the reserve in Millbrook. 19 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** Okay. And did that have any impact on 20 service delivery or how that was done? 21 **CST STUART BESELT:** Any impact on service delivery? 22 23 MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah. CST STUART BESELT: Other than just distance, you know, ---24 MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah. 25 **CST STUART BESELT:** Like, it's -- speaking as a former city 26 27 police officer, you know, not everything is five minutes away; right? Like, you ---MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah. 28

1	CST STUART BESELT: You've got to drive.
2	MR. ROGER BURRILL: I think you're the master of the
3	understatement,
4	CST STUART BESELT: Yeah.
5	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Cst Beselt. What not everything is
6	five minutes away. What does that mean?
7	CST STUART BESELT: Well, you know, depending on where you
8	are in the county,
9	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.
10	<b>CST STUART BESELT:</b> and where you have to go in the
11	county, you can upwards of an hour to getting to your call. And depending on what the
12	roads are like, if you know, if you're on the main highways, you can obviously go as
13	fast as possible, but if you get on a secondary road, and some of them you just can't go
14	fast on.
15	<b>MR. ROGER BURRILL:</b> Are you able to give us any commentary,
16	all three of your gentlemen, with respect to whether that caused any pressure in terms
17	of your ability to provide services for Colchester County? The distances that we're
18	talking about here?
19	CST ADAM MERCHANT: I can remember having a call and
20	having to go up to Tatamagouche, lights and sirens, and then dealing with that very
21	quickly. And then another call came in Stewiacke, having to go lights and sirens. I
22	mean, that's
23	CST STUART BESELT: It happens all the time.
24	CST ADAM MERCHANT: close to an hour or whatever
25	CST STUART BESELT: Yeah.
26	<b>CST ADAM MERCHANT:</b> that you'd be going, like, fast paced.
27	So yeah. It would put pressure on you sometimes,
28	MR. ROGER BURRILL: M'hm.

1	<b>CST ADAM MERCHANT:</b> just the distances. But
2	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah. You said it happens all the time.
3	What do you mean by that?
4	CST STUART BESELT: Well that you're running all over the
5	county; right? Like, you're
6	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.
7	CST STUART BESELT: You're just trying to get everywhere.
8	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Are there times you're not running all over
9	the county, Constable?
10	CST STUART BESELT: Oh, sure. You know.
11	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.
12	CST STUART BESELT: But, you know. Like it's it's so much
13	different than city policing because,
14	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.
15	CST STUART BESELT: you know, like a 9-1-1 hang up can be
16	a five-minute call in the city, whereas that could almost take two hours by the time you
17	drive somewhere and drive back; right?
18	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.
19	CST STUART BESELT: So it definitely spreads you out
20	throughout the county; right?
21	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Any comment on that, Cst Patton? Do
22	you
23	CST AARON PATTON: Yeah, it's very accurate what they said.
24	It's not abnormal to or even if there is not a call for service, to proactively be in a
25	different corner of the county
26	MR. ROGER BURRILL: M'hm.
27	CST AARON PATTON: and have the call for service come at
28	the opposite end. And lots of calls. We have to respond to impairs. So you're waiting

for a member to come from any other part of the county as well. It's -- Colchester 1 2 County, I don't know the exact size, but it's a very large county. It's -- yeah. It's ---**MR. ROGER BURRILL:** In your view, all three of your gentlemen, 3 have any impact on response times in any fashion or manner? 4 CST ADAM MERCHANT: Well of course it's going to be a longer 5 response time the further out it is. 6 7 MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah. 8 **CST ADAM MERCHANT:** But, you know. 9 MR. ROGER BURRILL: Have you any comment in terms of whether that had any impact on your ability to deliver services? 10 CST AARON PATTON: Of course. 11 MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah. 12 **CST AARON PATTON:** I guess it totally depends on where the 13 call for service ---14 MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. 15 **CST AARON PATTON:** --- was taking you. 16 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** Gotcha. The inquiry is dealing with 17 issues in the sort of southwestern corner on the Parrsboro shore of Portapique, ---18 CST AARON PATTON: Yeah. 19 MR. ROGER BURRILL: --- I mean that area, ---20 CST AARON PATTON: M'hm. 21 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** --- are you gentlemen able to comment 22 23 with respect to your familiarity with that area geographically, in your experience? How 24 often had you been there? CST STUART BESELT: As the senior guy in Bible Hill, I'd 25 probably been there about five or six times ---26 MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. 27 CST STUART BESELT: --- over the course of my career. But it's 28

not somewhere that we're very often. 1 2 MR. ROGER BURRILL: M'hm. **CST STUART BESELT:** So, like, in six years at that time, it would 3 have been maybe once a year. And -- so you're not there very often. 4 **CST AARON PATTON:** I think you mean Portapique specifically? 5 CST STUART BESELT: Yeah. 6 7 **CST AARON PATTON:** Not that part of ----CST STUART BESELT: Yeah. Portapique specifically. 8 **CST AARON PATTON:** We go to that region quite often. 9 CST STUART BESELT: Yeah. 10 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** Okay. But let's talk about Portapique 11 specifically. 12 **CST STUART BESELT:** Yeah. About six times in six years. 13 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** Would that have been in response to calls 14 15 for service. ---CST STUART BESELT: Yes. 16 MR. ROGER BURRILL: --- Cst Beselt? 17 How about you, Cst Patton? Had you been to the Portapique 18 region? Or that area? 19 CST AARON PATTON: Yes. If it's Portapique specifically, ---20 MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah. 21 **CST AARON PATTON:** --- maybe one or two calls in that specific 22 23 area. **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** Okay. And that two would have been 24 25 calls for service? **CST AARON PATTON:** Yeah. Yeah, but Portapique is on 26 Highway 2, ---27 MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah. 28

1	CST AARON PATTON: and you travel through Portapique to
2	get to any calls, Bass River, Five Islands.
3	MR. ROGER BURRILL: M'hm.
4	CST STUART BESELT: Yeah, I'm referring to the subdivision.
5	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.
6	<b>CST STUART BESELT:</b> Right? Like, that actual subdivision.
7	CST AARON PATTON: Okay. Sorry. Yeah. If it's specifically that
8	subdivision, I had never been there for a call
9	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Oh, really?
10	CST AARON PATTON: ever. Prior to April 18 <sup>th</sup> .
11	MR. ROGER BURRILL: I understand.
12	Okay. How about you, Cst Merchant? What do you say about the
13	Portapique area?
14	CST ADAM MERCHANT: Yeah, I don't recall ever going there for
15	a call. I may have. But I know I've gone there just exploring with my wife and kid. But
16	that's yeah, I don't recall any calls there.
17	MR. ROGER BURRILL: In terms of your work, would there be any
18	occasion or organization to actually go there not for a call? I.e., community
19	engagement? Anything of that nature?
20	CST STUART BESELT: We would like to do more.
21	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah, what's that mean, Cst Beselt?
22	CST STUART BESELT: Well, you know, unfortunately it's like, I
23	think Colchester is the second busiest county outside of HRM.
24	MR. ROGER BURRILL: M'hm.
25	CST STUART BESELT: And, you know, it's you'd like to do
26	more community policing. And it just depends on what you have time for. If you're, you
27	know, quite often call to call, you just don't get the opportunity to go and do those sort of
28	things that you'd liked to do.

1	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. You have some experience
2	comparatively with urban policing
3	CST STUART BESELT: That's right.
4	MR. ROGER BURRILL: and rural policing. Do you have a
5	preference for either, or do you even want to speak to that?
6	CST STUART BESELT: There's pluses and minuses with both,
7	you know.
8	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay.
9	CST STUART BESELT: It basically, police work is the same.
10	It's just, you know, in the country it takes you a lot longer to get there.
11	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. Any other pluses or minuses
12	besides distance?
13	CST STUART BESELT: Yeah, availability of backup, you know.
14	Like, the RCMP is nice in that, you know, in a and especially in a call like this, you
15	saw members coming from other counties as well to assist; right?
16	MR. ROGER BURRILL: M'hm.
17	CST STUART BESELT: In a city police, you don't really like,
18	what you have on shift, you have on shift, and then you can try and call people in, but
19	that doesn't always work, you know, whether or not people come in or not. And so, you
20	know, the ability to have you know, we had the Millbrook people come, we had people
21	from Pictou County, we had people from Cumberland and everywhere come to assist;
22	right? So
23	MR. ROGER BURRILL: M'hm.
24	CST STUART BESELT: you know, if it's major, everybody just
25	floods the area; right?
26	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. What about specialized
27	resources? I'm thinking of things like forensic identification, dog services, emergency
28	response teams, things

1	CST STUART BESELT: Well
2	MR. ROGER BURRILL: of that nature?
3	CST STUART BESELT: Bible Hill is very fortunate. We have
4	those at hand. We have forensic services. We have dogs, major crime, traffic, you
5	know, all those different units right out of Bible Hill.
6	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. Constable Merchant, any comment
7	about the type of policing and the demands for rural policing versus urban policing?
8	CST ADAM MERCHANT: No, I don't have a comparison really so.
9	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay.
10	CST ADAM MERCHANT: All mine was pretty much rural.
11	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. Constable Beselt said there's
12	pluses or minuses. Do you have anything to add in terms of rural policing?
13	CST ADAM MERCHANT: No, it's just a lot of driving typically.
14	And, I mean, when you drive out to the call, then you got to wait for the ambulance to
15	show up from coming from the city or whatever.
16	MR. ROGER BURRILL: You had indicated that you had
17	experience in Antigonish County.
18	CST ADAM MERCHANT: Yeah.
19	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Antigonish County. How long were you
20	there at that
21	CST ADAM MERCHANT: Just over nine years, I think.
22	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. So you've got some experience
23	there. That too a rural policing type of situation?
24	CST ADAM MERCHANT: Well, it's small town policing, but then
25	there's all the rural areas that surround it.
26	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Any differences between Antigonish
27	County and Colchester that are identifiable?
28	CST ADAM MERCHANT: Oh, huge difference just in

1	MR. ROGER BURRILL: How do you mean?
2	<b>CST ADAM MERCHANT:</b> a socioeconomic levels of the people
3	there. I mean, it it's a university town with a hospital compared to Colchester, which,
4	you know what I mean?
5	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Any comments on socioeconomic
6	concerns in Colchester County?
7	CST ADAM MERCHANT: I found when I came to Colchester,
8	you'd get a lot more gun calls, a lot more drugs, things like that.
9	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. Constable Patton, your experience
10	is mostly in Colchester except for up north. Do you have any comments with respect to
11	the experience in Colchester County?
12	CST AARON PATTON: Yeah, I can't really add anything else
13	other than what these two guys have added
14	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay.
15	CST AARON PATTON: already.
16	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Anything to add, Constable Beselt?
17	CST STUART BESELT: Well, just to put it in perspective, I guess,
18	when I was working in Moose Jaw, I would consider if I put a hundred kilometres on my
19	car, I was doing a lot of patrolling that night, and in Colchester, you know, conceivably,
20	you could put up to a thousand kilometres on your car in one shift; right? Just from
21	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Right.
22	CST STUART BESELT: you going non-stop; right? So you're
23	just it's just a lot more time in the car; right?
24	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. Good. I think we've got a sense of
25	the shift situation and the demographics, geography of Colchester County. Anything
26	further you want to say about police resourcing on that in terms of your shift and
27	anything of value for the Commissioners about that situation?
28	CST STUART BESELT: No, not really.

1	MR. ROGER BURRILL: No. Okay. So remind me again, a shift
2	supervisor is the person who makes the decisions with respect to how things go down
3	on a call and then
4	CST STUART BESELT: Yeah, the team leader or shift supervisor,
5	yeah.
6	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. Team leader, shift supervisor. Any
7	special things that you would be responsible for, Constable Beselt, in that role?
8	<b>CST STUART BESELT:</b> So, well, I'm responsible for everything.
9	Like, you know, obviously, member safety, you know, if something isn't being done, it's
10	my job to make sure it gets done. You know, I'm the one that approves their files, puts
11	them forward for court, you know, identifies any investigational deficiencies, and, you
12	know. So some of my work is computer work and some of my work is just having an
13	ear to the radio to see what they're doing and if they need any assistance; right?
14	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. Good. How'd you guys get along
15	on shift?
16	CST STUART BESELT: It's great shift.
17	CST AARON PATTON: Great. Really good.
18	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay.
19	CST AARON PATTON: Great.
20	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay.
21	CST STUART BESELT: Yeah.
22	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Is that ever a problem, interpersonal
23	dynamics, friendships?
24	CST STUART BESELT: Of course.
25	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Sorry?
26	CST STUART BESELT: Certainly, yeah.
27	MR. ROGER BURRILL: You ever had any experiences with that
28	being a difficulty?

1	CST STUART BESELT: I've been very fortunate.
2	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. Constable Patton, you seem to
3	agree that interpersonal connections can be an issue?
4	CST AARON PATTON: Yeah, of course, you see it like,
5	problems arise all the time
6	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.
7	CST AARON PATTON: but I can say the same that I haven't
8	had problems personally with anybody on that shift or any other shift that I've been on
9	since.
10	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Great. Constable Merchant, any
11	CST ADAM MERCHANT: Yeah, same here. I've always had good
12	luck.
13	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah. Okay. Very good. All right. I think
14	that covers generally your circumstances in Colchester and your personal
15	circumstances now. I'm going to move now to ask you more about the Foundational
16	Document and what took place and your experiences on April 18 <sup>th</sup> . I want to ask you
17	though, are you have read and have become familiar with Exhibit 5, the Foundational
18	Document First Responder's Actions in Portapique?
19	CST STUART BESELT: Yes.
20	CST AARON PATTON: Yes.
21	CST STUART BESELT: Yes, I have.
22	<b>MR. ROGER BURRILL:</b> You've had an opportunity to look over
23	that document in terms of what was attended at these proceedings?
24	CST STUART BESELT: Yes.
25	CST AARON PATTON: Yes.
26	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Any comments you want to make with
27	respect to that document? I want to make sure that you have an opportunity to speak to
28	that.

1	CST AARON PATTON: I think it was an accurate representation
2	of our involvement, or my involvement.
3	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. With respect to its content, the
4	description of the events and the factual characterizations within that document, do you
5	agree with what was recorded in that document?
6	CST STUART BESELT: Yeah.
7	CST ADAM MERCHANT: Yes, yeah.
8	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. Constable Merchant?
9	CST ADAM MERCHANT: I mean, there's some stuff that I don't
10	remember happening but
11	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.
12	CST ADAM MERCHANT: yes.
13	MR. ROGER BURRILL: I guess my question for you is there an
14	overt objection to any
15	CST AARON PATTON: Not at all.
16	MR. ROGER BURRILL: of the content in that documents
17	CST AARON PATTON: No, no.
18	MR. ROGER BURRILL: with respect
19	CST AARON PATTON: Certainly not.
20	<b>MR. ROGER BURRILL:</b> this is your chance. If there's
21	something wrong on that, we want to get it right.
22	CST AARON PATTON: Not at all.
23	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. Very good. All right. Then what
24	we're going to do then, Commissioners, is proceed through the Foundational Document
25	for purposes of references to particular areas. I'm going to ask the Registrar to bring up
26	page 36, paragraph 40, so we can speak of this.
27	So, gentlemen, before you, you will see a text of a transcript talking
28	about a 10-04 transmission or a dispatch call from the OCC. And there are some terms

and some information therein that I'm going to ask you to clarify, but I'm also going to 1 2 ask you to comment with respect to your initial response to what you initially were informed by the OCC. So I think I have the ability to play this bit. 3 [AUDIO PLAYBACK] 4 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** Okay, gentlemen, that's paragraph 40, 5 and it's a selected clip from the OCC, and I'm just going to go through a few things here. 6 7 355, can you tell us what 355 is, please? CST STUART BESELT: Dispatch in -- well, at that time, it was in 8 9 Truro. **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** Okay. Yeah, and can you tell us about 10 what the OCC is? 11 **CST STUART BESELT:** It's the Operational Communications 12 Centre. 13 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** Okay. And this would be a location that 14 you've had some familiarity with? 15 **CST STUART BESELT:** That's right. 16 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** All right. Can you give me a sense then 17 of how a dispatch process would work? Say, for instance, you're on the road and you're 18 getting a call. How does that occur in a routine setting? 19 20 **CST STUART BESELT:** Well, the call comes in to the -- they had two sides. The call came into the call takers ---21 MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah. 22 23 **CST STUART BESELT:** --- and the call takers would put it over to 24 the dispatchers, and dispatchers then -- would then dispatch it to the members. **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** Okay. And how is that a person would 25 decide to take the call, acknowledge the call, not acknowledge the call, how does that 26 27 work on a shift? **CST AARON PATTON:** Yeah, it's up to whoever's operationally 28

available. So the call's put out to all members that are on the air, and if you're free, 1 2 you're expected to respond, and advise dispatch that you'd like the file assigned to you. MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah. 3 **CST AARON PATTON:** And then you attend. And then additional 4 officers can also advise that they're available ---5 MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah. 6 7 **CST AARON PATTON:** --- and they'll also be assigned to the file as your backup. 8 9 MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. So in this case, what we heard, I think we've got Beselt acknowledging that this is a call. 10 CST STUART BESELT: Yeah. 11 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** Sound right? That's what you heard? 12 CST STUART BESELT: Yeah. 13 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** Okay. How does this take place, 14 Constable Beselt? Why did you take it, how did you take it? What were your 15 circumstances? 16 CST STUART BESELT: Well, it sounded like a pretty big call ---17 MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah. 18 **CST STUART BESELT:** --- and I, as the shift supervisor, wanted 19 20 to be the first one to respond. **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** Is that part of your responsibility, to be the 21 first one to respond? 22 23 CST STUART BESELT: Yeah, sure. Yeah. **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** Okay. All right. 24 How about you, Constable Merchant, Constable Patton? Do you 25 have a recall of this dispatch? 26 **CST ADAM MERCHANT:** Yeah. I -- yeah. We were at a mental 27 health call at the time, and we were just leaving that and following that person to the 28

hospital -- well, Patton was going to, and then the call came in and took a copy after 1 2 Stu. **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** Okay. What do you mean "took a copy"? 3 **CST ADAM MERCHANT:** Well, it comes down to your computer 4 as a message, so when you say, "I'm going to take a copy", that's when you get 5 attached to the call. 6 7 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** Okay. The computer being sometimes referred to as the MW ---8 9 CST ADAM MERCHANT: MWS. MR. ROGER BURRILL: --- the MWS? 10 CST ADAM MERCHANT: Mobile Work Station. 11 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** And take a copy meaning an actual text of 12 the call? 13 CST ADAM MERCHANT: Yeah. And then you're attached to the 14 call. 15 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** Okay. So the document -- Foundational 16 Document indicates that you and Constable Patton were working in Salmon River at 17 that time and you, Constable Beselt, were in Valley at that point. 18 CST STUART BESELT: Yeah. 19 20 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** When you got the call for Portapique, did you have any idea what it was or where you were going? 21 **CST STUART BESELT:** Well, you know where Portapique is. Like 22 23 we -- like Aaron said, we passed through it all the time, whether or not we were 24 specifically going there very often. But ---MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah. 25 **CST STUART BESELT:** --- you know it's -- you know where 26 27 Portapique is. MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah. 28

1	CST STUART BESELT: And you know, obviously you get that
2	type of call.
3	Now, you know, in 24 years, you I don't think I've ever gotten a
4	call like that before where it sounds like somebody's been shot. So you're you're just
5	trying to, you know, figure out exactly what's going on, right.
6	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.
7	As the shift supervisor, would you have any engagement in terms
8	of organizing or mobilizing resources at this early stage?
9	CST STUART BESELT: Yeah. You know, everybody was pretty
10	much taking a copy of it, though, so I knew all my personnel were going to be en route.
11	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. In terms of reviewing the text, it
12	talks about a husband shot and lying on the deck.
13	Constable Merchant, do you recall that that verbiage being used?
14	CST ADAM MERCHANT: I don't know if I remember that exact,
15	but I remember that someone was shot and yeah.
16	<b>MR. ROGER BURRILL:</b> So what is it that you're thinking when you
17	get that initial call and what's your reaction like?
18	CST ADAM MERCHANT: Well, your adrenaline definitely goes up
19	and then it's just a matter of asking questions to find out more and more about what's
20	actually going on.
21	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. Constable Beselt just said I think
22	he said something to the effect that not experiencing that type of call. Have you any
23	comment in that regard?
24	CST ADAM MERCHANT: Me?
25	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.
26	CST ADAM MERCHANT: I've gone to two murders, but not a
27	shooting, no.
28	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay.

