MR. LEO ARTALEJO: As we discussed, we're using the audio recorder. We'll make a public transcript that's translated [sic] into English and French [sic], and it will be posted as a public document to be transparent about the conversations that we have as a public Commission.

MR. RICHARD ELLISON: Yeah.

MR. LEO ARTALEJO: As you know, your perspectives as a family member and the experience you have seeking information, gathering support during and after the mass casualty is something that we hope to learn from, and we hope that - the work we have left to do is to formulate the recommendations that will help Canadians in the future during these kind of events. So we're really looking forward to hearing from you today.

My role as a facilitator is to support you, to offer you a break, but some of the topics that we're hoping to hear from you today about is your experience as a family member during the mass casualty event, how you accessed information during and after the mass casualty, the supports and services that were helpful to you, and what was missing that could have been helpful to you that we want to ensure is there for Canadian families in the future.

MR. RICHARD ELLISON: Well, when it comes to the Canadian families in the future, it's gotta come right from Ottawa. They're the ones that's got to put the kiboshes to these, I call them terrorists. Like Gabriel Wortman was a terrorist, eh. Once he decided to do what he did, sure. And they don't deserve anything better than the police being able to take him right out of there without a search warrant once they've -- somebody says that he has firearms that he's not supposed to have, he's got no permit or nothing and especially handguns, then, yeah, they should be able to take him right out of his property and take him right to jail and say, "Listen, you're going to stay here until you tell us where the guns are and don't worry about calling a lawyer".

1 That's what's got to -- that's what's got to take place, that kind of -- I
2 know it sounds like Gestapo or whatever, but that's the only kind of language them kind
3 of people understand, eh.

4 **MR. LEO ARTALEJO:** So you're saying the Federal Government
5 has to implement ---

6 **MR. RICHARD ELLISON:** Yeah. Instead of -- instead of pointing
7 the fingers at law-abiding citizens saying, "Well, it's your fault".

8 Myself, I have firearms and if somebody breaks into my house and
9 steals them, then all the -- they're going to try to blame me for either improper storage
10 or whatever, eh, and I'm the bad guy because they can -- you know, they end up on the
11 street, type of thing, which they -- you know, they just take them and trade them for
12 drugs, kind of thing. Yeah.

13 **MR. LEO ARTALEJO:** Well, let's -- if it's okay with you, let's start
14 with the round 1 question.

15 What do you want to tell us about your experience seeking
16 information and getting support during and immediately after the mass casualty?

17 **MR. RICHARD ELLISON:** It's kind of a blur, actually, 'cause I went
18 down to my son's place down Halifax for -- I stayed at the motel down there one night
19 and then I left the next day and went down there till Wednesday and then come back up
20 and went down to my place. I had to wait at the end of the road for the -- to get
21 clearance from the Mounties, eh. But I didn't get any -- receive any -- any help from
22 them people at all.

23 **MR. LEO ARTALEJO:** So how did the Mounties reach out to you
24 after the event?

25 **MR. RICHARD ELLISON:** They didn't. The only ones that did was
26 down at the Portapique community hall. The people from Department of Justice were
27 there and I was talking to them and they suggested that I go to the hospital up on the
28 second floor there and talk to the sociologist there or psychiatrist or whatever they are,

1 but you know -- counsellors, I guess. Yeah, that's the word for it. Yeah, which they're
2 very nice people and that, but it didn't -- I didn't need that. I just -- I know it's -- what's
3 going on and, you know, and why these things happen and what the ultimate outcome
4 is going to be. Yeah.

5 **MR. LEO ARTALEJO:** The Family Liaison Officer, was that role
6 helpful to you at all in terms of understanding the process of it?

7 **MR. RICHARD ELLISON:** Family Liaison?

8 **MR. LEO ARTALEJO:** Constable Bent.

9 **MR. RICHARD ELLISON:** Oh, Bent (laughs). He made me feel
10 like some of them have First Nations people, they used to give them all these beaver
11 pelts that are worth a fortune and -- type of thing, and then they give -- they give the
12 Indians nothing like a bottle of booze or something, eh, for these. I don't know. That's
13 about what it was. I -- I didn't get any gifts like that, kind of stuff, like pictures of Corrie
14 and things like that. I don't hang -- after a tragedy like that and then hanging their
15 picture on the wall and just -- 'cause you'll never get over it that way, but. So I almost
16 have to forget that I even had a son, for the most part, you know, 'cause you start
17 thinking about these things and it just eat you up inside, eh. Yeah.

18 **MR. LEO ARTALEJO:** So were you able to access the mental
19 help support that you needed?

20 **MR. RICHARD ELLISON:** M'hm.

21 **MR. LEO ARTALEJO:** You said that the Victim Services ---

22 **MR. RICHARD ELLISON:** Yeah, I was up there for three sessions
23 with -- I forget her name now, but yeah. I think I got their cards at home still. Yeah.

24 **MR. LEO ARTALEJO:** So it sounds like there's the short term, the
25 shock, and the immediate aftermath. How did you manage in the months that followed?
26 What supports were helpful for you?

27 **MR. RICHARD ELLISON:** Well, I just -- like I say, I know -- like I
28 know that Corrie, for one thing, is in a better place. You know, he's only in the common

1 grave of mankind, eh, and there's -- eventually people will be brought back. And you
 2 got to believe that. It's right in the scriptures. Right in the scriptures, it says that. Yeah.
 3 So I look forward to the day. All I got to do is make sure that I'm there. In other words, I
 4 got to behave myself. I can't -- **C1 - Personal Information**, I don't
 5 know, 'cause I -- anyways, but I'm trying to get clear of that because it's an awful -- I
 6 found it worse than **C1 - Personal Information**
 7 **C1 - Personal Information** And then like alcohol, I keep
 8 that too -- down. I could do without it, put it that way. But yeah.