1	CST STUART BESELT: Yeah. We've been I've been to
2	murders, but
3	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.
4	CST STUART BESELT: you know, like when you get
5	somebody who's been shot, like that's that's different, right.
6	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay.
7	CST STUART BESELT: It's not in your typical run of your day,
8	let's say.
9	CST STUART BESELT: Yeah, I understand. Okay.
10	Constable Patton, anything you have to say about your initial
11	reaction to that call?
12	CST AARON PATTON: Yeah, I actually I didn't hear the original
13	call. When we had left the call that myself and Adam were on in Salmon River
14	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.
15	<b>CST AARON PATTON:</b> it's normal to have phone call requests
16	related to other files.
17	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.
18	CST AARON PATTON: People will call will call dispatch and
19	advise that they're looking for an update on the file or it could be anything, so when we
20	left that call, I had a phone call request on my computer, so I'd turned the radio down
21	and was placing a phone call while we were following the the person on the file that
22	we were dealing with
23	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Other case.
24	CST AARON PATTON: Yeah, to the hospital.
25	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.
26	CST AARON PATTON: And I first became aware that something
27	was going on when Adam passed me with lights and sirens on, so obviously I knew
28	something was going on. And even if I don't take the file, I'll still get a copy to my

computer to see the other members that are going to it. 1 2 MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah. **CST AARON PATTON:** So the first that I realized of the file was 3 when I opened my computer up and read the file that they were dispatched to and 4 obviously hung up on the person that I was speaking with and began following 5 Constable Merchant. 6 7 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** Okay. Did any of you gentlemen have a degree or a sense of the severity of the call from the initial call? 8 9 **CST AARON PATTON:** Yeah, absolutely. CST STUART BESELT: Well, not to the grand spectrum of what it 10 became, you know. 11 MR. ROGER BURRILL: Right. 12 **CST STUART BESELT:** Like at that point in time, it was -- you 13 know, it's just called in as a shooting, so ----14 15 MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. CST STUART BESELT: --- you know. 16 MR. ROGER BURRILL: The words "S-O-C Gabriel" were 17 expressed by the dispatcher over the call. Would that have meant anything to you at 18 this early stage in the -- in the call process? 19 **CST AARON PATTON:** S-O-C stands for Subject of Complaint. 20 MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yes. 21 **CST AARON PATTON:** So it was just indicating that the subject of 22 23 complaint was Gabriel, but we weren't provided with the last name at that point. 24 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** Okay. Did that help or assist you in terms of your response to the call, having that information? 25 **CST STUART BESELT:** It really doesn't change anything, right. 26 MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. Tell me about your necessity at 27 the front end for getting information. I'd like to have a sense of what it is that first 28

responders need and how they can be assisted in getting information. 1 2 **CST STUART BESELT:** We want it all. Like we want to know what we're going into, right. 3 MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah. 4 **CST STUART BESELT:** Like especially in a situation like this, 5 you're going into a hot zone and information is invaluable, so the more that you can try 6 7 and figure out what's going on -- and that goes with every call. Like we're always 8 asking if there's any more information or if there's any updates, you know, like whether 9 it be an accident or, you know, somebody's trapped in a vehicle. You want to -- you know, like you want to know are they out yet or, you know, like anything you can -- you 10 11 can gather which helps, you know, how fast you have to try and drive, right. **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** Sure. But how do you get that 12 information, I guess is my question. 13 **CST STUART BESELT:** Well, that's all through the OCC. 14 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** Okay. But is that something that's 15 initiated by the first responders or is that something initiated by the dispatch? 16 CST STUART BESELT: Well, we'll ask clarifying questions and if -17 - if they have, you know -- if they have anything to add. You know, sometimes they're --18 you know, they'll keep the complainant on the phone as long as they can to gather as 19 20 much information and continue asking questions and feed it down to us. In this situation, the line went dead so we didn't have any further 21 information at that point in time. 22 23 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** Okay. Constable Merchant, any 24 comment with respect to information-gathering process at the very front end? **CST ADAM MERCHANT:** No. I mean, some dispatchers are 25 better, too. Like some just flood you with information, like they'll be looking everything 26 up, so yeah. 27 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** Yeah. Is that good or bad? 28

1	CST ADAM MERCHANT: Oh, no, it's good. Yeah, the more you
2	can get, the better.
3	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. Constable Patton, any remarks?
4	CST AARON PATTON: Yeah, the same. Yeah, there's a lot of
5	proactive information provided by dispatch, but anything that we ask for, they're always
6	happy to to seek it out for us.
7	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. In that dispatch, we heard
8	information that the comm said there was an RCMP car in the yard. Are you able to
9	comment at all about that, that particular information, what impact it may have had on
10	you in responding to the call?
11	Anything come to mind, Constable Merchant?
12	CST ADAM MERCHANT: Well, you're just wondering why would
13	there be an RCMP car in the car in the
14	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.
15	CST ADAM MERCHANT: in the yard there. And I Patton
16	called Parrsboro and asked if they had any cars available and, you know, it really
17	makes you wonder, like what what's going on here.
18	<b>MR. ROGER BURRILL:</b> Yeah. But that information of an RCMP
19	car in the yard, would it have any bearing on your response, Constable Beselt?
20	CST STUART BESELT: No, it didn't have any bearing on it
21	because we couldn't place it. We didn't know who it was
22	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay.
23	CST STUART BESELT: right.
24	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Right. The material that has been
25	presented at paragraph 40 highlights a comment by Beselt saying, "Are we able to
26	confirm that somebody is actually shot?" at 10:05:16. That was your voice.
27	CST STUART BESELT: Yeah.
28	MR. ROGER BURRILL: That strikes me as an attempt on your

1	part to determine exactly what was going on again. And I need to have some
2	understanding of why you might ask that question.
3	CST STUART BESELT: It's just a confirmation. Like like I said,
4	you know, we get a variety of calls. A lot of times they're mental health calls, and you
5	know, we get all kinds of calls from mental health people that are suggesting that
6	something's happening and you get there and it's not, right.
7	So you know which would be far more likely than somebody
8	actually shot, right. I probably go to 100 mental health calls where people are alleging
9	something happened rather than the actual thing, right.
10	So you know, like you're trying to get that information and a
11	confirmation of whether or not that's actually occurred, right.
12	<b>MR. ROGER BURRILL:</b> So when you ask that follow-up question,
13	is that for purposes of determining whether it's a potential mental health issue as
14	opposed to a potential legitimate call?
15	CST STUART BESELT: Yeah.
16	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. Constable Merchant, you heard
17	what Constable Beselt said with respect to mental health calls
18	CST ADAM MERCHANT: Yeah.
19	<b>MR. ROGER BURRILL:</b> and the preponderance of them.
20	Do you have any comment with respect to mental health calls in
21	your function as a as a service delivery officer?
22	CST ADAM MERCHANT: No. I mean, later on I ask, you know,
23	the dispatcher I don't know like if it was like confirm if this is mental health or
24	anything like that
25	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.
26	CST ADAM MERCHANT: because same as Stu said, you go to
27	a lot of mental health calls where people might be delusional and they think something's
28	happening, so it's just a we're just trying to confirm what's going on. Like it didn't

didn't change our speed. We're still flying out there. But you're just trying to understand 1 2 what's going on. **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** So am I right to assume, and I want to 3 make sure you correct me ---4 CST ADAM MERCHANT: Yeah. 5 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** --- because assumptions are bad for me, 6 7 but am I right to assume that that issue of it potentially being a mental health call was something on your mind as your responding to Portapique? 8 9 **CST ADAM MERCHANT:** Well, it's such a different call than -- like a bizarre call that we normally wouldn't get. 10 MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah. 11 **CST ADAM MERCHANT:** You start to think, "Well, could this be?", 12 you know what I mean. So just trying to confirm ---13 MR. ROGER BURRILL: Got you. 14 CST ADAM MERCHANT: --- whether or not ---15 **CST STUART BESELT:** You're just keeping all possibilities open, 16 right. 17 MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. 18 **CST STUART BESELT:** Like you don't want to go in just thinking it 19 might be one thing or anything. 20 MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah. 21 **CST STUART BESELT:** Like, so often, you know, whether it's 22 23 mental health or whatever, it's you know, a call. You get something and it sounds like 24 it's going to be something major, and you get to it and it's really relatively nothing. So, you know, not that this didn't sound like it was nothing, but, you 25 know, that was -- all four of us were going, right? So we took it as seriously as we could 26 have, right? Like, we -- you know, other units were questioning whether they wanted --27 like, Millbrook was saying, "You want us to come?" And I was like, "Okay, well, we don't 28

know what we have just yet. So let's figure that out." And a lot of times you don't figure 1 2 those things out until you actually have boots on the ground, right? MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah. This potential for mental health call 3 -- this is an important question -- did it have any impact upon the manner in which you 4 responded? 5 CST STUART BESELT: No. 6 7 CST AARON PATTON: No. **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** Okay. Tell me, then, about the manner in 8 9 which you're responding. **CST STUART BESELT:** I think I said it; I was driving as fast as my 10 vehicle would go. 11 MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. 12 **CST STUART BESELT:** So we took it as seriously as possible. 13 MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. 14 **CST STUART BESELT:** And I don't know if anybody's ever driven 15 from, you know, Bible Hill, Exit 17 to Portapique but I think I did it in, like, 20 minutes, so 16 it's ---17 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** What does that mean, Cst. Beselt? 18 CST STUART BESELT: We were clipping 'er. 19 MR. ROGER BURRILL: You were what? 20 **CST AARON PATTON:** He said, "Clipping 'er," but we were going 21 as fast as the cars would go. I mean, we were on the 104 highway travelling almost 180 22 to 200 kilometres an hour. 23 24 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** Okay. So the possibility of this being a mental health call have any impact on your speed and your service response? 25 **CST STUART BESELT:** Absolutely not. 26 CST AARON PATTON: No. 27 CST ADAM MERCHANT: No. 28

1	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Thank you.
2	You had indicated, Cst. Beselt, that this was an unusual call for
3	you.
4	CST STUART BESELT: For anyone.
5	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. How do you mean, for anyone?
6	CST STUART BESELT: Well, we don't live in a place where we
7	have shootings very often. You know, Colchester's had a lot of drive-by shootings in
8	the last couple of years but not necessarily somebody who's been shot. So, you know,
9	this isn't like a big city in the States where you get lot of shootings, right?
10	CST AARON PATTON: And then lighting the house on fire.
11	CST STUART BESELT: Yeah. It's not something that you like I
12	said, in 24 years, and I've worked in busy spots and it's not something you get relatively
13	often.
14	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. Tell me, then, about as you're
15	responding, going as fast as you can, do you engage the structure of command in any
16	fashion with respect to what it is you're doing, reporting back?
17	CST STUART BESELT: Yeah, 100 percent.
18	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Tell me about that, Cst. Beselt.
19	CST STUART BESELT: Well, I don't know, at some point in time
20	there in the document, you can I just tried to speak to Brian Rehill, who was the Risk
21	Manager at the time.
22	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay.
23	<b>CST STUART BESELT:</b> Brian is invaluable in those situations,
24	and trying to gather as much information, because he's a police officer and he knows
25	what we want to know, you know, on the thing. So I asked Brian to try and figure more
26	things out.
27	As I'm driving out, I'm also you know, some sergeants are
28	different than others, right? Andy happened to be a guy

1	MR. ROGER BURRILL: This is Andy O'Brien.
2	CST STUART BESELT: Andy O'Brien happened to be a guy that
3	liked to know if anything major was coming in. He wanted a heads-up; he wanted a
4	phone call. So as I was driving, I'm calling Andy and saying, you know, "This is what we
5	have," you know, just to keep him apprised, right?
6	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. And that's dealing with the
7	structure of command,
8	CST STUART BESELT: Right.
9	MR. ROGER BURRILL: in terms of your responsibilities as a
10	shift supervisor?
11	CST STUART BESELT: Because, like, we have our job, they have
12	their job.
13	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.
14	CST STUART BESELT: And, you know, so now I'm putting the
15	ball into motion as to, you know, resourcing and all that sort of stuff, if it's needed, right?
16	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.
17	CST STUART BESELT: Like, so they can be apprised of what's
18	going on. They need to know if they need to make additional calls for more resources,
19	right?
20	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay, very good. Tell me; you had
21	mentioned Brian Rehill's name and Risk Manager.
22	CST STUART BESELT: That's right.
23	MR. ROGER BURRILL: All right. Tell me, gentlemen, if you
24	would, please, what your understanding of the role of a Risk Manager is, please.
25	CST STUART BESELT: The Risk Manager's in the OCC. He's
26	monitoring the entire province at the time for major calls. He's also there to provide
27	guidance to you know, there's a lot of detachments that don't like, Bible Hill's big
28	enough that we have, you know, a supervisor working all the time, there's always a

team leader on. But when I worked in Port Hawkesbury, you know, there wasn't always 1 2 a team leader on and you have maybe junior constables, you know, people with Aaron's -- that are working in a county by themselves, and they get a question that they don't 3 know, so they can call the Risk Manager and get some guidance from a superior, right? 4 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** Given the circumstances here, though, 5 Cst. Beselt, with you being the shift supervisor with some considerable experience, ---6 7 CST STUART BESELT: Yeah. MR. ROGER BURRILL: --- why is it that the Risk Manager would 8 9 be engaged in this call? Are you able to comment on that? **CST STUART BESELT:** Well, it's major. It's a major call, right? 10 11 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** Okay. **CST STUART BESELT:** So -- and he has the ability to, you know, 12 be right there, and he's listening to all the information as it comes in and can possibly, 13 you know, filter the important things to you, right? 14 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** Okay. How about Merchant and Patton, 15 16 would you have had any contact with chain of command folks while you're responding to Portapique? 17 **CST AARON PATTON:** No, I didn't, no. 18 CST ADAM MERCHANT: We leave that to ---19 20 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** Okay. Is the idea to leave that to the shift supervisor at that stage? 21 CST AARON PATTON: Like he said, chain of command, so... 22 23 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** Yeah, okay. Tell me, then, about your gear or your material that you have in 24 terms of responding. I understand there's hard body armour and things of that nature; 25 carbines? Did you have those that night? 26 CST STUART BESELT: Yes. 27 CST AARON PATTON: Yes. 28

1	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah. Were they deployed and used, in
2	terms of your response?
3	CST STUART BESELT: Yes.
4	CST AARON PATTON: Yes.
5	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay, why were they deployed and used?
6	CST STUART BESELT: It's a gun call, right?
7	MR. ROGER BURRILL: M'hm?
8	CST STUART BESELT: It's a gun call.
9	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.
10	CST STUART BESELT: So anytime you have a gun call, you
11	know, most officers don't need to be reminded, but of course I'm you know, I'm in
12	charge of their safety so it's usually going to come out of my mouth; "Make sure that you
13	have your hard body armour on," just because, you know that's my job.
14	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.
15	<b>CST STUART BESELT:</b> So in this instance I once again told them,
16	"Make sure you have your hard body armour on for a gun call."
17	MR. ROGER BURRILL: M'hm.
18	CST STUART BESELT: And the ones I don't know any officers
19	that are carbine trained that don't take a carbine with them, right, so
20	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. Did Patton and Merchant, did
21	you need the instruction from your shift supervisor with respect to
22	CST AARON PATTON: Oh no.
23	MR. ROGER BURRILL: this matériel?
24	CST ADAM MERCHANT: No.
25	<b>CST AARON PATTON:</b> Firearms call, you put it on for sure.
26	<b>MR. ROGER BURRILL:</b> Okay. Is that a routine for you?
27	CST AARON PATTON: Oh yeah.
28	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay, good.

1	CST AARON PATTON: Typically you stop beforehand so you're
2	not in the mix, throw it on, and then go. We have soft body armour on all the time
3	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.
4	CST AARON PATTON: but any higher calibre rifle or any
5	higher calibre round is going to puncture our soft body armour, so anything with a gun,
6	really, is hard body
7	CST STUART BESELT: Yeah, the hard body armour it's metal
8	plates, so and they're about that thick. It adds about, what, 20, 30 pounds?
9	CST AARON PATTON: Twenty (20), 30 pounds.
10	CST STUART BESELT: Twenty (20), 30 pounds to your body
11	weight, just lugging.
12	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Oh.
13	<b>CST STUART BESELT:</b> Because there's plates in the front and
14	the back for all your vital organs, right?
15	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah, okay. All right. And the hard body
16	armour is something that's regularly and easily available to responding members?
17	<b>CST STUART BESELT:</b> Every member assigned when they
18	come to Colchester is assigned their own hard body armour.
19	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay.
20	<b>CST STUART BESELT:</b> So at the beginning of your shift, you're
21	carrying out your duty bag, your carbine, your hard body armour, and any other
22	equipment that you're specifically trained for.
23	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. That's what I was going to ask you
24	about. The beginning of your shift, do you take the hard body armour with you
25	routinely?
26	CST STUART BESELT: Every day.
27	CST AARON PATTON: Every shift.
28	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Really?

1	CST STUART BESELT: Yeah.
2	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay.
3	MR. ROGER BURRILL: How about this carbine, do you take that
4	with you routinely?
5	CST STUART BESELT: Every day.
6	CST AARON PATTON: Oh yeah, every shift
7	CST STUART BESELT: Yeah.
8	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Really? Any exceptions to that?
9	CST STUART BESELT: No.
10	CST AARON PATTON: No.
11	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. Anything else you take with you
12	routinely on your shift?
13	CST AARON PATTON: Yeah.
14	<b>CST STUART BESELT:</b> I'm a 40-cal operator so I take that. It's a
15	non-lethal 40-cal round,
16	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Right.
17	<b>CST STUART BESELT:</b> which is a soft round.
18	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. In terms of preparedness, then,
19	from a physical gear point of view, if I can use that expression, how did you feel as you
20	were going to Portapique knowing you were going to a relatively serious call? Did you
21	have the right gear?
22	CST STUART BESELT: We had all the gear that we had available
23	to us.
24	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.
25	CST STUART BESELT: You know.
26	MR. ROGER BURRILL: That's an interesting answer to the
27	question, "Did you have the right gear?"
28	CST STUART BESELT: You know, like, it's a cost involvement

that, you know, you're going into a dark, and it would be nice to have, you know, night 1 2 vision but I think right now we have one in the detachment since this. But that wasn't 3 something typical for police detachments to have. **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** Okay. So we've got hard body armour, 4 carbines, but no night vision as you ---5 **CST STUART BESELT:** No night vision. 6 7 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** --- responded to Portapique. Would you have required special training with respect to carbines? 8 9 CST STUART BESELT: Yes. CST AARON PATTON: Yes. 10 CST ADAM MERCHANT: Yeah. 11 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** Okay. And all three of you had that, I 12 presume? 13 CST AARON PATTON: Yes. 14 CST ADAM MERCHANT: Yes. 15 **CST STUART BESELT:** We wouldn't carry it otherwise. 16 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** Right. Any special training with respect to 17 hard body armour? 18 CST STUART BESELT: No, put it on. 19 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** Put it on. That's special enough. 20 Any special training with respect to night vision, or anything of that 21 nature? No? 22 23 **CST STUART BESELT:** I've never even seen it. Or I think I've 24 seen it once, but yeah. 25 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** Okay. All right. I think what we'll do then, is move a little bit further along in the 26 27 document to get your response to page 38, Madam Registrar, paragraph 46. (SHORT PAUSE) 28

1	MR. ROGER BURRILL: So this, gentlemen, is a portion of the
2	Foundational Document where information is attempting to be obtained with respect to
3	what it is, is happening.
4	[AUDIO PLAYBACK]
5	MR. ROGER BURRILL: There's a lot of information in that audio
6	clip that's come about as you gentlemen are travelling to Portapique. Have I got that
7	right?
8	CST STUART BESELT: That's right.
9	MR. ROGER BURRILL: All right. And in particular, I want to ask
10	you about the information with respect to the RCMP vehicle and what you were thinking
11	in terms of the information that's being provided and what you were responding.
12	Anybody want to comment on that?
13	CST AARON PATTON: Yeah. We obviously didn't know what we
14	were going to face as far as the vehicle, but we were open to anything. I mean, it could
15	have been as simple as a white Taurus or a white Crown Vic that resembled a police
16	car, but obviously, we were open to anything.
17	I had switched over to because we operate on talk groups
18	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.
19	CST AARON PATTON: on our radio where we can switch to
20	any county in the province. If we wanted to switch to Yarmouth we could speak to
21	with Yarmouth from Colchester County. So I switched over to Cumberland County's talk
22	group just to ask if anybody had come over the county line into Colchester County to
23	serve I mean, they could be over for any reason. It might have been simpler for them
24	that night to drive over to serve a court document instead of sending it to our office to
25	have us drive out. So I checked with Cumberland County, and they had advised that
26	nobody was in in our side of the county.
27	MR. ROGER BURRILL: All right. So with that information,
28	Constable Patton, that nobody from Cumberland County is there, I presume you had a

sense, generally, gentlemen, about whether there was Colchester RCMP vehicles 1 2 there. What was your understanding of that? **CST STUART BESELT:** We knew there wasn't any Colchester 3 cars there. 4 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** Okay. So we know there is no Colchester 5 car there, we know there is no Cumberland car there. What did you think, then, about 6 7 the complaint of there being an RCMP vehicle there? How can you respond to that? **CST STUART BESELT:** Well, you know, like I don't think anybody 8 9 understood the magnitude of the vehicle that he had at that time; right? Like yeah, we had information that was there, you know, and then later on, we got a number of, you 10 know, updates that it looked like a police car, looked like a police car. Well, that means 11 a lot of different things to different people; right? So you know, we're open to the 12 possibility of anything at that point in time. But were we specifically thinking that he a 13 mocked-up police car that was in every way exactly like a police car? No. Like it just --14 15 it was surprising to us, you know. **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** So if you don't think that he has a 16 mocked-up or a replica RCMP vehicle at that stage, can you give us some insight of 17 what you thought the possibilities were with respect to that vehicle? 18 **CST STUART BESELT:** Well, we, we felt like it probably looked 19 20 like a police car, so we were probably looking for either an old decommissioned police car with possibly -- like you see them driving them around every now and then, where 21 they still have some of the markings on them and -- or some of the reflective tapes on 22 23 them and sort of thing, but you're open to anything. But basically, that's where we kind 24 of thought ---25 MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. **CST STUART BESELT:** --- we were looking for. 26 MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. 27 Constable Beselt has said "we", speaking for you collectively. Any 28

comment, Constable Merchant, with respect to his observations? 1 2 **CST ADAM MERCHANT:** I'm with him. Like I think from just doing so many driving complaints and stuff, you get a complaint about a white Civic, you're 3 looking for really a silver or white sedan of some sort, so you're always keeping yourself 4 open to whatever, not locking yourself into one ---5 MR. ROGER BURRILL: So ---6 7 **CST ADAM MERCHANT:** --- particular thing. **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** --- I guess the concern that people may 8 have that there was a pretty particular comment from the dispatcher that this was an 9 RCMP vehicle in the yard. I'm going to ask you again, how is it that you responded to 10 that, or what did you think about that specific comment? 11 **CST ADAM MERCHANT:** How do you mean? 12 CST STUART BESELT: Well, it's information, but it ---13 MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah. 14 **CST STUART BESELT:** --- once again, it doesn't change 15 anything. 16 MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. 17 **CST STUART BESELT:** Like you know, our response is the same; 18 right? So we're going out there with the, you know, the expectation that it could be 19 anything; right? Like -- you know, as opposed to narrowing it down, we just kind of 20 stayed broad and tried to, you know, be open to all possibilities; right? 21 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** Yeah. Including the fact that it could have 22 23 been a replica RCMP vehicle? 24 CST AARON PATTON: Yeah. CST STUART BESELT: Yeah, I would have been very surprised if 25 I saw it that night ---26 MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah. 27 CST STUART BESELT: --- but ---28

1	<b>MR. ROGER BURRILL:</b> Why would you have been surprised,
2	Constable Beselt?
3	CST STUART BESELT: Well, I was surprised the next day, you
4	know.
5	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah? How do you mean?
6	CST STUART BESELT: Well, like, my wife showed it to me on
7	Facebook the next day, and I was like, "Oh, that's what it must've looked like before
8	they decommissioned it.", and she's like, "No, that's what it looks like now." And I was
9	shocked at the level of
10	MR. ROGER BURRILL: So are you saying that the next day you
11	had a chance actually to look at the photograph of the replica RCMP
12	CST STUART BESELT: Yeah.
13	MR. ROGER BURRILL: vehicle that was involved in this mass
14	casualty
15	CST STUART BESELT: Yeah.
16	MR. ROGER BURRILL: and you were shocked, and it didn't
17	occur to you that that could have could have been involved?
18	CST STUART BESELT: I never would have dreamed that it was
19	that
20	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Interesting.
21	CST STUART BESELT: detailed.
22	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. How about you, Constable Patton,
23	do you share the comments of your colleague, Constable Beselt, with respect to that?
24	CST AARON PATTON: Yeah. I think it would have been
25	irresponsible of us if we were close-minded to the fact that it could only be an exact
26	replica, and I don't think that any of us believed that it was going to be an exact replica.
27	But if we would've crossed paths with him that night and came upon a identical mark-up
28	marked-up vehicle like ours

1	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.
2	CST AARON PATTON: we would have obviously treated it as
3	the threat and been I mean, it would have been very difficult to take action on it,
4	maybe, feeling like maybe it's a co-worker that's made it in there before us, and I
5	strongly believe that we probably would've been injured as well if we did cross paths
6	MR. ROGER BURRILL: How do you mean by that?
7	CST STUART BESELT: We would have been shot.
8	CST AARON PATTON: I think we would have
9	CST ADAM MERCHANT: One of us.
10	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Sorry?
11	<b>CST STUART BESELT:</b> We would have been shot; right?
12	CST AARON PATTON: I think it would have taken a lot to decide
13	to make that decision that it's not your co-worker if we would have crossed paths with
14	someone dressed just like us in an identical vehicle.
15	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.
16	CST AARON PATTON: Because I mean, you're making a split
17	decision of is this a person who's actually in a an identical vehicle in an identical
18	uniform
19	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.
20	<b>CST AARON PATTON:</b> or is this somebody that's somehow
21	made it here before us from Cumberland that we're not familiar with
22	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah. Yeah.
23	<b>CST AARON PATTON:</b> and you got to make the decision that
24	you're shooting towards your co-worker or towards the threat. And I mean, obviously,
25	I'm sure we would have quickly made a decision once we began taking fire, but like I I
26	guess the beginning of my point was
27	CST STUART BESELT: But that's like you just said, "when we
28	started taking fire." You know, like the thing you have to realise is that, you know, for

him it's a target-rich environment because he knows he's the only fake; right? You
know, like we had no idea what the level of that car's -- like what it was done up to be,
and that day they did, and he still got the jump on two members; right? So you know,
had -- you know, had we come across it, you know, it's no doubt in my mind that he
would've got the jump on us. Because you know, we don't want to shoot one of our
co-workers because we -- like it's just mass confusion at that point in time; right?
MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.

- 8 CST STUART BESELT: Like you're not going to shoot first,
  9 whereas he can shoot first, he doesn't care.
- 10

MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.

**CST AARON PATTON:** But if we would've came down the road 11 and gotten -- and found a white Tahoe or a white pickup truck or a -- a white Hyundai, 12 like any vehicle that remotely fit the description of looks like a police car or is a police 13 car, we would have treated it as the threat. I think it's hard for us to decipher exactly 14 what we had decided in our minds what we were going to see as far as that vehicle, but 15 I think we were all open-minded; we hadn't made up our minds that it wasn't anything. 16 **CST STUART BESELT:** We, we -- we pointed our guns at every 17 gun we saw that night. 18

CST AARON PATTON: Yeah. Yeah. 19 20 CST STUART BESELT: Right? **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** I understand that, I just wanted to make 21 sure that we're all very clear with respect to that believability issue of it being an RCMP 22 23 vehicle, and I want to put it to you directly. Did you believe that at the start that it was a 24 RCMP vehicle involved in a murder in Portapique when you were responding? **CST STUART BESELT:** Well, we didn't know any police cars that 25 were in the area, so -- but like I said, we didn't ever imagine it was that detailed. 26 MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. Okay. 27

28 Constable Merchant, the ---

1	CST ADAM MERCHANT: Can't say.
2	MR. ROGER BURRILL: your colleagues have
3	CST ADAM MERCHANT: I can't say it any better than them, so
4	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay.
5	CST ADAM MERCHANT: I agree.
6	MR. ROGER BURRILL: All right, very good.
7	In terms of continuing on, then, with respect to the text, the I think
8	you may have answered this, Constable Beselt, earlier about "Is Brian monitoring this?"
9	Is this the Brian Rehill situation?
10	CST STUART BESELT: Yeah.
11	MR. ROGER BURRILL: And as the shift supervisor, is it your
12	decision to determine whether the risk manager becomes involved?
13	CST STUART BESELT: No, it's his.
14	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay.
15	CST STUART BESELT: He
16	MR. ROGER BURRILL: But why are you asking, I guess is my
17	question?
18	CST STUART BESELT: Well, because it's major and, you know,
19	Brian is my first, you know, he's paying attention to all this stuff and he maybe has
20	information that's coming in directly that we don't, and you know, he's a tool for us to
21	utilize, as I asked them to try and, you know, get back in touch with the complainant and
22	gather any further information.
23	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay.
24	CST STUART BESELT: You know, he's coordinating a lot of
25	things in there; right?
26	MR. ROGER BURRILL: What kind of information does that risk
27	manager coordinate for you while you're on the road?
28	CST STUART BESELT: Well, he's you know, on the road, he

can provide us with further information. Maybe he has, you know, other knowledge that
he can, you know, start moving other units from other counties into the area. You know,
whatever it may be; right?

MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah. Okay. Good. With respect to the 4 exchange of information between you and the OCC, as the shift supervisor, did you 5 have any difficulties, any problems that you want to comment, at this stage, on the way? 6 7 CST STUART BESELT: No, it just ---8 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** Did it work like it was supposed to? 9 **CST STUART BESELT:** It worked like it was supposed to. It was just, you know, with the unfortunate of how the call came in, there wasn't any further 10 information until the kids phoned in; right? 11 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** Yeah, okay. Very good. Then I think 12 what we'll do is move to page 40, paragraph 47, in the document, and then ask for 13 some commentary on that. 14 CST STUART BESELT: Sure. 15 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** If you need a break, gentlemen, just let 16 me know. I have a ---17 CST STUART BESELT: We're good. 18 MR. ROGER BURRILL: --- tendency to talk on a little longer than I 19 should. 20 CST AARON PATTON: No problem. 21 MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. Very good. Okay. Page 40, 22 23 paragraph 47. Paragraph 47 and 49. 24 [AUDIO PLAYBACK] Once again, there's a lot of information in paragraph 49 that we 25 need to talk about. But in particular, I'm interested in the dispatcher saying to you folks 26 that it's a marked police vehicle at this point. 27 Now, once again, you had said that always information coming in 28

provides you insight on how you react. You're getting information about a marked 1 2 police vehicle at this point. What's your response and how are you reacting, given that confirmation? 3 **CST AARON PATTON:** Well we haven't slowed down. I mean, 4 we're still coming as fast as we can. 5 MR. ROGER BURRILL: M'hm. 6 7 **CST AARON PATTON:** And I think we're still open minded to all 8 options. I mean, anything -- it could be describing anything. 9 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** Yeah. But the words being used there, Cst Patton, are it's actually a marked vehicle. 10 CST AARON PATTON: Yeah. 11 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** And I'm interested in the fact that this 12 would be the second, if not the third communication to you, as the first responders, 13 about the marked vehicle. And at this time, 10:19, did it have any bearing on your 14 15 response? Did it change anything at all what you were doing? CST AARON PATTON: No. 16 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** Okay. All right. Very good. It's 17 responding or comments are being made about a female com. What does that mean, a 18 female com, to you? 19 **CST AARON PATTON:** Another complainant. 20 MR. ROGER BURRILL: Another ---21 **CST AARON PATTON:** Short for -- com is short for complainant. 22 23 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** Okay. And this is new information coming 24 from the dispatcher at this time. CST AARON PATTON: Yeah. 25 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** Did this make any difference in terms of 26 your response or your information? 27 **CST STUART BESELT:** Well just that's kind of what -- like, the 28

first one, you know, was the -- obviously the mother, and then the second one was the 1 2 child. So, you know, it was kind of hard to -- I guess for us to understand the, you know, the second different complainant; right? 3 CST AARON PATTON: Yeah. 4 CST STUART BESELT: And, you know, like I said, once again, 5 we're open to all possibilities and just trying to confirm, you know, whether or not there's 6 7 any opportunity that it's mental health; right? **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** So this clip here at 10:19, are you able to 8 9 say whether you had an understanding of whether there was children involved at this point or not? Do you know? 10 CST STUART BESELT: No. No. 11 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** Okay. Tell me about that please, Cst. 12 Beselt. 13 **CST STUART BESELT:** Well they didn't say anything about the 14 identify of the second complainant. 15 MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. 16 CST STUART BESELT: You know, I would have thought maybe --17 like, I kind of thought it was an older child; right? 18 MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah. 19 **CST STUART BESELT:** Like maybe a teenager or something like 20 that. 21 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** All right. Okay. This is where Cst 22 23 Merchant uses the MHA expression? That's what you talked about earlier? 24 CST ADAM MERCHANT: Yeah. **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** Okay. And this again is an effort to obtain 25 information ---26 **CST ADAM MERCHANT:** Just try and figure out what's going on. 27 CST AARON PATTON: Yeah. 28

1	MR. ROGER BURRILL: All right.
2	CST AARON PATTON: It's for the MHA part, it's not uncommon
3	for us to get a call anywhere in the county for, like, an active I've gone to
4	Tatamagouche, I don't know, half a dozen times, for calls where someone will call in
5	and there's someone actively breaking into their house or the car has come back, and
6	we're getting updates as we're going that they're still there and now they're at the back
7	door. And we're racing to this call as fast as we can get there.
8	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.
9	CST AARON PATTON: And we'll show up and nothing has
10	happened, but the complainant will still believe that that person is in the driveway, even
11	if we're there.
12	<b>CST STUART BESELT:</b> And like, there's no footprints in the snow.
13	CST AARON PATTON: Yeah.
14	CST STUART BESELT: There's like no indication that we get
15	calls like that all the time; right? So it's
16	CST AARON PATTON: But with Cst Merchant asking this, and I
17	think I ask it at some point as well too, it's I don't want it wasn't doubting. It was just
18	we're trying to clear
19	CST STUART BESELT: Yeah.
20	<b>CST AARON PATTON:</b> clear some things up just to clarify.
21	Like, it wasn't slowing us down.
22	CST STUART BESELT: Like I said, it's far more common for us to
23	go to something like that,
24	CST AARON PATTON: Yeah.
25	CST STUART BESELT: than to, you know, a shooting death
26	murder; right? Like, it would
27	CST ADAM MERCHANT: And if dispatch looked up the history
28	and said, "Oh, yeah, we've been here. We were here last week for a similar thing," then

you might be like, "Okay. Well ----" 1 2 **CST STUART BESELT:** Maybe slow down a little bit; right? CST ADAM MERCHANT: Exactly. Yeah, there's ---3 **CST STUART BESELT:** You know, like, we're driving as fast as 4 we can on the highway ----5 CST ADAM MERCHANT: M'hm. 6 7 **CST STUART BESELT:** --- and there's a risk involved in that 8 alone; right? So. 9 MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. I understand. At 10:20:42, Cst Beselt says -- we just -- if you're like me, you love listening to yourself on the audio clip 10 there. It says: 11 "Can you check with [...] the fire dispatch to see if they've 12 got any reports [? I'm sure a] neighbour would see the 13 [fire -- or the] house on fire? 14 15 Now, my sense at this stage, Cst. Beselt, and please correct me if I'm wrong, is that there's a degree at least on your part of perhaps disbelief with respect 16 to the complaint about a fire at that stage and you're asking for confirmation. Is that a 17 fair characterization? 18 CST STUART BESELT: Yeah. 19 MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. And once again, why would you 20 have that disbelief at this point? 21 **CST STUART BESELT:** You're just looking for confirmation and, 22 23 you know, any further detail on anything you can try and learn throughout the process; 24 right? MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. Cst Merchant at 10:21:26 says, in 25 response to the complainants advising that the police car took off, at 10:21:26 says: 26 "[Do] [w]e know what colour it is?" 27 What's that about, Cst Merchant? 28

**CST ADAM MERCHANT:** Still just trying to confirm if it's, you 1 2 know, a police car or if it's -- like, EHS has cars that have lights on top. You know what I mean? 3 MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah. 4 **CST ADAM MERCHANT:** So if they're like, oh, well it had blue 5 markings, then maybe we're like, okay, well maybe it's not -- just trying to funnel down 6 7 on what exactly it is. Whether it's a police car or what have you. CST STUART BESELT: We also want to be open to the fact that 8 9 somebody may be fleeing the scene; right? So if you have an identifier on the vehicle as you're approaching, you're paying attention to the vehicles that are leaving the area; 10 right? 11 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** Right. Okay. Good. Anything further to 12 say with respect to what you're doing at that stage at 10:21, getting information from 13 and asking questions? 14 CST STUART BESELT: And driving. 15 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** And driving. 16 CST STUART BESELT: Fast. 17 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** Well this is another thing that's important. 18 As you're driving ---19 CST STUART BESELT: Yeah. 20 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** --- does that impact the manner in which 21 you receive and/or deliver information? 22 23 **CST STUART BESELT:** Well you've got to imagine you're in a 24 vehicle, you're driving 160 or faster. I think that's as fast as my car would go. You're looking at the MWS. You're trying to pay attention. There's a lot of deer in the area. 25 You know, there's a lot of factors that you're trying -- and meanwhile, you're trying to get 26 updates and, you know, you're juggling a lot of different things there, ---27 MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah. 28

59 CST S. BESELT, CST A. MERCHANT, CST A. PATTON In-Chief by Mr. Roger Burrill

1	<b>CST STUART BESELT:</b> trying to get there safe, because if we
2	don't get there, we can't help anyone; right?
3	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Sorry, I don't know what that means.
4	CST STUART BESELT: Well if we crash, then we're not a help to
5	anyone; right?
6	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. Gotcha. Okay. And Registrar,
7	could you take me back to paragraph 47, please, at page 40? I'm just going to read this
8	to you, Constables, so that I can get a sense. At 10:15:06, Beselt says:
9	"Unless we get an update in regards to [] where this
10	[] suspect [is]"
11	And then at 10:15:13, Beselt:
12	"Where this suspect might be, I think we're gonna have to
13	[…] approach slowly here, ah, with ah, hard body armour
14	and carbines"
15	Now, you had spoken before about hard body armours being
16	deployed and carbines, but I'm interested in that comment with respect to approaching
17	slowly.
18	And I ask you this because responding, of course, to an active
19	shooter or a murder scene, my intuitive response would think, "Let's not go slowly. Let's
20	get there quickly so we can minimize human loss".
21	Have you any comment you can say to me with respect to
22	approaching slowly and why you would have said that and, more importantly, why you
23	may have actually done that?
24	CST STUART BESELT: Well, yeah, 100 percent because you're
25	if you're walking up to a scene and you're driving right on the front lawn and, you know,
26	it's not like the movies. You know, you could be ambushed, right.
27	And I've I've been walking up a driveway with a rifle pointed out
28	the window at me, so you know, you need to approach a like you want to get to the

area quickly, but you want to approach slowly with cover and concealment as best as 1 2 you can, and especially, you know, when there's a shooting, right. MR. ROGER BURRILL: Methodically. 3 **CST STUART BESELT:** Yeah, methodically. Like you're -- you're 4 tactically trying to approach as guickly as you can, right. 5 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** Okay. Is that information that you had 6 7 relayed over the air? That's coming to Constable Merchant and Constable Patton as well. 8 9 Did you have any difficulty with the approach of approaching slowly 10 at this point? **CST ADAM MERCHANT:** No, because I know when he says 11 "slowly" it's relative, too. Like it's not like we're just dilly-dallying, you know. 12 MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah. 13 **CST ADAM MERCHANT:** But there was a lot of unknowns still at 14 that point, so you don't where he is. You're still not 100 percent sure what he's driving, 15 who he is, so being cautious is the smart move. 16 **CST STUART BESELT:** His capabilities, you know. 17 CST ADAM MERCHANT: Yeah. 18 CST STUART BESELT: Like you don't know if he's a 19 20 sharpshooter or what, right, like. **CST AARON PATTON:** And sharpshooter or not, if we drive right 21 up to -- in front of the house, like Beselt said, it's very easy to pick which part of the car 22 23 to shoot at because you would aim for the driver's seat. And it's very easy to -- to 24 eliminate all three of us responding very quickly before we would even know where the -- the rounds are coming from. It's dark. It's ----25 **CST STUART BESELT:** We don't go to any gun call and park in 26 front of the house, right. Like think that there's a gun. You're parking a little ways away 27 and you're approaching cautiously, right. And then, you know, if it's an active shooter, 28

you're going to take steps to stop the active shooter. If it's a barricaded person, you're 1 2 going to set up a perimeter, right, and then try and contain -- contain the threat, right. Like there's -- there's a variety of different ways to handle these 3 situations, but you know, like I said, you're not going to be any help if you're dead, right. 4 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** Right. 5 **CST AARON PATTON:** Slowly was used, but slowly wasn't what 6 7 we did. We ---CST ADAM MERCHANT: Yeah. 8 CST STUART BESELT: Yeah. 9 CST AARON PATTON: --- hit the ground running and -- and ---10 **CST STUART BESELT:** It's -- slowly just means cautiously. 11 That's all. 12 CST AARON PATTON: Yeah. We all understood ---13 MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. 14 **CST AARON PATTON:** --- the context. 15 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** But when you say slowly and equate it 16 with cautiously, in this context what were you meaning? 17 **CST STUART BESELT:** Well, cautiously. Nobody slowed down. 18 Like it -- like we just -- you know, approach slowly means that we're going to, you know, 19 muster and move in as a team, right. 20 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** Okay. And did you have any or make any 21 22 arrangements with respect to mustering or grouping as a team? 23 **CST STUART BESELT:** We hadn't got that far yet. We were, you know -- we were going to, you know, muster close to the area. 24 25 MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. **CST STUART BESELT:** But it just kind of -- it just happened so 26 quick, right. 27 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** All right. Very good. 28

1	Paragraph 50 on page 41 I think is probably the same type of
2	situation, but I just want to make sure.
3	Paragraph 50:
4	"Cst. Beselt reiterated a cautious approach to the
5	scene using hard body armour and carbines:
6	"PATTON: What's the plan? Are we responding
7	directly to the house here or are we setting up and
8	approaching ah, slowly, Stu?'.
9	Constable Beselt then says, "Well, we should set up at approach
10	cautiously here. I have no idea what we're going into, so I'd rather be safe than sorry".
11	This is at 10:22. Constable Patton is asking questions about what's
12	the plan.
13	Now, tell me about that. Give me some context what that means.
14	CST AARON PATTON: Yeah, I don't know exactly where we were
15	in in our response, like how close we were, but I think we were probably getting closer
16	to scene and
17	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.
18	<b>CST AARON PATTON:</b> trying to have our decisions made
19	before we get there. And and
20	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.
21	<b>CST AARON PATTON:</b> when you ask a question on the air,
22	everybody's going to hear the response, too, so we're organizing ourselves before
23	arriving so that when we get there, we can deploy. We can have those
24	CST STUART BESELT: Yeah.
25	CST AARON PATTON: conversations are
26	<b>CST STUART BESELT:</b> Basic plan of action at that point in time.
27	<b>MR. ROGER BURRILL:</b> But are you looking for direction,
28	Constable Patton, at this point or are you engaging in terms of providing information?

1	CST AARON PATTON: I think it's a little bit of both, but I think it's
2	kind of putting that out there so that we're having that conversation again before arriving
3	and
4	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay.
5	CST AARON PATTON: it cuts down on unnecessary
6	conversations upon arrival and
7	MR. ROGER BURRILL: All right. Very good.
8	Constable Merchant, anything you have to say?
9	CST ADAM MERCHANT: No, same. I agree.
10	MR. ROGER BURRILL: In terms of the approach, using the
11	discussion we had about cautiously and slowly, any difficulty at all with that approach at
12	all now that you look back?
13	CST ADAM MERCHANT: No, I agree. I think just the wording
14	makes it sound like going slowly, but we weren't planning to go slowly. Like we were
15	just going cautiously. That's
16	MR. ROGER BURRILL: And can you tell me, does your training
17	that you would have had
18	CST ADAM MERCHANT: Yeah.
19	MR. ROGER BURRILL: have any bearing on the manner in
20	which you would have responded to a situation like you did in this regard?
21	CST ADAM MERCHANT: Absolutely, yeah.
22	CST AARON PATTON: Yeah.
23	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay.
24	CST ADAM MERCHANT: I mean, I think the training drove us, like
25	because, I mean, the training's all scenario-based training and I think that I remember
26	running down the road there and the my mind, I'm like, all right, we got to keep going,
27	keep going, but in the back of my head I'm just like, "Holy. This is crazy"
28	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay.

1	CST ADAM MERCHANT: you know what I mean.
2	But I think the training just kind of pushed us.
3	MR. ROGER BURRILL: All right. Very good.
4	Commissioners, it's 11 o'clock, and I now propose to get into some
5	of the portions of the document with respect to the actual attendance in Portapique.
6	Perhaps a 10-minute adjournment might be in order at this point.
7	COMMISSIONER MacDONALD: Thank you, Mr. Burrill.
8	We'll take actually, we'll take a 15-minute break at this time.
9	Thank you.
10	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Thank you.
11	REGISTRAR DARLENE SUTHERLAND: Thank you.
12	The proceedings are now on break and will resume in 15 minutes.
13	Upon breaking at 10:56 a.m.
14	Upon resuming at 11:19 a.m.
15	<b>REGISTRAR DARLENE SUTHERLAND:</b> Welcome back. The
16	proceedings are again in session.
17	COMMISSIONER MacDONALD: Mr. Burrill?
18	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Thank you, Commissioners.
19	CST STUART BESELT, Resumed
20	CST ADAM MERCHANT, Resumed
21	CST AARON PATTON, Resumed
22	EXAMINATION IN-CHIEF BY MR. ROGER BURRILL, cont'd:
23	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Gentlemen, we broke off at a point
24	whereby we were just getting into determinations of what took place at Portapique
25	Beach Road and I want to direct you to page 42 of the Foundational Document,
26	paragraphs 53 and 54.
27	Now, this is a description provided by Commission Counsel with
28	respect to the encounter of Constable Beselt with Andrew MacDonald and the Faulkner

family, the details of which are relatively clear in the materials. 1 2 But I wanted to ask Constable Beselt and perhaps other members here with respect to the engagement with Mr. MacDonald and the Faulkner family gave 3 you a sense that there was a perpetrator within the subdivision or within the community 4 of Portapique? Is that right? 5 **CST STUART BESELT:** That's right, yeah. 6 7 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** Okay. Can you explain that for me, 8 Constable Beselt, just for the setting so I get a better sense of what it was? 9 **CST STUART BESELT:** Well, my -- my communication with Andrew was very brief. 10 You know, obviously I recognized him, he recognized me. And 11 anyways, he was like, "Stu, I think I've been shot". And then he felt his arm and he's 12 like, "I was shot". 13 And I'm like, "Who was it?". And he was like, "A guy in a white car". 14 MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. 15 **CST STUART BESELT:** And there was two cars that had 16 approached us, so the next car was a white car, the Faulkners. 17 And like I was done with Andrew at that point. I was trained on the 18 -- on the white car and they're like, "It's not us, it's not us". It was like they were literally 19 20 like -- and I could see it was a family, so I ran up to them. They said they heard the shooting and -- and got out of there. And 21 by that time, Adam was beside me and I'm like, "Let's go". 22 23 So we decided that we would go in on foot. 24 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** Okay. I'm going to discuss with you the "Let's go" part, but I'm interested about the fact that it would appear to you at this stage 25 26 that the perpetrator was in a white car. **CST STUART BESELT:** Right. 27 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** Right. Now, given the fact that the 28

perpetrator, the information you had, was in a -- in a car, he would be mobile ---1 2 CST STUART BESELT: Yeah. 3 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** --- I'm wondering about the decisions that you undertook with respect to whether you would go into the community also with a car. 4 keeping in mind that this person would have been mobile and able to manoeuvre with a 5 vehicle. 6 7 CST STUART BESELT: Yeah. 8 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** It's clear from the document that you 9 made decisions and your team made decisions to go in by foot. 10 **CST STUART BESELT:** Right. **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** But given the fact that the perpetrator was 11 mobile in a car, did that have any bearing on your decisions? 12 And I'll ask all three of you, not just Constable Beselt. 13 **CST STUART BESELT:** Not really. Like you know, we're still 14 trying to be as, you know, tactically and safe as possible ---15 MR. ROGER BURRILL: Right. 16 **CST STUART BESELT:** --- right. Like you know -- and I said it to 17 Aaron later on. Like you know, you have to be very concerned about ambush, right, 18 like. And I've said it on numerous times. 19 20 Like you're driving a big billboard, right. Like everybody knows you're the police when you're driving in in a marked-up police car, right. It's very easy 21 to be a target in a police car. 22 23 The safest you can be is outside of your car. It's just the fact of the 24 matter. **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** Did it make any difference that the 25 perpetrator was mobile himself in a car? 26 **CST STUART BESELT:** Well I knew that, like, Vicki was still 27 coming and would, you know, be able to, you know, block off that intersection, which is 28

what we at the time, at that moment in time, believed to be the only exit; right? So, you 1 2 know, we felt he was ahead of us somewhere; right? And just because he's in a car doesn't mean he's going to stay in a 3 car; right? So. 4 MR. ROGER BURRILL: So when Adam, Cst Merchant, 5 approached you, you said a decision was made quickly. 6 7 CST STUART BESELT: Sure. **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** Okay. What was the decision again, just 8 9 for clarity? CST STUART BESELT: Let's go. Let's get in there. Let's ---10 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** Okay. And that meant on foot? 11 **CST STUART BESELT:** Meant on foot. 12 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** Okay. Cst Merchant, do you remember 13 that time? That decision being made? 14 CST ADAM MERCHANT: Yeah. 15 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** And you had been at the scene with Cst 16 Beselt for, I'm going to say, seconds from the documents? 17 **CST ADAM MERCHANT:** Pretty much, yeah. 18 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** Yeah. Okay. And when that decision 19 20 was made to go in on foot, what information did you have with respect to the perpetrator's mobility? 21 **CST ADAM MERCHANT:** Yeah, he told me that he was in a car 22 and that he, I think, just said that he went that way or something like that. 23 24 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** Okay. So tell me, what do you think, with respect to your mobility itself, being in a car as opposed to being on foot? 25 **CST ADAM MERCHANT:** I agree. It was a closed off -- we 26 thought it was a closed off area. And it's just a lot safer being on foot. 27 MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. Why ---28

68 CST S. BESELT, CST A. MERCHANT, CST A. PATTON In-Chief by Mr. Roger Burrill

**CST ADAM MERCHANT:** Imagine trying to get out of a car with all 1 2 that equipment. You know, your hard body armour, you're out to here. And like, if we 3 engage in a gun fight right there from car to car, I think it would have been bad. But. **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** Okay. Anything from your experience or 4 your training that would give you that conclusion that it would have been more 5 dangerous in a car? 6 7 **CST STUART BESELT:** Well numerous instances of over the 8 years, you know, like, Moncton shootings, members were shot in their cars. Spirit 9 Wood in Saskatchewan. Two members were shot in their cars. You know, I was involved with the officer involved shooting in Tatamagouche. You know, the cars draw 10 fire. And, you know, so if that's trained me anything, it's -- you know, you're not safe in 11 12 your car; ---MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. 13 **CST STUART BESELT:** --- right? And you're trying to listen, and 14 you want to hear. And if you're driving, you can't do those things; right? So you're 15 trying to be safe is basically -- because you can't help anybody if you're dead, again; 16 right? 17 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** Sounds to me that it wasn't a difficult 18 decision for you to make at that point to go in on foot? 19 20 **CST STUART BESELT:** No. No, it was just -- I would do it again. **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** Okay. Okay. All right. I'm going to go to 21 page 44. And paragraph 59 in particular. And this is going to speak about Cst Patton's 22 23 involvement with Andrew MacDonald. Information gained and information provided. 24 Paragraph 59. So Andrew and Kate MacDonald remained on Portapique Beach 25 Road and Cst. Patton spoke to them. At 10:30:21, some information was displayed: 26 [AUDIO PLAYBACK] 27 Okay. Perhaps I'll direct my question to Cst Patton, given this is 28

1	your communication. You're learning some information from Andrew MacDonald and
2	you're relaying it over the air. What's the purpose of relaying it over the air?
3	CST AARON PATTON: Just trying to get as much information as
4	we're learning
5	MR. ROGER BURRILL: M'hm.
6	CST AARON PATTON: public to everybody else that's on the
7	air.
8	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. And the issue with respect to a
9	person named Gabe and he's a denturist? What was the value of that at that point?
10	Why did you provide that information?
11	CST AARON PATTON: Yeah, so as I soon as I got with Andrew, I
12	started giving him the information that we had at that point as well. I we knew that in
13	the original dispatch, I think it was did we have the name Gabe? I'm sorry.
14	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.
15	CST AARON PATTON: And I told him that. I said but he was in
16	shock. As soon as I got to him.
17	MR. ROGER BURRILL: M'hm.
18	CST AARON PATTON: At first I was going to address the bullet
19	wound. I cut his sleeve off and the bullet fell out.
20	<b>MR. ROGER BURRILL:</b> We'll talk about that in a minute.
21	CST AARON PATTON: Sure. And they and I was going to
22	attempt to do some quick first aid to him, but he didn't need it.
23	MR. ROGER BURRILL: M'hm.
24	CST AARON PATTON: He wasn't bleeding. It seemed like the
25	bullet had passed through his arm,
26	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.
27	<b>CST AARON PATTON:</b> but he wasn't losing any sort of blood
28	that was a risk to him.

1	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.
2	CST AARON PATTON: So I started to tell him, I said, "Who was
3	this? What happened?" He said, "I don't know." I said, "Well we know it's a name
4	Gabe. Does that sound" and he said, "Oh my God. Is that who it was?" And then
5	he's talking to with his girlfriend, who is also in shock, and that is who it was. And so he
6	starts to provide me the information that it's a denturist. All of that information
7	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.
8	CST AARON PATTON: that I just relayed there,
9	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.
10	<b>CST AARON PATTON:</b> I'm trying to give that out over the radio
11	as it's getting provided to me.
12	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.
13	CST AARON PATTON: And he tells me that he has a house here
14	somewhere along the road.
15	MR. ROGER BURRILL: M'hm.
16	CST AARON PATTON: And that's it, because around this time,
17	Cst Colford arrives.
18	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yes.
19	CST AARON PATTON: I transition him to Cst Colford and then I
20	pour myself into catch up with these guys, who have already headed in.
21	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. So that information that you had
22	provided comes from MacDonald at that point? Mr. MacDonald?
23	CST AARON PATTON: Yeah.
24	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah. All right. And did it have any
25	bearing in terms of what decisions you or the group made as you went into Portapique
26	Beach Road?
27	CST STUART BESELT: I'll speak to that.
28	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yes, please.

1	CST STUART BESELT: Like, at the beginning, you know, we
2	understand somebody has been shot; right? So that's that's one call; right? But now
3	that there's other people that have been shot, it transitions the like, the call, to it's not
4	just a shooting, it's an active shooter; right?
5	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay.
6	CST STUART BESELT: So now that kind of changes your thought
7	process and your how you're going in there, because you're going in under the IARD
8	principles; right, which is to go in and stop the threat; right?
9	CST AARON PATTON: To add to that too, at this point we're still
10	hearing heavy gunfire. Like, there's throughout the night, there's a lot of explosions
11	and a lot of times where we couldn't decipher necessarily if it was gunfire we were
12	hearing or if it was explosions, or both.
13	MR. ROGER BURRILL: M'hm.
14	CST AARON PATTON: But at this point, there's distinct gunfire
15	and it's rapidly being fired.
16	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay.
17	CST AARON PATTON: So it's all of those pieces. We've also just
18	arrived and we can see all of these fires burning. Like, there's a lot happening at this
19	moment.
20	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. All right. And Cst Beselt had
21	mentioned a distinction between a shooter situation and an active shooter situation.
22	CST STUART BESELT: Yeah.
23	<b>MR. ROGER BURRILL:</b> Is that something that rings a bell with
24	you, Cst Merchant? The difference?
25	CST ADAM MERCHANT: Oh, yeah, well that's all our IARD
26	training is based on an active shooter situation.
27	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. I'm going to get into IARD in a
28	moment, because I want to make sure that we nail that down,

1	CST ADAM MERCHANT: M'hm.
2	<b>MR. ROGER BURRILL:</b> specifically with the training. But
3	before we leave this part, how long are we with Mr. MacDonald?
4	CST AARON PATTON: I mean, I would be guessing,
5	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.
6	CST AARON PATTON: But around the point in the transmissions
7	where I indicate that I'm running in on foot,
8	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.
9	CST AARON PATTON: that's maybe
10	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay.
11	CST AARON PATTON: 10/15 seconds after I depart.
12	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Right. I don't think it was captured in the
13	Foundational Documents. So I wanted to ask you about that bullet.
14	CST AARON PATTON: Yeah.
15	<b>MR. ROGER BURRILL:</b> You recovered a bullet or something?
16	CST AARON PATTON: Yeah.
17	<b>MR. ROGER BURRILL:</b> Yeah. Tell me about that, please?
18	CST AARON PATTON: Yeah, so when I cut off Andrew
19	MacDonald's sleeve, the bullet fell out into the car, I guess.
20	<b>MR. ROGER BURRILL:</b> Yeah. What did you do with it?
21	CST AARON PATTON: I took it back to the command. I had it in
22	my pocket and I took it back to the command post.
23	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. We'll speak about that when we
24	get to that stage.
25	All right. If we can then, let's go to paragraph 61 65 on page 46.
26	And this talks about the IARD that you mentioned earlier.
27	Cst Merchant, what's IARD stand for?
28	CST AARON PATTON: Intermediate Action Rapid Deployment.

MR. ROGER BURRILL: Right. I didn't ask Cst ---1 2 **CST AARON PATTON:** I studied it last night just to remember. MR. ROGER BURRILL: All right. Very good. And can you tell us 3 then please, what your understanding about Immediate Action and Rapid Deployment 4 means and how it applies to a situation like this? And this is a question for all three of 5 you, because it's important what you were thinking and what you were activating at that 6 7 time. Cst. Merchant? 8 9 **CST ADAM MERCHANT:** It's just how we're trained to respond to active shooters. And the basic premise is you just go in as fast as you can to get to the 10 11 shooter and stop him. **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** M'hm. And what kind of training did you 12 have in particular with respect to IARD training? 13 **CST ADAM MERCHANT:** I think I went to IARD training probably 14 five times. 15 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** Okay. and what does IARD training 16 consist of, Cst Merchant? 17 **CST ADAM MERCHANT:** When it first started, they had Salmon 18 River School and you'd go there and it was mostly kind of school-based stuff, because 19 that's when there was a lot of school shootings. And it was all scenario based. They'd 20 have Simunition. And it'd just be like, "Okay. There's a school shooting. You're in your 21 car and you have to drive up to the school and go in and try and track the guy down and 22 23 stop him. 24 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** Okay. And the -- would you have done that during your tenure at Bible Hill Detachment? 25 **CST ADAM MERCHANT:** I think that was in Antigonish. 26 MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. 27 **CST ADAM MERCHANT:** And then since then, they have a 28

1 training facility that we do IARD training at.

2	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. Cst Patton, what about your IARD
3	training? What can you tell us about that?
4	CST AARON PATTON: Yeah, I've taken the course once.
5	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.
6	CST AARON PATTON: And that was during my initial training at
7	Depot in Regina.
8	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Right. And Cst Beselt?
9	CST STUART BESELT: Yeah, I've taken it once or twice, and I
10	had I had just done the training in 2019, so just not even a year before then.
11	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay, good. Can you please, then,
12	gentlemen, I'd be interested in your comments with respect to what you thought of the
13	training that was provided to you as general members, general duty members on
14	<b>CST STUART BESELT:</b> Well, the training is great. Like Nova
15	Scotia has phenomenal training. You know, we have a warehouse right now that we do
16	these type of active shooter scenarios in, and like Adam said, we use Simunition and
17	instructors, you know, act the role as the bad guy and you practise your technique and
18	that sort of thing; right?
19	MR. ROGER BURRILL: So in 2019, how long would the course
20	have been, Constable Beselt?
21	CST STUART BESELT: Well, it's all OSM, so they're, you know,
22	other than firearms they're doing all your baton and your OC spray, and they're
23	re-certing those every two years; right?
24	<b>MR. ROGER BURRILL:</b> You did it to me again. OSM?
25	<b>CST ADAM MERCHANT:</b> Operational skills and maintenance.
26	CST STUART BESELT: There you go.
27	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Thank you. Okay, very good. You had
28	comments with respect to the quality of the training, the IR training?

1	CST AARON PATTON: It's really good. I mean, we're not
2	obviously, you take the training and you hope you never have to use it
3	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.
4	CST AARON PATTON: but it would have been two-and-a-half
5	years since I took the course
6	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.
7	CST AARON PATTON: and as soon as we got there and we
8	deployed it all comes back. Like they do a very good job of ingraining it in your brain,
9	and the techniques and the methods and the way that we form. And throughout that
10	night, we were constantly reminding each other of all the different pieces and how to
11	how to approach different situations.
12	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.
13	CST AARON PATTON: You might not realise that you remember
14	everything about how to deploy IARD
15	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.
16	<b>CST AARON PATTON:</b> but as soon as you get into that
17	situation it's there. Like it's well taught to you.
18	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Constable Merchant?
19	CST ADAM MERCHANT: Yeah, I agree. I like I thought it was
20	good training to begin with, but then after going through that, looking back, I'm like,
21	"Wow, that" it really drove you, you know? So yeah.
22	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. So when you were attending with
23	Constable Beselt at the head of Portapique Beach Road and a decision is made to go in
24	on foot, did you consciously engage your training or is it something that's even more
25	ingrained than that?
26	CST STUART BESELT: Well, you're consciously, yeah, like
27	100-percent. You're you know, like we didn't run up the middle of the road, we ran in
28	the ditch in the darkness, you know. Like you just you're doing all these little things to

1 try and be tactically sound; right? So ----

-	ay and be tablicary search, right. Co
2	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. All right. So being tactically sound
3	at that stage led you make some decisions. What were they, just generally?
4	CST STUART BESELT: Like decisions?
5	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Where did you go?
6	CST STUART BESELT: Well, we went to what we could see first,
7	was like the fire ahead of us; right?
8	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.
9	<b>CST STUART BESELT:</b> So and with gunshots and knowing that
10	he's mobile, you know, we're going to the sound of gunshots and a fire. Like you know,
11	that's basically, you know, the direction that we went first; right?
12	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah, okay. And at that stage, did you
13	have any idea where the perpetrator was?
14	CST STUART BESELT: No.
15	CST AARON PATTON: No.
16	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. You did, though, however, have
17	some understanding that the original complaint had come from 123 Orchard Beach
18	Drive; is that correct?
19	CST STUART BESELT: That's right.
20	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah, okay.
21	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah, okay. So I want to get a sense of
22	what decision-making process you're undertaking as you're going south on Portapique
23	Beach Road and you come to that point where there's an intersection for Orchard
24	Beach Drive
25	CST STUART BESELT: Yeah.
26	MR. ROGER BURRILL: and to go straight down Portapique
27	Beach Road.
28	CST STUART BESELT: Well

1	MR. ROGER BURRILL: I need to know what was going on.
2	CST STUART BESELT: like you're obviously, we were going
3	to that call, but you know, there's so many things that can happen. You know, had we
4	seen a vehicle leaving the scene that looked like it, you know, we would've broke off
5	and gone after that vehicle; right?
6	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Right.
7	CST STUART BESELT: Like
8	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Right.
9	CST STUART BESELT: you know and especially in an active
10	shooter situation, your main goal is not people that have been shot at that moment in
11	time, your main goal is to prevent further people from being shot, and the only way you
12	can do that is engage your target.
13	So you know, at that point in time, the first three members are
14	target-specific, we're going after the threat.
15	CST AARON PATTON: And we had a fire, which turned out to be
16	the Quonset hut, to the southeast, and we had gunfire coming from that fire, that same
17	direction, and that was our point, that was where we were trying to get to.
18	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay.
19	CST STUART BESELT: Well, yeah, once cut through the woods.
20	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Right. But as you're travelling south on
21	Portapique Beach Road, my question to you was why is it you didn't go east on Orchard
22	Beach Drive?
23	<b>CST STUART BESELT:</b> Well, the initially, the fire ahead of us
24	and just the unknown; right? Like you you don't really know, it's a big wooded area,
25	right, and you all you can hear is shots; right?
26	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay.
27	CST STUART BESELT: So
28	MR. ROGER BURRILL: In terms of the unknown, it's a good point

in terms of the unknown, how are you getting information to eliminate that unknown 1 2 factor, i.e. get as much information as you can about the geography as possible? **CST AARON PATTON:** I had my phone out. I mean, obviously on 3 the way to the call ---4 MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah. 5 CST AARON PATTON: --- we could see where we were going to -6 7 MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah. 8 9 **CST AARON PATTON:** --- but there was a lot of other information we were digesting at the same time. 10 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** Right. 11 **CST AARON PATTON:** So I can speak for myself. I don't think I 12 looked at that map and ingrained on my ----13 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** You don't -- you looked at what map? 14 **CST AARON PATTON:** Or, sorry, I looked at the map on the 15 computer, but I don't think I ingrained it in my brain, whereas I got out ---16 MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah. 17 **CST AARON PATTON:** --- and knew exactly what the layout was 18 right away. 19 20 MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. **CST STUART BESELT:** 100-percent, same here. You know, like, 21 A, you're driving, you know, upwards of 150-60 kilometres an hour, you know, so you 22 23 can't study a map at the same time, you can't do two things at once; right? 24 MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah. **CST STUART BESELT:** So you're trying to get there safe, you're 25 trying to have a look at this, you're trying to get as much information as you can, ask 26 guestions that might help, and -- you know. So when you get there, you know, and then 27 you realise, "Oh, wait, now, it's an active shooter", or what would appear to be an active 28

shooter, now it kind of changes everything again; right? So ----1 2 MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah. **CST AARON PATTON:** There was a few times throughout the 3 night, throughout the totality of the night where we would get into the -- like into a 4 wooded area and get around a phone and try to figure out where we are. 5 MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah. 6 7 **CST AARON PATTON:** We would give out civic addresses to OCC ----8 9 MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah. CST AARON PATTON: --- and say like, "We're beside civic", 10 whatever number, and they would be able to use that to say, "Okay, I think you're 11 Portapique Beach Road" or, "No, I think you're on Orchard Beach Drive." 12 **CST STUART BESELT:** Yeah. Like we're cutting in and out of the 13 trees; right? 14 CST AARON PATTON: Yeah. 15 **CST STUART BESELT:** So having a limited knowledge of the 16 area, and just even in my mind today, I have to kind of try and remind myself which way 17 the houses were. Like ----18 MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah. 19 **CST STUART BESELT:** --- you know, because you're cutting 20 through the trees and all of a sudden you come out on a road that's surrounded by 21 trees, and now you've got to try and decide which way to go and where to go, and 22 23 you're trying to follow the sounds of the gunshots, at the beginning when there was a lot 24 of gunshots, but once those subsided a little bit, you're still kind of -- you know, it's like you've been put in a dryer and then you've got to figure out where you are. 25 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** Yeah. I'm trying to get a sense, though, 26 from you three about navigational tools you're using because we're going to talk a little 27 bit more later about the conditions you experienced. But can you give me some sense 28

1 of the technological that you're using to get from Point A to Point B to Point C? Are you

2 able to say anything about that?

3	<b>CST STUART BESELT:</b> It would just basically be our cell phones.
4	CST AARON PATTON: Google Maps.
5	CST STUART BESELT: Google Maps, yeah.
6	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Google Maps on your cell pones?
7	CST STUART BESELT: Yeah.
8	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Are these work-issued cell phones or are
9	these personal cell phones?
10	CST AARON PATTON: It was
11	CST STUART BESELT: I find it easier on my personal cell phone.
12	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Sorry?
13	CST STUART BESELT: It's easier on my personal cell phone.
14	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Why is that, Constable Beselt?
15	CST STUART BESELT: It's an Apple. My work phone is a
16	Samsung. I'm just more used to an Apple.
17	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Oh, okay. So how about you,
18	Constable Patton?
19	CST AARON PATTON: I was using a personal phone.
20	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah. Any comment,
21	Constable Merchant?
22	CST ADAM MERCHANT: I didn't use my phone. I just mostly
23	keep watch when they would look at
24	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay.
25	CST ADAM MERCHANT: geography stuff.
26	MR. ROGER BURRILL: All right. Any concern or difficulty with the
27	navigational tool you were using at that time?
28	CST STUART BESELT: Got us to where we needed to be

1	CST AARON PATTON: Yeah, it was
2	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay.
3	CST STUART BESELT: you know.
4	CST AARON PATTON: it worked.
5	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay, very good.
6	Paragraph 68, if we could, please, on page 48, Madam Registrar:
7	"Csts Beselt and Merchant proceeded first into
8	Portapique, heading south down Portapique Beach
9	Road. Portapique Beach Road was dark and unlit."
10	Now, all you can do is write those words to say it's dark and unlit,
11	and people have an impression. I'm going to ask you, is that a proper impression for
12	what you experienced at Portapique Beach Road, or do you have any additional
13	comments with respect to that?
14	CST STUART BESELT: Well, it was the woods, it was dark, and
15	you might have an occasional house light from one of the houses you pass, but other
16	than the light of the fires from the structure fires
17	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.
18	CST STUART BESELT: that's like there's no streetlights
19	there.
20	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah. No.
21	Constable Merchant, any comment
22	CST ADAM MERCHANT: No, it was
23	MR. ROGER BURRILL: on the conditions?
24	CST ADAM MERCHANT: It was really dark. I remember when
25	were going along and I heard footsteps coming up behind me, I didn't realise Patton
26	was coming, I drew up and I just saw him kind of emerge out of the darkness. It was
27	dark enough that you couldn't see any distance.
28	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. And did that inhibit your manner of

1	movement or your actions at all?
2	CST STUART BESELT: Well, you also have to imagine like our
3	carbines have flashlights on them
4	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.
5	<b>CST STUART BESELT:</b> but every time you use your flashlight
6	you give up your position. So any use of light gives up your position; right? So you're
7	trying to limit that usage as much as possible.
8	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. In terms of those conditions that
9	you've described, when the three of you were together you undertook an IARD
10	formation. Is that fair to say?
11	CST STUART BESELT: That's right.
12	MR. ROGER BURRILL: I want to be clear what that actually is,
13	gentlemen. Can you tell me what that is physically, an IARD formation?
14	<b>CST AARON PATTON:</b> Yeah. So an IARD formation, ideally you
15	have four members in it, but the training is you deploy as many members as available
16	-
17	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.
18	<b>CST AARON PATTON:</b> as limited as two, to three, or four.
19	CST STUART BESELT: One. Like you go
20	CST AARON PATTON: Yeah.
21	CST STUART BESELT: by yourself; right?
22	CST AARON PATTON: And so in our case we had three
23	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.
24	<b>CST AARON PATTON:</b> and the formation is always so if you
25	have four, it will be three members in front travelling forward
26	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.
27	<b>CST AARON PATTON:</b> and one member in the rear, facing
28	backwards, walking backwards, or running backwards

1	MR. ROGER BURRILL: M'hm.
2	CST AARON PATTON: covering behind us.
3	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Right.
4	CST AARON PATTON: So in our our formation had myself and
5	Adam in the front
6	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.
7	CST AARON PATTON: and Stu was in the back, going
8	backwards.
9	MR. ROGER BURRILL: All right.
10	CST ADAM MERCHANT: And it would change up a bit
11	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.
12	<b>CST ADAM MERCHANT:</b> every now and then.
13	CST AARON PATTON: Yeah, sure. Yeah.

6	perhaps we'll repeat later. There are just three of you at that stage responding in an

You had said, at that stage, they 12 didn't have the capability, or we didn't have the capability. What ---13 **CST STUART BESELT:** We still don't. And so when I gave my 17 initial interview, that was the first time I'd ever heard of radios having GPS capability. 18 MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. 19 CST STUART BESELT: Okay. 20 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** So as you're going through the 21 community ---22 23 **CST STUART BESELT:** Right. 24 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** --- the three of you together as an IARD team, what's your understanding of your ability to be traced by GPS? 25 **CST STUART BESELT:** We have no ability unless -- you know, 26 unless they can hook onto our cell phones or something like that ---27 MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. 28

1	CST STUART BESELT: but that's
2	MR. ROGER BURRILL: What would your ability be to trace other
3	members that are moving through the community
4	CST STUART BESELT: None.
5	MR. ROGER BURRILL: at that time?
6	CST STUART BESELT: None.
7	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. Is that a concern to you,
8	Constables?
9	CST STUART BESELT: A hundred percent.
10	CST AARON PATTON: Yeah.
11	CST ADAM MERCHANT: Yeah.
12	CST STUART BESELT: A hundred percent.
13	<b>MR. ROGER BURRILL:</b> And why again, just to wrap that up?
14	CST STUART BESELT: Well, you don't want to you know, you
15	don't want to shoot at another police officer or be shot at; right? Like
16	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Right. Okay.
17	CST STUART BESELT: you know.
18	CST AARON PATTON: In an IARD response, if there's multiple
19	teams, there would be the component of OCC having an eye on where we are
20	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.
21	<b>CST AARON PATTON:</b> and they can let you know. They could
22	say, "You guys are coming close to each other. You're going to meet up at this point,"
23	so that there's no surprises.
24	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.
25	CST AARON PATTON: I mean, because otherwise, you're trying
26	to communicate the best you can to another team
27	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Right.
28	CST AARON PATTON: but you might be confused yourself of

1	where you're at and describe it poorly.
2	CST STUART BESELT: That's and a lot of that stuff is in lit
3	buildings, or, you know, like, you're in the dark; right? Like, you don't we don't have
4	the capability of, you know, having the advantage of any light; right? So you're skulking
5	around in the dark and hoping that, you know, you can see him before he sees you.
6	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Then let me ask you point blank then, as
7	you're moving around Portapique Beach Road and in through those woods and out onto
8	Orchard Beach Drive, would you have preferred to have another team in there or not,
9	given what you've described?
10	CST AARON PATTON: It's a hard question.
11	CST ADAM MERCHANT: Yeah, it's
12	CST STUART BESELT: It's if I knew where they were
13	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.
14	CST STUART BESELT: I would love to have another team in
15	there.
16	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.
17	CST STUART BESELT: If I don't know where they are and I have
18	an opportunity that we're going to, you know, run into each other, then no.
19	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah, understood.
20	CST ADAM MERCHANT: I don't have and without having a plan
21	for it, I think it could have been a real mess.
22	CST STUART BESELT: Yeah.
23	CST ADAM MERCHANT: Like, maybe if they put one team here
24	and one team here, and if something came up, send that team out, or send that team
25	out, but having two teams running around in there, I think it could have been disastrous.
26	CST STUART BESELT: Yeah.
27	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. Paragraph 73, Madam Registrar, I
28	just want to make a quick reference to. That's on page 50 and 51.

So at, 1 2 "10:40:47 [...], Cst. Beselt broadcast to [...] Patton that he and [...] Merchant were "just around [the] 3 corner, on foot." [...] Beselt broadcast: " ... first 4 burning house, there is a white Taurus in the driveway 5 there, but we heard shots coming from further down 6 the road so we're continuing on." " 7 Do you have a recollection of this point in the evening? 8 CST STUART BESELT: Yeah. 9 MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah? 10 Sorry? 11 **CST STUART BESELT:** I'll never forget it. 12 MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah, of course. 13 The white Taurus, what was the significance of transmitting that? 14 **CST STUART BESELT:** Well, we didn't know if that was possibly 15 the car or what, you know. Like you're just -- once again, you're just open to all 16 possibilities, right. 17 MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah. Okay. 18 Those shots are coming from what direction? Are you able to say, 19 gentlemen? 20 **CST AARON PATTON:** Southeast. 21 MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. And you then decided to go 22 23 through the woods. Now, that's an interesting decision, to me. 24 Why is it that you went through the woods and how did you manage that given the darkness that we're talking about? 25 **CST AARON PATTON:** It was the most direct route. At first, it 26 was just -- and it's thick -- I guess it's hard to describe. It's thick woods there. And at 27 first, we just broke into the woods ----28

1	CST STUART BESELT: Well, we could see the smoke
2	CST AARON PATTON: Yeah, we
3	CST STUART BESELT: over the trees from the what was the
4	
5	CST AARON PATTON: Quonset hut.
6	CST STUART BESELT: Quonset hut, right.
7	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay.
8	CST AARON PATTON: And that was our most direct route to
9	where we believed that the threat was.
10	So we started off in just woods, like climbing over fallen trees and
11	trying to break our way through through the woods.
12	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.
13	CST AARON PATTON: Luckily, eventually like within a few
14	moments of getting into the woods, we came upon like a
15	CST STUART BESELT: Cut trail.
16	<b>CST AARON PATTON:</b> like a cut trail that we were able to use,
17	and it it led directly to the
18	<b>CST STUART BESELT:</b> The back of the Quonset hut.
19	<b>CST AARON PATTON:</b> the back of the Quonset hut.
20	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. So what I'm going to do now is
21	play for you an audio clip from page 52.
22	(AUDIO PLAYBACK)
23	<b>MR. ROGER BURRILL:</b> Now, this is a situation whereby the words
24	get put down on the page, but when you listen to the audio, you hear a tone of voice.
25	I want to ask you about what the tone of voice is that you hear there
26	and can you give us an impression of what you're thinking about and experiencing at
27	the time?
28	CST STUART BESELT: Well, we couldn't get anywhere close to

that -- that structure fire. Like it was -- it was so hot. And right -- there was some very 1 2 heavy explosions coming out of there. Like I know we wanted to stay as far away from that possible with 3 just having the explosions. Like you don't know what's in there, right, so ---4 MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah. 5 **CST STUART BESELT:** But you're just -- you're -- it's almost 6 7 disbelief. Like Adam said, it's like a war zone in there. Like you've never seen anything 8 like it, so. 9 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** Okay. Constable Merchant, any comment with respect to the tonality of the voices and what you were thinking, 10 experiencing at the time? 11 **CST ADAM MERCHANT:** Well, I don't know. I just remember 12 coming -- we came from the woods and it was just dark and then you come out to that 13 and it's just white, hot, huge fire and it -- yeah, it was crazy. And just explosions and 14 15 gunshots, so yeah, I'm sure there was some anxiety or, you know, but -- yeah. **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** Constable Patton, anything to say? 16 **CST AARON PATTON:** Yeah, I echo the same things. I mean, 17 like the fires were all infernos. They were large houses burning just like daylight near 18 the houses, but we had -- like we mentioned the vehicle, the Taurus. 19 20 MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah. **CST AARON PATTON:** We came upon this vehicle backed into 21 the driveway of the first house. It had reflective tape around the perimeter of it like our 22 23 cars. It seemed like it could be a vehicle that looked like a police car, so it was difficult, 24 too, to determine -- because we had activity happening south of us ---MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah. 25 **CST AARON PATTON:** --- with gunfire, but we're also trying to 26 determine is the threat here. 10	that someone could come out, before here. Ah, if they
11	know the roads well."
12	Did you hear that transmission?
13	CST STUART BESELT: I don't remember it, personally, no.
14	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Constable Patton?
15	CST AARON PATTON: Yeah, I I'll be honest. When I read that
16	in the Foundational Documents, I was surprised.
17	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay.
18	CST AARON PATTON: I don't remember.
19	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Constable Merchant?
20	CST ADAM MERCHANT: I don't remember hearing it, but I think
21	the thing is that we're focused on what we're doing and we're kind of leaving the
22	containment aspect up to other
23	CST AARON PATTON: Yeah.
24	CST ADAM MERCHANT: people.
25	CST STUART BESELT: That's that second wave. Like that's
26	more for the second wave. That's not really for us because as far as we were
27	concerned, this was active, right.
28	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Right.

1	CST STUART BESELT: You could hear things going popping off
2	and and buildings that weren't on fire the first time you saw them were now on fire.
3	You know, like as far as the whole night, it's you know, we considered that he was still
4	there.
5	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Right.
6	CST AARON PATTON: And when we're in there, I really didn't
7	have any perspective of how many members were out on the road at that time because
8	there's lots of people talking, there's lots of people trying to arrange the containment
9	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Right.

11	what we were dealing with in real time, and so
12	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Would it have made any difference to you
13	three in terms of your operation to know that there was an alternate way out of
14	Portapique at that point?
15	CST STUART BESELT: No, because like it's good information
16	to have for that second wave coming in so that they can try and plug the holes, if you
17	will.
18	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.
19	CST STUART BESELT: But for us, we're in it. Like we're we've
20	got a job to do and we were doing it.
21	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. Constable Merchant, anything
22	further?
23	CST ADAM MERCHANT: No.
24	MR. ROGER BURRILL: No? All right.
25	Good. Page 56, paragraph 83, the Foundational Document
26	describes how you make your way through the cut trail to the address at 136, what
27	we've described as the Quonset or the warehouse, and then attend at Orchard Beach
28	Drive. And there's a communication over the radio at 10:49, "355, looks like we have

one deceased here." That's from Cst. Beselt. 1 2 Does this discovery make any difference to you in terms of your methodology of conducting your operation? 3 **CST STUART BESELT:** No, it just confirms that that's what we're 4 looking at, right? 5 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** Okay. Did you have any expectation that 6 7 you were going to find a deceased at that location? CST AARON PATTON: No. 8 9 CST STUART BESELT: No. **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** No. And your reaction, your experience, 10 your feelings at that stage were what? 11 **CST STUART BESELT:** Well, it's just confirmation that we were 12 dealing with an active shooter. 13 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** Okay. Did you have any sense of who 14 15 this person was and how that may have impacted upon what was going on at Portapique? 16 **CST AARON PATTON:** We had no idea. We quickly checked to 17 make sure it wasn't self-inflicted, that there was no chance that this was our threat. 18 MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah. 19 20 **CST AARON PATTON:** And we continued on. **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** Okay. Now, at that stage, I want you to 21 tell me, if you can, about your knowledge of the children at 135 Orchard Beach Drive. 22 23 Did you have a sense, any of you, what was going on at that location in the red A-frame 24 house? CST STUART BESELT: No. 25 **CST ADAM MERCHANT:** I think we just ended up there after 26 finding Mr. Ellison. And I believe there was some contact with Dispatch, mentioning the 27 kids there and that it was 135. And then we were like, "Oh, well, we're right here, right 28

1	now."
2	And I think that Dispatch might have said that there was banging on
3	the door and they asked if it was us banging on the door.
4	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay, okay. What I'll do then is go to
5	page 58, paragraph 85. And we'll play this portion here.
6	(AUDIO PLAYBACK)
7	MR. ROGER BURRILL: No, Cst. Beselt has just indicated in
8	response to a complaint about the kids, or kids that you weren't involved in that over
9	there. And I'm trying to determine exactly what knowledge you had about the kids.
10	CST STUART BESELT: Yeah. I don't remember why we
11	specifically went to that house. I think the kids heard a lot of the explosions from the
12	you know, like even later on in the night they thought somebody was in the house with
13	them.
14	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.
15	<b>CST STUART BESELT:</b> The concussion from the explosions, like,
16	you know, the one time we were like, as we were approaching the back of the
17	warehouse, it was we were probably still 150 feet away and, like, you could feel the
18	vibration from that explosion, right?
19	So I think the kids were right across the street from it and that's it
20	probably would have shook the house. Like, it you know.
21	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.
22	CST STUART BESELT: So that's what they were hearing at that
23	point in time.
24	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Cst. Merchant, Cst. Patton, did you have
25	any knowledge of the kids at that point?
26	CST AARON PATTON: Well, we were learning from Dispatch, and
27	we were using our phones as a map.
28	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.

1	CST AARON PATTON: We would have had 135, and I think it's
2	just shortly after finding Mr. Ellison that we realized through maps that the house is
3	here, and we'll go there directly.
4	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Had you realized or had a sense that
5	there were children involved at 135 Orchard Beach Drive, would that have had an
6	impact on the way in which you conducted your IARD operation there?
7	CST STUART BESELT: No.
8	CST AARON PATTON: No, not at all. IARD operation
9	CST STUART BESELT: I just remember knocking on the door and
10	being surprised that there was four children there, you know?
11	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay.
12	Cst. Merchant, any response to that question?
13	CST ADAM MERCHANT: Whether it would impact?
14	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.
15	CST ADAM MERCHANT: No. We still had a job. Again, we had
16	to focus on that.
17	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay, very good.
18	Madam Registrar, page 59, paragraph 87, if you would, please?
19	I'm going to play a short clip here.
20	(AUDIO PLAYBACK)
21	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Now, there's a fundamental decision
22	made at this point with respect to what it is you decide to do; and that is, move on. Are
23	you able to provide us any insight into why that decision was made to move on, keeping
24	in mind the kids were at that house?
25	CST STUART BESELT: Well, it's a super-hard decision. Like, it
26	would have been easy to stay there and protect the kids. Right? But if you think people
27	are dying down the street and you could have prevented that, then you know, and
28	that's the basic principle of IARD is, you know, stop the threat, right? Like, it doesn't

matter if he kills the whole subdivision and you've kept the kids safe; like, he's gone on
doing what he was going to do.

So, you know, it's not an easy decision, obviously. Of course you want to protect the kids, but, you know, you try and make them as safe as possible and keep going, right? You just keep going towards the sound of what you think are gunshots.

7

CST AARON PATTON: Yeah, I'll echo that, too.

8 I mean, it was the single hardest decision that we made that night 9 but if we take a step back and look at the IARD training, the fundamentals of IARD 10 wouldn't even have had us responding to the kids at all. I mean, we went to the kids' house because it was a concern of ours, but there was nothing to indicate, really, that 11 the threat was at that house, necessarily. And we were still -- I mean, we didn't 12 necessarily have a direct place to go at that point, but we're focused on trying to find the 13 threat and deal with the threat. 14 15 But we -- it wasn't a very easy decision for us in the moment either, 16 to come up with the conclusion that we were going to leave the kids in the house, and 17 we worried nonstop after leaving the house that something was going to happen to

those kids. We were fearful that the threat may come to the house; the house may getlit on fire. These were all major concerns of ours.

20 And yeah, we didn't want to leave the kids by themselves, but we 21 still had an objective to try to meet.

MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah. Cst. Merchant, do you have
anything to add to the comments of your colleagues, with respect to that decision to
leave the kids?

CST ADAM MERCHANT: No, nobody wanted to leave the kids.
You know, we're dads; you know what I mean? I've got a kid the same age; we didn't
want to leave them.

28 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** In terms of efforts to protect the kids,

keeping in mind you've made the decision to leave and go towards the threat, what was 1 2 done for those kids? **CST STUART BESELT:** Well, at that point in time we just -- we 3 told them to hide in the basement and, you know, not answer the door or anything like 4 that. 5 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** Right. 6 7 CST STUART BESELT: You know. MR. ROGER BURRILL: You'll recall from the clip, Cst. Beselt, that 8 9 you had indicated that: "...two of the kids are from the neighbour's house; 10 [and] they said their parents are dead down the road." 11 CST STUART BESELT: Right. 12 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** That's what we just heard? Did that have 13 any bearing on where your next actions or your next movements would be, keeping in 14 15 mind you had this knowledge now from the kids? **CST STUART BESELT:** Well, at one point in time, we did try to go 16 towards what we thought was that residence, you know, but immediately leaving after 17 there is when we first encountered Mr. Ellison. 18 MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. 19 CST STUART BESELT: Right? 20 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** All right. 21 CST STUART BESELT: So... 22 23 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** Well, let's move on to that, then. Madam Registrar, page 59, 60, paragraphs 88 and 89. 24 I want to play for you what will involve the engagement of Mr. 25 Ellison. 26 (AUDIO PLAYBACK) 27 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** Okay, gentlemen. Once again, I'm 28

noticing a tone of tension in that exchange. You would agree with me on that? 1 2 **CST STUART BESELT:** Yeah, we were getting ready to shoot someone. 3 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** Right. So with respect to, "Is there 13 anybody else in here with us, identify yourself right now," what was that directed 14 towards? 15 **CST STUART BESELT:** You just want to make sure it's not 16 another police officer, right? 17 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** Is this is a concern for what you had 18 expressed earlier about blue on blue? 19 20 **CST STUART BESELT:** Yes, of course. **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** Or potential blue on blue? 21 CST STUART BESELT: Of course. Like, you know, we're target-22 23 specific but, you know, like, we don't want to shoot somebody that, you know, isn't the 24 target, right, so... MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah, okay. Paragraph 89 attributes a 25 quote to you in an interview with the RCMP investigators in which you say: 26 And so anyways we prone out...we take 27 positions,...we're waiting for it to, 'cause it's still quite 28

1	a ways in the distance. And ah, we're kind of just like,
2	you know kind of waiting,like we feel this is probably
3	him, right, so, um, I come on the radio, I'm like is
4	there any other fucking members in the area, 'cause
5	you know we're about to light this guy up."
6	CST STUART BESELT: Right.
7	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Are you able to explain what that
8	expression means?
9	CST STUART BESELT: Just slang.
10	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Slang for what?
11	CST STUART BESELT: Shoot him, right?
12	We're in a prone position. So, like, shooting from a prone position
13	is basically laying down to make yourself as small a target as possible for fireback.
14	And, you know, like we can see him in the distance and all we can see like, I can't
15	even see anything about him other than it's just, like, a flashlight kind of bopping down
16	the road.
17	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.
18	CST STUART BESELT: So, you know, we're waiting for him kind
19	of to get within the capabilities of our own flashlights to identify him; right? And then,
20	you know, like my line in the sand at that point of time is if because I want to
21	challenge him; right? I want to say, "Please don't move;" right? And hopefully the
22	person gives up. But in, you know, a scenario, if he's going to run, my line in the sand if
23	he runs, I'm going to shoot; right? Because I want to stop this threat.
24	So as he approached, you know, you're trying to do everything you
25	can to identify if this is your suspect and go from there; right?
26	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.
27	CST STUART BESELT: So yeah, we're getting ready to shoot
28	him. Like, we think it's the suspect.

1	MR. ROGER BURRILL: How close did Clinton Ellison come to
2	being shot that night?
3	CST STUART BESELT: Probably 25 feet, 50 feet.
4	MR. ROGER BURRILL: How close psychologically though, from
5	your point of view, were you from
6	CST STUART BESELT: Yeah.
7	MR. ROGER BURRILL: making off that shot?
8	CST STUART BESELT: Well if we if he would have got to the
9	point where we had our flashlights been effective, if he would have ran, we would have
10	shot him.
11	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. Any comments, Cst Merchant, Cst
12	Patton, with respect to that particular engagement with Mr. Ellison?
13	CST AARON PATTON: Yeah, I mean obviously we would have
14	assessed the situation as well. I mean, once the this person with the flashlight
15	coming down the road got into our view,
16	CST STUART BESELT: Yeah.
17	<b>CST AARON PATTON:</b> we would have taken other things into
18	consideration too, like was there a weapon in his hand? Was there like, I don't think
19	that Stuart is trying to say that we would have blindly just
20	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.
21	CST AARON PATTON: shot this person.
22	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.
23	CST AARON PATTON: We would there would have been a lot
24	of other
25	CST STUART BESELT: Yeah.
26	<b>CST AARON PATTON:</b> situational factors that came into play.
27	But we just based on the totality of all the different things that had been happening in
28	that moment, we felt that we were hot on the track of the suspect

1	CST STUART BESELT: Yeah.
2	CST AARON PATTON: and we felt that if someone was
3	wandering down the road because at this point it seems like someone has been going
4	from house to house and it seemed very plausible that this was our person coming up
5	the road to us.
6	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah. When that person's light goes out
7	and disappears into the woods, what is it that you're thinking at that point?
8	CST AARON PATTON: They saw or heard us and
9	MR. ROGER BURRILL: They saw what?
10	CST AARON PATTON: They've seen us on the lawn.
11	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah. Yeah.
12	CST AARON PATTON: Or they've heard us trying to transmit on
13	the radio.
14	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.
15	CST AARON PATTON: And they're getting away. Like, they're
16	trying to avoid us.
17	MR. ROGER BURRILL: What did you think about that person
18	being the active shooter?
19	CST STUART BESELT: Oh, we 100 percent thought that it was
20	the active shooter. I know that I changed my position, because Aaron was looking
21	down the road, so I changed my position to look to the back of the house, or that yard,
22	in case he was coming around to try and flank us.
23	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.
24	CST STUART BESELT: So, you know, like, you're just worried
25	about where he went and, you know, you know,
26	CST AARON PATTON: I think it shows how dark it was, really,
27	because as soon as the flashlight went out,
28	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.

1	CST AARON PATTON: The Quonset house the Quonset that
2	was burning directly beside us, across the street,
3	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.
4	CST AARON PATTON: it gave a glow for a decent perimeter
5	around this house.
6	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.
7	CST AARON PATTON: But as soon as the woods blocked that,
8	we couldn't see anything down the road to the south on
9	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.
10	CST AARON PATTON: Orchard Beach.
11	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.
12	CST STUART BESELT: We never saw him at all.
13	CST AARON PATTON: And when he was coming with the
14	flashlight, he must have been, I don't know, 100 yards away or less.
15	CST STUART BESELT: Yeah.
16	CST AARON PATTON: And the flashlight went out and there was
17	no silhouette, there was no person that we could see.
18	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. And tell me then, given keeping
19	in mind the IARD principles to pursue the threat and your perception at this time that the
20	flashlight was the threat, or the person with the flashlight, did you pursue that threat at
21	that point?
22	CST AARON PATTON: Yeah, we did.
23	<b>MR. ROGER BURRILL:</b> All right. Tell us about that, please?
24	CST AARON PATTON: Well at first we remained on the ground
25	prone.
26	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.
27	CST AARON PATTON: And we were talking amongst ourselves,
28	trying to figure out what's going on, and "Do you see anything?"

1	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.
2	CST AARON PATTON: "Anything happening?" And then
3	eventually, we were all pretty well in a line along the
4	MR. ROGER BURRILL: The fence?
5	<b>CST AARON PATTON:</b> northern side of the McCully residence.
6	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.
7	CST AARON PATTON: Around there's a tree there that we
8	were also using. And I turned so I was the furthest to the south of the three of us.
9	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.
10	CST AARON PATTON: And I told the other guys, "I'm going to
11	turn my flashlight on my gun and see if we can see something, but be ready." Because
12	we didn't know if this person was still there. So we turned the flashlight on and directly
13	in line with where the flashlight had turned out, maybe 20/30 feet ahead of us was Ms.
14	McCully's body. So that's the point where we located her. And it took us a few minutes
15	to maybe not a few minutes, but it took us a couple seconds to figure out, is this
16	related to the flashlight we just saw? I mean, we didn't hear gunfire, but is it somebody
17	playing possum and
18	CST STUART BESELT: Yeah.
19	CST AARON PATTON: Like, we don't know. Like, it's
20	CST STUART BESELT: Every
21	CST AARON PATTON: chaos; right?
22	CST STUART BESELT: The times that we saw bodies, we
23	approached them cautiously,
24	CST AARON PATTON: Yeah.
25	CST STUART BESELT: because we didn't know if it was the
26	suspect just
27	CST AARON PATTON: So we
28	CST STUART BESELT: playing possum; right?

1	CST AARON PATTON: Yeah. So we assessed determined that
2	it obviously wasn't and we pressed on down the road to the south to try to basically put
3	ourselves on the line to lure this guy out. And obviously we didn't make it all the way
4	down the road.
5	CST STUART BESELT: Well I stopped us. Like, chasing the
6	suspect into the woods
7	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.
8	CST STUART BESELT: with, you know, with no way of
9	knowing, all he'd have to do is turn around and wait for us. And, you know, it would be
10	suicide because he could completely ambush us. So.
11	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. So that's what I'm wondering
12	about. That decision at that point to not go into the woods seems almost
13	counterintuitive or counter-responsive to the IARD principles
14	CST STUART BESELT: Yeah.
15	MR. ROGER BURRILL: that you've discussed earlier. Are you
16	able to explain that to me, gentlemen, in terms of why that decision was made to not go
17	into the woods?
18	CST STUART BESELT: It's just self-preservation really at that
19	point
20	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay.
21	CST STUART BESELT: in time.
22	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay.
23	CST STUART BESELT: We decided to go back to the house to
24	where the kids were and make sure, you know, whether or not we set up there for a
25	short time
26	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.
27	<b>CST STUART BESELT:</b> to just make sure he doesn't come
28	back to the kids.

1	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.
2	CST AARON PATTON: We did press down the road
3	CST STUART BESELT: A little bit.
4	CST AARON PATTON: further.
5	CST STUART BESELT: Yeah.
6	CST AARON PATTON: Yeah.
7	CST STUART BESELT: Yeah, we got about two steps into the
8	trees and I said, "No. This is suicide."
9	CST AARON PATTON: We
10	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Was that the decision of the shift
11	supervisor?
12	CST STUART BESELT: Oh, yeah.
13	MR. ROGER BURRILL: The team leader at that point?
14	CST STUART BESELT: One hundred (100) percent. I said, "This
15	is suicide.
16	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Right on. Now what about you, Merchant
17	and Patton? What did you think about that decision made by the team leader/shift
18	supervisor at that point?
19	CST ADAM MERCHANT: When the flashlight incident happened, I
20	was to the rear of them. And I don't know if there was a bush or something, so I totally
21	missed seeing the flashlight.
22	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Right.
23	CST ADAM MERCHANT: So we went prone and I don't think I
24	was as convinced that it could like, I thought it could be someone else walking around
25	too.
26	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.
27	CST ADAM MERCHANT: So I wasn't as convinced about
28	shooting in this su.

1	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.
2	CST ADAM MERCHANT: But also, he saw it. So,
3	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.
4	CST ADAM MERCHANT: you know what I mean? Like,
5	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Right.
6	CST ADAM MERCHANT: I think afterwards, he was you were
7	kind of worried afterwards, like, "Did I let him go?" Like, at the end of the night.
8	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Oh, yeah.
9	CST STUART BESELT: Yeah, so.
10	MR. ROGER BURRILL: And that's what I want
11	CST STUART BESELT: Yeah.
12	MR. ROGER BURRILL: to ask about,
13	<b>CST STUART BESELT:</b> Well that ate me up for two days after.
14	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Tell us about that, please, Constable?
15	CST STUART BESELT: Well it's just, you know, like, the regret or
16	the whatever. You know, knowing that you could have prevented the next day had you
17	taken the shot. And realizing now that it wasn't the suspect, obviously very thankful I
18	didn't shoot. You know, like but, you know, that was you know, the next day,
19	thinking that I could have prevented the Sunday, that ate me up a lot. I was pretty
20	distraught about that, until I found out that it was Mr. Ellison.
21	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. And when did you find out it was
22	Mr. Ellison that you did not shoot?
23	CST STUART BESELT: We kind of had an informal debriefing on
24	the Monday,
25	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay.
26	<b>CST STUART BESELT:</b> where some of the guys involved got
27	together and I was talking to Dion Sutton, the dog man,
28	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.

1	CST STUART BESELT: and, you know, he's like, "No." And
2	then it kind of fell into place that that made sense and I realized there was nothing else I
3	could have done differently.
4	MR. ROGER BURRILL: You made the right decision?
5	CST STUART BESELT: One hundred (100) percent. Yeah.
6	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah. Okay. Okay. Page 60, paragraph
7	91 is a description in the Foundational Document of at 10:59, the IARD members
8	located a second deceased. And I think you've just touched on that, Cst Patton, with
9	respect to the body of Ms. McCully that was discovered.
10	Did this discovery provide any further insight into your actions
11	upcoming at that point? Or was it the same as with respect to the first deceased you
12	discovered?
13	<b>CST STUART BESELT:</b> Same as the first.
14	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.
15	CST STUART BESELT: Right.
16	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. Given the fact that now you have
17	discovered a second body, did that have any impact on your thinking with respect to
18	resources or getting more people into Portapique? This is kind of a similar question I'd
19	asked you before, but I think it's important to have it contextualized to the time.
20	CST STUART BESELT: No. Because at that point in time, we
21	also felt like there was other bodies there as well because the other two children had
22	mentioned that their parents were dead next door.
23	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.
24	<b>CST STUART BESELT:</b> So we were trying to figure out basically
25	how many causalities we had
26	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.
27	CST STUART BESELT: and, you know, you know, keep going
28	forward; right?

1	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. Page 62, paragraph 94 of the
2	Foundational Document describes in narrative form the IARD members return to 135
3	Orchard Beach Drive to the children after the Clinton Ellison incident. I don't have the
4	tape of that, or the clip of that, other than for me to say to you when you, went back to
5	the children at that point, was that an abandonment of IARD principles to keep going
6	towards the threats or can you
7	CST STUART BESELT: Well
8	MR. ROGER BURRILL: give us a better sense of why you went
9	there?
10	CST STUART BESELT: So you can basically go from active
11	shooter to non-active shooter, you know, throughout an incident; right?
12	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.
13	CST STUART BESELT: So active shooter is, press forward; you
14	know, non-active shooter is set up containment; right?
15	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.
16	CST STUART BESELT: So like I said, at that point in time, some
17	of the what we thought were gunshots were, we weren't hearing as much anymore,
18	and so we pulled back to, you know, try and protect the kids.
19	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. At that point, did you have a
20	destination in mind when you pulled back to the kids? Was there another place that
21	possibly you should be attending?
22	CST AARON PATTON: Not at that point.
23	CST STUART BESELT: Not at that moment in time.
24	MR. ROGER BURRILL: All right. In terms of the gunshots and the
25	noise, you say that it attenuated or had been reduced a little bit at that point?
26	<b>CST STUART BESELT:</b> We weren't hearing them as frequently.
27	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay, all right. Then let me ask you this
28	question, specifically, then, were any thoughts made at that point to go to 123 Orchard

Beach Drive to deal with the Blair family? 1 2 **CST STUART BESELT:** After we talked to the kids the second time ----3 MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah. 4 **CST STUART BESELT:** --- that was our, I believe our intention 5 6 was to go ---7 MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. 8 CST STUART BESELT: --- to go there ---9 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** All right. **CST STUART BESELT:** --- and then that's when they called us 10 back because -- or they called back saying that they thought they had heard somebody 11 inside. So ---12 **CST AARON PATTON:** And in that moment, the -- there was a -- I 13 don't know the civic, but there was a house further to the north on Orchard Beach that 14 was fully ablaze, and I believe all of us, but I can speak for myself, that we believed that 15 was the Blair house burning. Because they had said that it had been lit on fire, and we -16 17 **CST STUART BESELT:** The Blair house is set back off the road 18 as well, and with tree cover, so you know, it wasn't on fire, the house at the time, right, 19 but we could see other houses on fire. So you know, we started down the road and 20 then, like I said, the kids called us back, so we returned. 21 22 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** Right. 23 I've been longer than I thought I would be with you, Constables, but 24 I want to ask you this final question, perhaps before lunch, and that is with respect to the southern portion of Portapique Beach, sorry, Portapique area, in particular, 25 Cobequid Court. We now know that there was murders at 41 and 46 Cobequid Court. 26 When you are conducting your operation in Portapique, did you have any knowledge of 27 anything going on at Cobequid Court? 28

1	CST AARON PATTON: None.
2	CST STUART BESELT: None.
3	MR. ROGER BURRILL: No.
4	CST STUART BESELT: No.
5	MR. ROGER BURRILL: When you were in Portapique at that time,
6	did you know where Cobequid Court was?
7	CST STUART BESELT: I had been there before.
8	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Did you know where Cobequid Court was
9	when you were there?
10	CST STUART BESELT: I didn't it wasn't something that came
11	across my mind. We were chasing the sound of gunfire
12	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.
13	<b>CST STUART BESELT:</b> or got sidetracked with things like the
14	kids or
15	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay.
16	<b>CST STUART BESELT:</b> that sort of stuff; right?
17	MR. ROGER BURRILL: When you were going south towards the
18	flashlight for that brief moment of time, did you ever consider continuing going south
19	towards the Cobequid Court area?
20	CST AARON PATTON: Well, not long after that was when we got
21	the call to at the end of Portapique Beach Road
22	CST STUART BESELT: Faris.
23	<b>CST AARON PATTON:</b> Faris Lane, that there was somebody
24	in the the information we had received was there was someone in the yard, the
25	neighbour's house had just been lit on fire, and I believe there was a vehicle pulling into
26	the caller's driveway.
27	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.
28	CST AARON PATTON: And that took our attention. That gave us

1	our new Where Stu said like the
2	CST STUART BESELT: Goal.
3	CST AARON PATTON: you go from containment to IARD and
4	it's fluid
5	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.
6	CST AARON PATTON: that turned us back into IARD and it
7	gave us a direction to go, and that was where we headed next.
8	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay.
9	Commissioners, as I indicated, it's I think it's 12:30; I'm surprised
10	by that.
11	<b>COMMISSIONER MacDONALD:</b> Just wondering logistics,
12	Mr. Burrill, how much longer do you expect to be because it might be wiser to keep
13	going and then
14	MR. ROGER BURRILL: As you please. I
15	COMMISSIONER MacDONALD: using the break, you know, to
16	combine lunch with an opportunity for the caucus as well. But if that's not feasible, then
17	
18	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah. No, I think I can if I may, I'd be
19	quite happy to proceed given the time constraints that we're aware of here. I might be
20	half an hour to an hour.
21	COMMISSIONER MacDONALD: Yeah. Yeah, why don't you
22	continue on, then, and see how far
23	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Thank you.
24	COMMISSIONER MacDONALD: you can get.
25	MR. ROGER BURRILL: All right. Gentlemen, we have I had
26	asked you pointed questions with respect to your attendance at the children's residence
27	and why you were there, and then I understand there was a call to the north, and you
28	responded to that call. Is that is that right?

1	CST AARON PATTON: To the south.
2	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay, to the south. Tell me about that,
3	Constable Patton?
4	CST AARON PATTON: Yeah. So there was a call, and I can't
5	recall who made the complaint, that their neighbour's house had been lit on fire, there
6	was a vehicle in the driveway, then I think maybe it was pulling out possibly.
7	CST STUART BESELT: Somebody was pounding on her door.
8	CST AARON PATTON: And somebody was pounding on her
9	door, that was the other piece.
10	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay.
11	CST AARON PATTON: And it seemed to fit the bill of what we'd
12	been chasing.
13	MR. ROGER BURRILL: All right. I want to turn to page 64,
14	paragraph 98. At 11:16, Merchant is saying:
15	"What's that shooting?"
16	"Stu – Adam, there's something happening to the
17	north of us right now."
18	"355 ah; members on Orchard Beach road, we've got
19	a female on the line [there]she believes her house is
20	about to catch fire."
21	Is this of significance to you in terms of moving to the north? Do
22	you recall this, Constable Merchant?
23	CST ADAM MERCHANT: Yeah. I remember when we were
24	leaving the kids and then that call came up.
25	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay.
26	CST ADAM MERCHANT: So we started heading up that way, and
27	then just as we were getting up that's when dispatch said that the kids were saying that
28	the there was someone in the house.

1	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. And what happened then?
2	CST ADAM MERCHANT: Then we booted it back as fast as we
3	could.
4	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Right. Okay.
5	CST ADAM MERCHANT: And then we got in there, searched the
6	place, and, like Stu said earlier, it was just the sound of the explosions still.
7	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. I'm going to try to move on now to
8	paragraph 100. And I've skipped over just one moment, please. Paragraph 100, at
9	page 65, 11:16.
10	[AUDIO PLAYBACK]
11	<b>MR. ROGER BURRILL:</b> Emergency broadcast that we can make.
12	That was Constable Beselt indicating that. What did you mean by that, and what was
13	the context of that?
14	CST STUART BESELT: Just thinking out loud, really. Like we
15	never really put out emergency broadcasts for anything like this in the past, but I just
16	wondered if there was something we could put out.
17	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Would there be any part of your training
18	that would have been the impetus for you to make that request?
19	CST STUART BESELT: No.
20	MR. ROGER BURRILL: No?
21	CST STUART BESELT: Just thinking out loud.
22	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. But you say thinking out loud. Did
23	you get a response at all through parties with respect to that?
24	CST STUART BESELT: Well, just Brian came back saying that
25	they were using the 9-1-1 map to
26	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. What's the 9-1-1 map,
27	Constable Beselt?
28	CST STUART BESELT: Well, I my assumption is that well,

when we get 9-1-1 calls, they come up on a map with, you know, the different -- whose 1 2 phone it is and all that sort of stuff. MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah. 3 **CST STUART BESELT:** So obviously, my perception of that was 4 that they're identifying houses from the map to notify as many of the occupants as 5 possible. 6 7 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** When you -- it was indicated to you that 8 there was a 9-1-1 map being used, did that mean anything to you? 9 **CST STUART BESELT:** Well, I guess it meant that they were taking care of it or looking after some aspect of that. 10 MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. 11 Constables Patton and Merchant? Anything at all about a -- an 12 emergency broadcast of some kind that could be undertaken? Did you have any 13 involvement with that? 14 **CST ADAM MERCHANT:** No, I thought it was a good idea. I didn't 15 16 know anything about a 9-1-1 map ----MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. 17 **CST ADAM MERCHANT:** --- that's more of a dispatch thing. 18 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** Right. Let me ask you more pointedly, 19 20 then, gentlemen, the Alert Ready System, did you have any knowledge of that with respect to how it works, when it works, how it's requested, who requests it, and was it 21 part of your thinking at this time? 22 23 CST AARON PATTON: No. 24 CST STUART BESELT: Not really. **CST ADAM MERCHANT:** That's way up the pay grade. 25 **CST STUART BESELT:** It had never really been used for anything 26 like this before, so I -- it was just a thought process. 27 MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. Okay. 28

1	<b>CST ADAM MERCHANT:</b> It's not a constable thing.
2	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Sorry?
3	CST ADAM MERCHANT: It's not a thing for constables.
4	MR. ROGER BURRILL: What does that mean, Constable?
5	CST ADAM MERCHANT: Well, it's way above us to make
6	CST STUART BESELT: That request.
7	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Emergency
8	<b>CST ADAM MERCHANT:</b> emergency alerts and stuff.
9	CST STUART BESELT: Yeah.
10	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah, okay.
11	Page 66, the paragraph, 105. We are getting closer to the end.
12	[AUDIO PLAYBACK]
13	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Now, there's something within the
14	Foundational Document that perhaps is a little unclear. Is two structures on fire at that
15	time, Constable Beselt? You've indicated:
16	"we've moved [north]down from the red house,
17	[and] found two more structures on fire."
18	Do you have any insight into that when you were saying that what
19	you meant?
20	CST STUART BESELT: Well, we found houses on fire.
21	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. Have any idea where they were
22	specifically?
23	CST STUART BESELT: I don't remember the specific
24	CST AARON PATTON: I think it was just one house, but I think
25	our perception from like, we're looking at a fire burning above the trees.
26	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.
27	CST AARON PATTON: And we can't see the structure specifically
28	but it it must have looked like two at the time and I think it turned out to be one.

1	CST ADAM MERCHANT: And there were grass fires too, so
2	CST AARON PATTON: Yeah, the grass fires in everybody's yard
3	were burning.
4	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. And this has some bearing on the
5	conditions that you were making observations as well in terms of what it is you're seeing
6	and counting?
7	CST AARON PATTON: Yeah, it's a war zone
8	CST ADAM MERCHANT: Yeah.
9	CST AARON PATTON: right?
10	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah. Okay. Okay.
11	Page 67, paragraph 108 talks about your attendance at 4 Faris
12	Lane, and this is something that you were touching on a little earlier. And you went to 4
13	Faris Lane in response to a dispatch, I believe that's the scenario; am I right there?
14	CST AARON PATTON: Yeah.
15	CST STUART BESELT: That's right.
16	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. When you go to 4 Faris Lane, any
17	efforts made with respect to protection and/or dealing with the kids, knowing that you're
18	going to be going a physical ways away from them?
19	CST STUART BESELT: Well, that time we knew that we were
20	kind of away from the area. And, you know, obviously, you know, one of our main
21	concerns throughout this whole thing was the safety of the children. And, you know,
22	these guys made a good call in, you know, asking for people to come in.
23	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah. Okay. So page 70, paragraph
24	113.
25	[AUDIO PLAYBACK]
26	MR. ROGER BURRILL: So, Constable Merchant, that's attributed
27	to you. You, at that stage, at 11:45:11 indicate that with all these fires being lit, maybe
28	somebody should be sent in to the kids. My question for you is, this is 11:45, quarter to

12, about an hour you had been -- or more than that had been in Portapique. Why was 1 2 it that you waited until this length of time to make inquiries about the kids? CST ADAM MERCHANT: I think that I was just -- at that point, I 3 was just kind of -- I wanted the kids out. So ----4 MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah. 5 **CST ADAM MERCHANT:** --- I just got worried and, yeah. 6 7 **CST STUART BESELT:** Yeah, well, within the first however long, 8 a lot of what we were doing was right around the kids; right? So, you know, we were in 9 the area, you know, with a kind of knowledge that we could respond quickly to them. But then when we got all the way over to Faris, because that's a bit of a hike ---10 MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah. 11 **CST STUART BESELT:** --- you know, we couldn't watch or 12 respond to the kids quickly anymore. 13 MR. ROGER BURRILL: M'hm. 14 CST ADAM MERCHANT: And also -- sorry, go ahead. 15 **CST STUART BESELT:** Yeah, go ahead. 16 **CST ADAM MERCHANT:** I think we were to the point where, like, 17 you got to have resources now that you can send someone in to get these kids out so. 18 CST STUART BESELT: Yeah. 19 20 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** Yeah, but there any reason that you had it at 11:45 as opposed to making that communication ----21 CST ADAM MERCHANT: Well, I think it ---22 23 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** --- earlier? 24 **CST ADAM MERCHANT:** --- scared the crap out of me going back and when they said someone was in the house. 25 MR. ROGER BURRILL: Sorry? 26 CST STUART BESELT: Yeah. 27 **CST ADAM MERCHANT:** When they said that there was 28

somebody in the house ---1 2 MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. **CST ADAM MERCHANT:** --- it scared me so. 3 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** All right. Was there any indication coming 4 to you from command about other alternatives or other teams going in to the kids at any 5 time that you were aware of? Sorry? 6 7 **CST STUART BESELT:** No, I don't -- not really, no. 8 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** Okay. All right. I'm going to direct your attention to page 72, paragraph 119. 9 Constable Beselt at 12:22 is attributed to be saying, 10 "...Ah, maybe – can we contact the hotel or 11 something, [...] – some of these people don't know 12 where to go, [and] that we're trying to [be] clear out 13 here. At least [...] we have somewhere we can tell 14 them to go." 15 This is you making a request with respect to a location for people 16 who are evacuating ---17 CST STUART BESELT: Right. 18 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** --- is that right? 19 **CST STUART BESELT:** That's right. 20 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** Okay. I have two questions for you. Why 21 did you ask that, and second of all, who are you evacuating and why are you doing 22 23 that? **CST STUART BESELT:** Well, over the course of my career, I've 24 done other things where we've evacuated people. It's helpful if you can tell them where 25 to go. 26 MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah. 27 **CST STUART BESELT:** Right? Because they're, like, leaving 28

1	their house and all their things, and they're, like, "Well, where am I supposed to go?"
2	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.
3	CST STUART BESELT: And if you have somewhere, you know,
4	like, go here, then they can go there; right? And instead of just staying in their car
5	somewhere; right?
6	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Right.
7	CST STUART BESELT: Sorry, what was the second part of the
8	question there?
9	MR. ROGER BURRILL: You're evacuating people
10	CST STUART BESELT: Right.
11	MR. ROGER BURRILL: in this
12	CST STUART BESELT: So
13	<b>MR. ROGER BURRILL:</b> situation. Why are you doing that?
14	CST STUART BESELT: Well, we when we cut through the trees
15	the second time
16	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.
17	<b>CST STUART BESELT:</b> to go from Orchard Beach to
18	Portapique, there's a car approached, and so once again we proned out and we got
19	ready, and noticed it was a an older couple. And so, you know, we were in their yard
20	basically, and they were about to pull back in, and we told them, you know, to get out.
21	And so, you know, at that point in time, we still weren't a hundred percent sure if the
22	fires were being lit to draw the people out; right? So, in my opinion, or my thought
23	process was, if we can get as many people out, we're limiting our casualties; right? So -
24	- and we don't have to worry about I don't care about a house. House can burn. I
25	don't want to lose a life. That's my thought process.
26	MR. ROGER BURRILL: How about you, Constable Merchant?
27	Did you have input into this decision to evacuate people?
28	CST ADAM MERCHANT: I don't know. I mean, I don't know if I

had any input, but we just always talked about stuff as a team anyways, but I thought it 1 2 was good because, like, you know what I mean, get people out. MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah. Constable ---3 **CST ADAM MERCHANT:** We don't -- we still don't know what's 4 going on so. 5 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** Constable Patton? 6 7 **CST AARON PATTON:** Yeah, we weren't, I guess, specifically 8 working to get everybody evacuated, but we were taking advantage of opportunities 9 when we didn't have specifically something we were addressing ---MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah. 10 **CST AARON PATTON:** --- and maybe we came upon a house 11 that had a car in the driveway, so we would set up containment kind of on the house 12 temporarily. One member would go, knock on the door, and tell everybody out, and 13 send them out to the entryway. 14 MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah. 15 **CST AARON PATTON:** But it wasn't our goal to evacuate every 16 house. We just -- when an opportunity presented itself, we took advantage of it and 17 managed to get a few more people out to safety. 18 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** Great. Thank you. After the Griffins were 19 evacuated from 4 Faris Lane, you returned, then back up Portapique Beach Road and 20 returned to the children. Have I got that right? That's what the Foundational Document 21 talks about; right? 22 23 **CST STUART BESELT:** Where -- on the where? MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah. 24 **CST STUART BESELT:** From Faris Lane? 25 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** From Faris Lane you return back to the 26 27 children, join Constable Neil? CST STUART BESELT: Well, we knew that the kids were out ---28

MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah. 1 2 CST STUART BESELT: --- at that point in time ---MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah. 3 **CST STUART BESELT:** --- because Constable Grund and 4 Constable Neil had gone in. I think Aaron made the suggestion for them to take the kids 5 out in the family car ---6 7 MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah. CST STUART BESELT: --- which was very smart decision. But it 8 9 left Bill by himself. MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah. 10 **CST STUART BESELT:** So I didn't want that, so I figured, if 11 nothing else, we can make up a four, and then I don't have to worry about Bill either by -12 - being there by himself. 13 MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. 14 **CST AARON PATTON:** Orchard Beach was central. 15 MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yes. 16 **CST AARON PATTON:** It was a good location for us to use and to 17 wait for something else to happen, to go. 18 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** I'm left with the impression though, and 19 correct me if I'm wrong, that there was quite a wait after you returned to Constable Neil, 20 or Bill Neil at that address, at 135, after the kids had been extracted; am I right there? 21 **CST STUART BESELT:** Well, the time it took us to run -- sorry, 22 23 walk quickly. MR. ROGER BURRILL: You walk quickly back ---24 CST STUART BESELT: Yeah. 25 MR. ROGER BURRILL: --- to 135? 26 **CST STUART BESELT:** Yeah, like, we went back -- I think we 27 evacuated one more ---28

1	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.
2	CST STUART BESELT: lady from a house, came through the
3	trees again, and came upon Bjorn there.
4	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Right. And I perhaps hadn't made myself
5	clear in my question. I was focussing more about when you returned to 135 Orchard
6	Beach Drive and joined Constable Neil.
7	CST STUART BESELT: Yeah, that was our goal when we left
8	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.
9	CST STUART BESELT: Faris.
10	MR. ROGER BURRILL: You got back there.
11	CST STUART BESELT: Yeah.
12	MR. ROGER BURRILL: How long were you there before you were
13	evacuated, I guess is my question?
14	<b>CST STUART BESELT:</b> Oh, probably about an hour or so.
15	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah. And what did you do when you
16	were there for that hour or so?
17	<b>CST STUART BESELT:</b> Well, like, the for the most part, the
18	shooting or the explosions had completely stopped.
19	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.
20	CST STUART BESELT: So we just kind of hunkered down and
21	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay.
22	<b>CST STUART BESELT:</b> they had told us at that point in time,
23	with the explosions and everything kind of stopping or subsiding, that's when I finally
24	asked for direction as to whether or not they wanted us to stay in there or, you know,
25	hunker down, and that's where they provided the direction that we were supposed to
26	stay put and wait for the ERT to remove us.
27	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Right. And I'm going to ask the question
28	again that I've asked before about 123 Orchard Beach Drive. Any decision made at that

1	point, given the fact that you're at 135, to go to 123 to deal with the situation at that
2	location?
3	CST AARON PATTON: I think we still 120, that's the Blair's
4	residence?
5	MR. ROGER BURRILL: The Blair's house, yes.
6	CST AARON PATTON: I think at that time, we were of the
7	impression that that house that had been totally demolished in a fire was that residence.
8	MR. ROGER BURRILL:   see. Okay. Okay.
9	When you were there hunkering down, did you get any directions
10	with respect to attending Cobequid Court or to any other location?
11	CST ADAM MERCHANT: No.
12	CST STUART BESELT: No.
13	CST AARON PATTON: No, we just took up positions.
14	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay.
15	CST AARON PATTON: ERT were
16	CST STUART BESELT: ERT was close. You know, they got
17	sidetracked on a
18	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Right.
19	CST STUART BESELT: a call across the bay or whatever
20	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.
21	CST STUART BESELT: for some people are calling in, "I see
22	a light in my yard. I see a light in my yard,"
23	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.
24	<b>CST STUART BESELT:</b> or whatever. So they just told us to
25	wait for the or to get there.
26	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. I recall from some of the materials
27	that Constable Beselt had indicated that he thought he had travelled 10 kilometres on
28	foot. He was soaked from sweat?

1	CST STUART BESELT: That's what Aaron's watch said, yeah.
2	CST AARON PATTON: Yeah.
3	CST ADAM MERCHANT: Yeah.
4	CST STUART BESELT: Yeah, we were I was soaked
5	completely through my
6	CST AARON PATTON: We were freezing at that like, that was
7	the first chance that we kind of had, like we said earlier, where we started to realize
8	what starting to soak it all in. Like, we had a second to think and, you know
9	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah. Yeah.
10	CST AARON PATTON: yeah, and the I don't know what the
11	temperature was that night, but we were all soaked in sweat. That's when the cold
12	started, for sure.
13	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. How about you, Constable
14	Merchant? How were you feeling at that stage?
15	CST ADAM MERCHANT: Oh, exhausted by then. Like it's, you
16	know, 10 kilometres we were running with all that gear on.
17	CST STUART BESELT: Yeah, you're carrying about 70 pounds of
18	gear, right.
19	CST ADAM MERCHANT: Diving into ditches, getting up and
20	yeah.
21	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. All right.
22	I'm I want to ask you about page 85. One fifty-two (152) is the
23	paragraph. And this is observations about while shelter in place with respect to pretty
24	sure that you heard gunshots at that stage coming from the north.
25	CST STUART BESELT: Well, it was just one gunshot.
26	MR. ROGER BURRILL: All right. Thank you.
27	CST STUART BESELT: Or one loud bang, which, you know
28	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay.

1	CST STUART BESELT: So the reason that, you know, we came
2	to that conclusion is ERT was calling Mr. Ellison out of the woods
3	CST AARON PATTON: With a loud hailer.
4	CST STUART BESELT: with a loud hailer, right, and so, you
5	know you know, as far as we were concerned, this thing was ongoing all night and we
6	figured he was probably hunkered down somewhere in the woods.
7	So they weren't specifically calling Mr. Ellison out. They were just
8	calling the person in the woods to come out, right.
9	CST AARON PATTON: Identifying themselves.
10	CST STUART BESELT: Yeah, as the police.
11	<b>CST AARON PATTON:</b> Come out to the armoured vehicle.
12	CST STUART BESELT: Like the TAV is a huge like looks like a
13	tank, almost, right.
14	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.
15	<b>CST STUART BESELT:</b> So at that point in time when they're
16	calling the person out of the woods, you know, and then you hear this loud crack, you
17	know, you kind of feel like, okay, you know, the SOC felt like the gig is up, you know, or
18	the ERT team is here and, you know like it was just so out of the blue
19	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.
20	<b>CST STUART BESELT:</b> that one last explosion, right.
21	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah.
22	<b>CST AARON PATTON:</b> Yeah, that's very very accurate.
23	I mean, we hadn't heard anything that seemed like a gunshot for a
24	while and this was very distinct. We all heard it. ERT, I think, acknowledges it as well,
25	hearing the gunshot.
26	CST STUART BESELT: Yeah.
27	CST AARON PATTON: And I don't know if we came to a total
28	conclusion, but we were making an assumption that seemed plausible that that could

have been a ---1 2 **CST STUART BESELT:** Like he just happened to be at the same time that ---3 MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah. 4 CST STUART BESELT: --- ERT was calling. 5 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** And what was the assumption/conclusion 6 7 that you made at that point? **CST AARON PATTON:** That the suspect had taken his own life. 8 9 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** Okay. Constable Merchant, do you have any recall of ---10 **CST ADAM MERCHANT:** No, I heard it, too. It sounded like a rifle 11 12 to me. MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah. 13 CST ADAM MERCHANT: And I think -- yeah. I mean, it crossed 14 my mind that, oh, maybe he killed himself, you know, but ---15 MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah. 16 **CST ADAM MERCHANT:** --- when I say that, it's not like it 17 changed anything investigationally for everyone else. Like we were going off shift, you 18 know. 19 MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah. Okay. 20 You eventually were extracted by the TAV from that location and 21 you were taken back to the Great Village fire hall, command post, and you were 22 23 debriefed at that point. Am I right? 24 CST AARON PATTON: Yeah. **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** And I understand that you provided some 25 information, Constable Patton, with respect to the bullet that you had maintained or 26 seized? 27 **CST AARON PATTON:** Yeah, I gave it to a member there, but 28

they had a map set up there as well that we were able to draw out kind of the path that 1 2 we'd taken ----MR. ROGER BURRILL: Yeah. 3 CST AARON PATTON: --- identify which houses had burnt, where 4 there was deceased that we had located ---5 MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. 6 **CST AARON PATTON:** --- and try to give out all of the information 7 8 we ----9 MR. ROGER BURRILL: Do you remember who you communicated that to, which member of the command structure? 10 CST AARON PATTON: I'm really not sure. 11 **CST STUART BESELT:** Well. Addie was there. 12 **CST AARON PATTON:** I -- there was a lot of people. 13 CST STUART BESELT: AI Carroll, I believe. 14 CST ADAM MERCHANT: Halliday. 15 CST STUART BESELT: Yeah, Halliday. 16 MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. That's Addie MacCallum. 17 CST STUART BESELT: Yeah. 18 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** Staff/Sergeant Addie MacCallum. 19 CST STUART BESELT: Yeah. 20 MR. ROGER BURRILL: Staff/Sergeant Al Carroll. 21 22 **CST STUART BESELT:** Right. 23 MR. ROGER BURRILL: And Staff/Sergeant Halliday? CST STUART BESELT: Yeah. 24 MR. ROGER BURRILL: Steve Halliday. 25 CST STUART BESELT: Okay. 26 MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. Very good. 27 What happened to the bullet, did you say, Constable Patton? 28

1	CST AARON PATTON: I'm not sure who I gave it to. It was we
2	were trying to figure that out last night.
3	CST STUART BESELT: Second Corporal. I don't know who it
4	was.
5	CST AARON PATTON: There's a lot of members that were in the
6	mix that we're not familiar with.
7	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. The information with respect to
8	your assumption about that last shot that we talked about just three minutes ago, was
9	that provided to the people at the command structure?
10	CST AARON PATTON: Of course, yeah.
11	CST STUART BESELT: Yeah. We tried to give them everything
12	that we had learned.
13	CST AARON PATTON: Actually, the
14	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay.
15	<b>CST AARON PATTON:</b> the whoever took over operational
16	command was there as well.
17	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay.
18	CST AARON PATTON: I can't remember his name off the top of
19	my head.
20	MR. ROGER BURRILL: Fair enough.
21	Okay. That concludes my questions in an effort to fill in the context
22	and the issues around the Foundational Document, but I do want to ask you two more
23	questions to conclude.
24	The first question is for all three of you. Given your activity that
25	night in Portapique as you look back with all the information that you have, do you have
26	any regrets about your behaviour and your actions that night?
27	Constable Beselt?
28	CST STUART BESELT: No, I wouldn't have changed anything

from our perspective or our response. 1 2 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** Constable Patton? **CST AARON PATTON:** Yeah, I agree. I mean, with the 3 information we had in the moment, I don't think I would have done anything differently. 4 MR. ROGER BURRILL: Constable Merchant. 5 **CST ADAM MERCHANT:** Same. I mean, you go through this 6 7 1,000 times and I don't -- given what I know, I couldn't have changed anything that 8 would have made any difference. 9 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** Okay. And finally, given what you know now and the information that you've seen in the Foundational Documents, is there 10 anything that you would like Nova Scotians or Canadians to know about your 11 experience that night that they don't already know? 12 **CST STUART BESELT:** I think the Commission has done a good 13 job of telling our story because I think it was something that wasn't told at the beginning 14 15 and led to a lot of conspiracy about, you know -- that the RCMP didn't react in an appropriate way. And you know, I was glad to see that we were finally being 16 acknowledged for going in. 17 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** Constable Patton? 18 CST AARON PATTON: Yeah. I mean, we tried our best. It was a 19 20 -- it was mayhem and we tried to deal with things as they came, but -- yeah. MR. ROGER BURRILL: Constable Merchant? 21 CST ADAM MERCHANT: Same. Just that we tried our best. 22 23 MR. ROGER BURRILL: Okay. 24 All right, Commissioners. Those are my questions for these witnesses. Thank you. 25 COMMISSIONER MacDONALD: Yeah. Thank you so much, Mr. 26 Burrill 27 And we will break until 2 o'clock. And I realize that Participants 28

1	Counsel have to and Mr. Burrill and Commission Counsel have to have lunch as well,
2	but if but if the caucus could take place over the break, that would be very helpful.
3	And if more time is needed, then Commission Counsel can certainly relay that to us.

(As read) 3 And I'm going to ask you, that statement means that you were afraid that you could be 4 shot by -- you or your team members could be shot by the perpetrator and you wouldn't 5 even have had an opportunity to see the shooter? Is that what you meant by that 6 statement? 7 **CST STUART BESELT:** Well it's the way I feel. I'm not exactly 8 sure the context of the statement, but yeah, like that's basically the way I would feel 9 about if I were entering a situation with an active shooter. 10 **MR. ROBERT PINEO:** And in your testimony when you were 11 guestioned by Mr. Burrill, you gave a number of reasons regarding why you guestioned 12 -- or information that you questioned on your way in. And specifically regarding the 13 vehicle that the perpetrator was driving, you said that you might have considered that it 14 was a Crown Vic or a Taurus, those sorts of -- or simply a decommissioned RCMP car. 15 But one of your -- I'm going to ask you, did you consider the 16 possibility if the perpetrator was a rogue member of the RCMP? 17 **CST STUART BESELT:** I suppose anything is possible. It wasn't 18 something that really specifically came to mind though. 19 20 **MR. ROBERT PINEO:** Okay. So it's not something you considered when, you know, when making your decisions to enter Portapique? 21 CST STUART BESELT: No, not really. No. 22 23 **MR. ROBERT PINEO:** Going to a different question, so I'm not asking about your decision making going into Portapique, this is just a general question, 24 but does the RCMP have a password countersign methodology? That is, do you have a 25 general password that if you call the password out, only another member of the RCMP 26 would know the countersign to provide? 27 CST STUART BESELT: No. 28

**MR. ROBERT PINEO:** Okay. That's not one of the RCMP's 1 2 procedures? CST STUART BESELT: No. 3 **MR. ROBERT PINEO:** Okay. Do you agree with the statement 4 that as an IARD team, your main concern is stopping the threat and everything else is 5 irrelevant? 6 7 CST STUART BESELT: Yes. 8 **MR. ROBERT PINEO:** Okay. I want to ask you, would a different number of members of an IARD team allow you to function differently? For example, if 9 there was only two of you, would you function differently than if there were six of you? 10 **CST AARON PATTON:** I didn't know if it was directly for you. 11 **CST STUART BESELT:** Well it's basically your principles are the 12 same; right? Like, you know, the most we ever usually do is teams of four. You know, I 13 suppose you could do two teams of three if you, like, knew where everybody was; right? 14 **MR. ROBERT PINEO:** Okay. I want to ask you a few questions 15 about your IARD training. And I believe that you said in your statement that you didn't 16 have very much rural training. That is, training for rural situations in employing the 17 IARD team. Was that correct? 18 **CST STUART BESELT:** Well it was addressed in the training, but, 19 you know, the main focus is, you know, for the last little while, was schools and that sort 20 of thing, but -- or buildings. But you know, the -- you know, the -- you know, basically 21 we watched -- or for me, it was watching videos and such about different formations and 22 23 how to handle outside. 24 CST AARON PATTON: | can say | ----**MR. ROBERT PINEO:** In term -- go on. No, go ahead. 25 **CST AARON PATTON:** I was just going to say, when I did the 26 training, we had the indoor and the outdoor component and we mobilized in real time, 27 indoors and outdoors, for our course. 28

2	too.

4	CST ADAM MERCHANT: Different formations where you're
5	spread out a bit more.
6	MR. ROBERT PINEO: Did any of you do exercises in a wooded
7	area in the dark?
8	CST STUART BESELT: No.
9	CST ADAM MERCHANT: No.
10	CST AARON PATTON: No.
11	MR. ROBERT PINEO: And I believe, Cst Beselt am I saying
12	your name correctly? Beselt?
13	CST STUART BESELT: Beselt.
14	<b>MR. ROBERT PINEO:</b> Beselt. I think you testified that you didn't
15	have access to night vision goggles on the night of the 18 <sup>th</sup> ?
16	CST STUART BESELT: No.
17	MR. ROBERT PINEO: And did any of the three of you have
18	access to night vision goggles?
19	CST AARON PATTON: No.
20	CST ADAM MERCHANT: No.
21	<b>MR. ROBERT PINEO:</b> Or any night vision technology of any kind?
22	CST AARON PATTON: No.
23	CST ADAM MERCHANT: No.
24	MR. ROBERT PINEO: You'll agree with me that that would have
25	been helpful for you to have had that night; wouldn't it?
26	CST ADAM MERCHANT: Yes.
27	CST STUART BESELT: Sure. Yeah.
28	MR. ROBERT PINEO: Were and this is a general question to

the three of you, were any or all of you aware, on the night of April 18<sup>th</sup>, 2020, that your 1 2 radios actually had GPS capability but it was not activated? CST AARON PATTON: No, I wasn't aware. 3 **CST STUART BESELT:** I wasn't aware the radios had that 4 capability until I did my Mass Casualty interview. 5 CST ADAM MERCHANT: Yeah, I was not aware either. 6 7 **MR. ROBERT PINEO:** You'll agree with me that had GPS technology been individualized to members and those members were communicating 8 9 with OCC, that a second team would have been able to have been able to be on scene and the blue-on-blue threat would have been minimized? 10 **CST STUART BESELT:** That's correct. 11 CST AARON PATTON: Yes. 12 CST ADAM MERCHANT: Yes. 13 **MR. ROBERT PINEO:** Did you have any training with -- sorry, 14 training to integrate different IARD teams working on a common threat? Was that part 15 of your training? 16 CST AARON PATTON: Yes, it is. 17 **MR. ROBERT PINEO:** And was it part of your training prior to April 18 18<sup>th</sup>, 2020? 19 CST AARON PATTON: Yes. 20 CST STUART BESELT: Yeah. 21 **MR. ROBERT PINEO:** Now, once the three of you were at the 22 23 mouth of Portapique Beach Road and the decision was made to head in on foot, in the 24 beginning, it was Cst Merchant and Beselt that headed in together? Do I have that 25 correct? CST AARON PATTON: Yes. 26 CST STUART BESELT: Yes. 27 **MR. ROBERT PINEO:** And Cst. Patton, you were -- you stayed 28

back with the MacDonalds and the Faulkners for a short time? 1 2 **CST AARON PATTON:** That's right, yes. **MR. ROBERT PINEO:** And how long after the first two went in did 3 you head in on foot, Cst Patton? 4 **CST AARON PATTON:** I'd have to take a guess, an 5 approximation, but ---6 7 MR. 11	MR. ROBERT PINEO: I'm not sure. In your statement, you just
12	say a car.
13	CST STUART BESELT: I'm assuming that's the white Taurus. It
14	was parked backed into the driveway.
15	MR. ROBERT PINEO: Okay. Did you see any other cars on
16	Portapique Beach Road or near Portapique Beach Road?
17	CST STUART BESELT: No.
18	MR. ROBERT PINEO: And when you got to 200 Portapique Beach
19	Road, I take it that it was around that place that you decided to go through the woods
20	and over to Orchard Beach Drive? Do I have that correct?
21	CST STUART BESELT: Yeah, as you kind of go around the curve
22	there we saw those two houses. Nothing looked out of the ordinary there, so we cut
23	through the woods to go to the where we could see the smoke and hear shots coming
24	from.
25	MR. ROBERT PINEO: Okay. And I would like to specifically ask
26	you about the two houses that you that you reference there. So you were standing at
27	200 Portapique Beach Road looking southwards?
28	CST STUART BESELT: Well, we went past the first burning

house, and were kind of around that bend in the road so that you could see Faris, the
corner of Faris and Portapique Beach Road, and like that's -- that's one of the aspects
why we felt it was still ongoing is because that first house that was -- it's burned since,
but it wasn't on fire at that time. So when we came back around the second time, it was
on fire.

**MR. ROBERT PINEO:** Okay. And I'll ask you a little more about 6 7 that in a few minutes, but -- so I just want to be clear. The two houses you're talking about, was one the -- on the left hand side of Portapique Beach Road, that is, the 8 9 western side of Portapique Beach Road but still on Portapique Beach Road? **CST STUART BESELT:** Yeah. I think it was a log cabin; yeah. 10 **MR. ROBERT PINEO:** Okay. And do you now know that that is 11 the Zahl/Thomas residence? 12 CST ADAM MERCHANT: Yeah. 13 CST STUART BESELT: Yeah. 14 15 **MR. ROBERT PINEO:** Okay. And the second home that you're talking about that we didn't see on fire, is that the home that is on the corner of Faris 16 and Portapique Beach Road? 17 **CST STUART BESELT:** Yes, the home we evacuated the family 18 out of, yeah. 19 MR. ROBERT PINEO: Okay. And do you now know that is the 20 Griffon home? 21 CST STUART BESELT: Yeah. 22 23 **MR. ROBERT PINEO:** Okay. Okay. So just as you are about to 24 start going through the woods to Orchard Beach Drive, I take it from your testimony that you heard gunshots or explosions to the west? 25 **CST STUART BESELT:** Through the trees, yeah. 26 MR. ROBERT PINEO: Sorry, to the ---27 CST AARON PATTON: To the east. 28

**MR. ROBERT PINEO:** Yes. To the east, sorry, not to the west. 1 2 CST STUART BESELT: Yeah. **MR. ROBERT PINEO:** Okay. And when exactly did 3 Constable Patton catch up with you? Was it before you headed into the woods or after 4 you had headed into the woods? 5 **CST STUART BESELT:** No. We got around that corner and we 6 7 checked those two houses. From a distance it didn't look, like I said, anything was 8 going on with them, and then we started working our way back towards the first house and Aaron came around the corner there. So -- yeah. And then we together made the 9 decision, "Well, let's just cut through the woods because it looks like there's another 10 structure fire and maybe that's where the sounds are coming from." 11 **MR. ROBERT PINEO:** Okay. So just before you headed into the 12 woods you had a good look at the Zahl residence and we've confirmed that it was not 13 on fire. Did you notice anything else about it, any movement, anybody walking around, 14 15 a car ---CST STUART BESELT: No. 16 **MR. 7	yourself, just out of self-interest? Did you go back and get the GPS coordinates of your
8	movements of that evening?

10	CST ADAM MERCHANT: No.
11	CST STUART BESELT: No.
12	MR. ROBERT PINEO: Okay. And my final question before we
13	head into the woods, you said you heard I mean, from the time you started down
14	Portapique Beach Road onwards, you heard gunshots or explosions. And I have a
15	couple of very specific questions to ask you.
16	Do you or any of you know if there is a difference in sound from
17	ammunition that is fired from a gun compared to if it explodes in a fire?
18	CST ADAM MERCHANT: No.
19	CST STUART BESELT: No. As I stated, I when I responded to
20	Sergeant O'Brien, I I wasn't even sure what we were listening to, if it was explosions
21	or firearms, you know. Like they're very similar in sound; right?
22	CST AARON PATTON: The only thing I could say to that too is
23	MR. ROBERT PINEO: Constable
24	CST AARON PATTON: they're I'm not sure if the sound
25	would be different but there was a percussion to it that was very specific with somebody
26	shooting, like a pop, pop, pop, pop, pop; pop, pop, pop,
27	expect you to get if it was just something exploding or or ammunition that's going off
28	on a fire. It seemed very much like someone shooting a gun and pulling a trigger.

22	MR. ROBERT PINEO: Okay. So you came out behind what we
23	have been calling the "warehouse", I think you called it "Quonset hut". Do you now
24	understand that that was the perpetrator's garage?
25	CST STUART BESELT: Yes.
26	CST ADAM MERCHANT: Yes.
27	CST AARON PATTON: Yes.
28	MR. ROBERT PINEO: Okay. And I take it you didn't get very

close to that building because it was fully engulfed in fire? 1 2 **CST AARON PATTON:** And we went around the south end of the property line along the tree line. 3 CST STUART BESELT: Yeah. 4 MR. ROBERT PINEO: Okay. 5 **CST STUART BESELT:** And it was heavy explosions. 6 7 **MR. ROBERT PINEO:** Okay. And when you came out of the 8 woods and on to Orchard Beach Drive, that's where you found the first body; is that 9 correct? CST ADAM MERCHANT: Yes. 10 **CST AARON PATTON:** Correct. 11 CST STUART BESELT: Yes. 12 **MR. ROBERT PINEO:** And I should say where and when you 13 found the first body. 14 **CST STUART BESELT:** That's correct. 15 **MR. ROBERT PINEO:** And was that first body male, the male 16 deceased? 17 CST AARON PATTON: Yes. 18 **MR. ROBERT PINEO:** I'm just going to back up, but it's related to 19 my next line of questions. Mr. Burrill asked you quite a number of questions regarding 20 the MHA, or *Mental Health Act*, and gueries that you made to OCC. And I understand 21 from your testimony, Constable Beselt, that you said several times that it had no impact 22 23 on you getting to Portapique, and you said you didn't reduce your speed, and perhaps 24 the others -- the two of you testified to that as well. And, you know, I understand you were driving as fast as your vehicles would go. My question is, did those queries or 25 your suspicions of the *Mental Health Act* at all factor into any of your decisions once you 26 were on the ground in Portapique? 27 **CST STUART BESELT:** No, not at all. Because we -- at that point 28

in time, Andrew basically confirmed that it was an active shooter position -- or situation, 1 2 and that's the way we approached it from -- it wasn't even a thought process after that. **CST ADAM MERCHANT:** Plus, when we were driving out and you 3 saw the smoke coming up, that's when I remember it kind of clicked, like, wow, this is 4 for real, like, something bad. 5 MR. ROBERT PINEO: Okay. And I just want to be clear, and I 6 7 think the testimony you gave earlier could lead us to the conclusion, but I'd like to ask you just outright. Did any of the three of you ever go to the Blair residence that 8 9 evenina? CST STUART BESELT: No. 10 CST ADAM MERCHANT: No. 11 CST STUART BESELT: No. 12 **MR. ROBERT PINEO:** And I understand your reasoning. You said 13 you saw the Gulenchyn home -- what was actually the Gulenchyn home on fire and you 14 thought that was probably the fire at the Blair home. I got that correctly; right? 15 CST STUART BESELT: Yeah. 16 **CST ADAM MERCHANT:** That's right. 17 **MR. ROBERT PINEO:** Okay. And I take it from that answer, you 18 didn't go to the Gulenchyn home either that evening? 19 20 CST STUART BESELT: We passed by ----MR. ROBERT PINEO: That was 71 ---21 **CST AARON PATTON:** We started to head in that direction, but 22 23 we got rerouted, the -- to come back to the kids when they thought there was someone 24 in the house, yeah. **MR. Did you find or see a fellow 25 named Bjorn Merzbach that evening? 26 **CST STUART BESELT:** Yeah, we -- we came out -- the second 27 time we went to Orchard Beach Drive to go back to meet up with Constable Neil, we 28

2	MR. ROBERT PINEO: Okay.

12	the road so and then we kept going on back towards Constable Neil.
13	MR. ROBERT PINEO: Did you have any concerns about the
14	citizens driving their vehicles out?
15	CST AARON PATTON: Yeah.
16	CST ADAM MERCHANT: Of course, yeah.
17	CST AARON PATTON: Yeah.
18	CST ADAM MERCHANT: But we thought it was safer that than
19	them staying in the house.
20	CST AARON PATTON: Yeah.
21	MR. ROBERT PINEO: Okay. Just you didn't take your own
22	vehicles down into Portapique because you were afraid of them being a billboard. I take
23	it that you didn't share, or you didn't share the same concern for the citizens, or did you?
24	CST STUART BESELT: Well, it was kind of you're weighing your
25	options. At that point in time, we weren't sure if the house fires were, like I said, to draw
26	the people out, so they could get shot. So, you know, risk versus reward; right? Like,
27	you want to make sure that they're safe, and the only way we could really ensure their
28	safety is if they were out of the subdivision.

1	CST AARON PATTON: And we also the majority of the houses
2	that we did evacuate, I don't know how many, but it wasn't that many
3	CST STUART BESELT: Three or four.
4	CST AARON PATTON: were all at the southern end of
5	Portapique Beach Road, and that's where the main grass fires were burning, and we
6	knew there was no fire department coming in anytime soon, so we had concerns about
7	houses catching on fire not intentionally, like, being catching fires just from the grass
8	fires as well.
9	MR. ROBERT PINEO: How did you decide which houses to
10	evacuate?
11	CST STUART BESELT: Well, once we got back onto Portapique
12	Beach Road, we tried to evacuate all of them.
13	CST ADAM MERCHANT: And it was just a matter too of we don't
14	have a clue where he is at this point. There's nothing pointing us in one direction. This
15	house is here. Let's get those people out of here.
16	CST STUART BESELT: It really started when the family the
17	couple drove up, and then we're, like, well, get out, like, don't be driving around in here.
18	And they were already in their car, so then, you know, so I think it was only maybe, like,
19	two or three other houses that we managed to get people out; right?
20	MR. ROBERT PINEO: Okay. And at the point in time when you're
21	evacuating houses, you were no longer an IARD team at that time, you weren't
22	employing IARD techniques at that point; correct?
23	<b>CST STUART BESELT:</b> It was fluid; right? We were going to the
24	house on Faris because they said that they had seen somebody in the area, and it just
25	kind of worked out that way.
26	MR. ROBERT PINEO: I'm going to take you back now to I believe
27	the first time that you were at the home where the four children were, 135 Orchard
28	Beach Drive. And do I have it correct that that was when you saw the flashlight coming

towards you? 1

2	<b>CST STUART BESELT:</b> After we left the first time, yeah.
3	MR. ROBERT PINEO: Okay. And you are heading south on
4	Orchard Beach Drive when you encountered
5	CST STUART BESELT: We
6	MR. ROBERT PINEO: what we now know is Clinton Ellison?
7	<b>CST STUART BESELT:</b> we got basically to the fence in front of
8	the house and then saw the flashlight.
9	CST AARON PATTON: We hadn't left the property though.
10	CST STUART BESELT: Yeah, we barely left the property, yeah.

12	found the second deceased person?

18	from your earlier testimony, but Constable Beselt, I believe you said, "Had the suspect"
19	that is the person with the flashlight "ran, we would have shot." And I'm wondering,
20	was that if he ran towards you or away from you?
21	CST STUART BESELT: Away. Yeah. If I thought he was the
22	threat, right, my line in the sand is for him not to get away; right? To stop the threat so.
23	MR. ROBERT PINEO: Okay. And I believe that Constable
24	Merchant or possibly Constable Patton testified this morning that there would have been
25	a number of steps taken before the suspect was shot. I think the words were, you know
26	you know, police, you know, you identify yourself as the police. Would that have
27	taken place before

6	sure who you're shooting, or, you know, to give that opportunity for surrender. That's
7	part of your procedures; isn't it?
8	CST STUART BESELT: That's right.
9	<b>MR. ROBERT PINEO:</b> And the reason for that is pretty obvious.
10	You don't want to shoot an innocent person; correct?
11	CST STUART BESELT: That's right.
12	CST AARON PATTON: Absolutely.
13	MR. ROBERT PINEO: How many times did you travel on
14	Portapique Beach Road that evening; can you recall?
15	CST STUART BESELT: We went up Portapique Beach Road, we
16	cut through the trees, we came back, cut through the trees again when we were coming
17	back to go to Faris Lane, came back from Faris Lane along Portapique Beach Road, cut
18	through the trees and came out at Bjorn's residence, and then that was it.
19	MR. ROBERT PINEO: Okay. And how many times would you
20	have passed the Zahl residence, either on Portapique Beach Road or if you did behind
21	Portapique Beach Road when you were in the woods?
22	CST STUART BESELT: How many times did we pass by the
23	Zahl's? Well, the first time we didn't get
24	MR. ROBERT PINEO: Yes.
25	CST STUART BESELT: there. We as we
26	MR. ROBERT PINEO: Correct.
27	CST STUART BESELT: came around the corner, we saw the
28	Zahl's place. It wasn't on fire. It didn't look like there was any motion or any movement

around there. We cut through the trees, and the next time we actually went behind it, 1 2 like, we went all the way down, and because it was so bright from the fire, we tried to stay to the trees, went behind it, and then went to the 4 Faris Lane. 3 **MR. ROBERT PINEO:** Okay. And because we're trying to, as best 4 we can, come up with a timeline that fits the evidence, is it fair to say that the first time 5 you saw the Zahl residence, that, as you testified, was when you were heading down 6 7 Portapique Beach Road upon your entry, and the second time that you saw the Zahl residence, it was on fire? 8 9 **CST STUART BESELT:** That's right. **MR. ROBERT PINEO:** Okay. And that second time was after you 10 were on Faris because of the complaint that somebody was at the Griffins' home? 11 **CST STUART BESELT:** That's right. 12 **MR. ROBERT PINEO:** At any time did you hear gunshots or 13 explosions at the Zahl residence or in the direction of the Zahl residence? 14 15 CST AARON PATTON: It's hard to say. I mean, ---**CST STUART BESELT:** Well, they were going off all around us, 16 17 so, you know, ---MR. ROBERT PINEO: Sure. 18 **CST STUART BESELT:** --- it would have been difficult to identify 19 20 exactly what residence they were coming from. **CST AARON PATTON:** Every resident had vehicles that were on 21 fire and everything in the house is blowing up or collapsing, so I'm sure there was 22 23 definitely explosions coming from that direction, but to specifically remember, it's 24 difficult. **MR. ROBERT PINEO:** When you were on the perpetrator's garage 25 property, did you see a Ford F-150, either burned or not burned? Burning or not 26 burned? 27 **CST AARON PATTON:** We were so focused on looking for a 28

1	person that was our threat, I can't recall any specific items. I mean, we had a massive
2	structure burning to our to the north of us where we were at. And, to be completely
3	honest, I couldn't even describe to you what that building looked like.
4	We knew there was fire there, but I don't think I looked at it once.
5	We were looking for a threat and I couldn't say what might have been on the property, I
6	have no idea.
7	CST ADAM MERCHANT: It was engulfed, too.
8	<b>MR. ROBERT PINEO:</b> Sorry; I didn't hear you? Just Cst.
9	Merchant.
10	CST ADAM MERCHANT: It was engulfed. The building was
11	engulfed so it was hard to tell
12	CST STUART BESELT: You could just tell it was a large structure,
13	right?
14	CST ADAM MERCHANT: Yeah.
15	CST STUART BESELT: Not a house.
16	MR. ROBERT PINEO: Okay. At any time did you see a white Ford
17	F-150 in Portapique anywhere?
18	CST STUART BESELT: No.
19	CST AARON PATTON: Not that I can remember.
20	CST ADAM MERCHANT: I don't recall.
21	MR. ROBERT PINEO: Sure.
22	Perhaps if I could just have just a couple of moments to check my
23	notes, Commissioners?
24	COMMISSIONER MacDONALD: Absolutely.
25	MR. ROBERT PINEO: Thank you.
26	(SHORT PAUSE)
27	MR. ROBERT PINEO: Okay. I just have a couple of more
28	questions.

1	When you arrived at Portapique, Cst. Merchant, I believe you
2	testified earlier that you believed that there was only one way in and out of Portapique.
3	And I'm wondering if you can tell me what led you to that conclusion?
4	CST ADAM MERCHANT: I think just general knowledge of, like,
5	-
6	CST STUART BESELT: Maps. Like, we have a map on our car,
7	and it looks liked there was only one way in and one way out.
8	CST ADAM MERCHANT: I think that was my understanding from
9	being there, that other time I was there with my family, so
10	CST AARON PATTON: And driveable roads are highlighted
11	differently on the map. Like, they're outlined with a black outline, maybe? And when
12	we were driving there, we can see an outlined road in and then the roads within, and
13	just one road out. Like, a small trail wouldn't be highlighted on that map.
14	MR. ROBERT PINEO: Okay, that's my next question. So it's only
15	government or driveable roads that are on the map?
16	CST STUART BESELT: Yeah.
17	MR. ROBERT PINEO: On your I forget what you called it, your
18	-
19	CST STUART BESELT: MWS.
20	<b>MR. ROBERT PINEO:</b> computer system in your car.
21	CST STUART BESELT: Our MWS, yes.
22	MR. ROBERT PINEO: MWS, okay. Okay.
23	And did you make any inquiries from OCC if there were alternate
24	ways out, or did MCC try to provide that information to you?
25	CST ADAM MERCHANT: I mean, I think that we were leaving that
26	to the Risk Manager and that to worry about containment.
27	MR. ROBERT PINEO: Sure. Okay.
28	Thank you, gentlemen, those are my questions.

**CST AARON PATTON:** Thank you 1 2 **CST ADAM MERCHANT:** You're welcome. **COMMISSIONER MacDONALD:** Thank you, Mr. Pineo. 3 Mr. Burrill, is there anything flowing from that? 4 **MR. ROGER BURRILL:** I came over to say nothing to add. 5 Thank you, Chief Commissioner. 6 7 **COMMISSIONER MacDONALD:** Thank you. 8 I don't know if my colleagues have any questions for the witnesses. 9 (SHORT PAUSE) **COMMISSIONER MacDONALD:** Well, thank you very much, 10 officers, for attending today and answering the questions. We very much appreciate it. 11 This process is important for us to help us understand what 12 happened; and, of course, why it happened. And I can tell members of the public, and 13 confirm that on Wednesday of this week, we will hear from our next witness, Ms. 14 Deborah Thibault. 15 We will also hear from Commission Counsel, who will be presenting 16 Foundational Documents focused on 2328 Hunter Road and Highway 4 Wentworth. 17 These documents address the homicides of Sean McLeod, Alanna Jenkins, Tom 18 19 Bagley, and Lillian Campbell. 20 We say this often but it's important to repeat; the nature of our work means we continue to deal with and hear very difficult information; and would ask and 21 remind everyone that you should please ask for help if you need it; and remember that 22 23 there are supports and resources here in person and available through the 24 Commission's website. I just wanted to thank everyone for their continued interest and 25 engagements in the Commission's work. It's difficult work but it's also very, very 26 important. 27 So thank you again, officers. Thank you, counsel; Commission 28

1	Counsel and Participant Counsel, and we will break, then, until Wednesday at 9:30.