9 **MR. LEO ARTALEJO:** Do you feel like you have the support
 10 needed now to help you have the life -- live the life that you want to live, now that we're
 11 two years on?

12 **MR. RICHARD ELLISON:** I'm thinking about moving over to the
 13 Ukraine (laughs). That's -- that'd be my life, yeah, go over there and get shot and then
 14 that's the end of it. Yeah. Let somebody else do it, but anyways. No, I'm just joking.
 15 Yeah.

16 But I would like to go somewheres, maybe, but I don't know where
 17 to go. Like down there is not bad. At least it's lots of privacy and -- yeah.

18 **MR. LEO ARTALEJO:** Was there anything you can think of that
 19 was missing for you that would be helpful for families in the future to have access to?

20 **MR. RICHARD ELLISON:** Well, they were setting up the fire
 21 department in Lower Onslow for people that -- well, like myself and then for Mr. and
 22 Mrs. Blair and other, you know, like relatives of victims or, you know, friends of victims
 23 or whatever there so that, you know, they had -- they were going to set that up for us so
 24 that we could be comforted by that, you know, with hot coffee. Kindness is a big thing
 25 they have handled well. Of course, love is -- is the key word. And that's ---

26 **MR. LEO ARTALEJO:** So a physical location like the fire hall or ---

27 **MR. RICHARD ELLISON:** Yeah.

28 **MR. LEO ARTALEJO:** --- a community hall are very important.

1 That's how you found out about the Victim Services or the hospital.

2 **MR. RICHARD ELLISON:** No, it was at the -- at the Portapique
3 hall.

4 **MR. LEO ARTALEJO:** At the Portapique hall.

5 **MR. RICHARD ELLISON:** M'hm.

6 **MR. LEO ARTALEJO:** Yeah.

7 **MR. RICHARD ELLISON:** Yeah, and that was ---

8 **MR. LEO ARTALEJO:** It's important to have those kind of physical
9 gathering points for survivors, sounds like ---

10 **MR. RICHARD ELLISON:** It is 'cause then you're in the hearing
11 with people that have experienced the same thing, so you can share your grief, you
12 know, with each other and try to say how you feel, you know and -- like to try to make
13 sense of what happened is just -- you just can't 'cause it's just -- it's not human, eh,
14 what he did, any of that stuff. You're going -- you're crossing a line big time, you know,
15 to do anything like that, even to think of stuff like that, you know. Him with all his money
16 and what good did it do him, you know.

17 And you could get angry, too, eh, like, but I -- you know, I'm not
18 angry. I don't hate him.

19 That's what one of the -- there's one from CBC come down here to
20 interview me and that's one of the things she said. She said, "You must hate Gabriel
21 Wortman". I said, "Well, no, I never -- how can I hate him when he probably didn't even
22 know what he was doing?", type of thing, so.

23 **MR. LEO ARTALEJO:** In terms of dealing with the media after the
24 event, can you tell us a little bit about anything that might have helped you prepare for
25 that or help you deal with it?

26 **MR. RICHARD ELLISON:** Well, not really. I just -- it's on the
27 stream of things now. It's ---

28 **MR. LEO ARTALEJO:** Okay.

1 **MR. RICHARD ELLISON:** The media's there to get information
2 from us, type of thing, to -- so that they can put it on the radio or in the newspapers, you
3 know. Yeah.

4 **MR. LEO ARTALEJO:** So the work that lays ahead for the
5 Commission is to take all the lessons that we've learned and to formulate
6 recommendations that will be meaningful and effective in the future. We're interested in
7 hearing from you. This is question 2, which issues are most important to you for the
8 Commission to focus on as we finalize those recommendations?

9 **MR. RICHARD ELLISON:** Well, there's a lot of things are -- that
10 are totally lacking in society today which, you know, one of them's compassion and like
11 love, kindness, mildness, meekness. A lot of people have thrown that aside and they've
12 taken the opposite things, the meanness and the greed and the hatred that's out there
13 now that's everywhere, you know. And it's terrible. Like it's -- you know, to think that,
14 you know, we've digressed so far as a grace of -- you know, it's just -- I find that hard to
15 deal with. But then I know the reasons why people are like that, unfortunately.

16 **MR. LEO ARTALEJO:** I think you're touching on some of the
17 issues about the impact on children and starting earlier in education.

18 **MR. RICHARD ELLISON:** Well, there, speaking of children,
19 there's, what, four -- at least four. Yeah. Well, there's four children down there that are
20 now orphaned, Lisa McCully's two children, and Greg and his wife's children. Yeah. So
21 they'll have the rest of their life to think about, you know -- I don't know how it -- what
22 kind of trauma they experienced, you know, for whether -- I still find it kind of hard to
23 believe myself. Like it just -- you know, like how can something like that happen in this
24 country? But yet, here we are.

25 You know, it's -- that fellow out there with a knife and that in
26 Saskatchewan, that kind of stuff, eh. It just -- you know, like we -- we have an awful lot
27 of trouble, a lot of problems like the drugs and violence and this, you know, and then
28 there -- you know, the governments are trying to deal with that by council and, you

1 know, whatever, but it's -- like I hear -- listening to the news here this morning, they
2 were talking about the Dalhousie students, they get these big parties going, eh. They
3 don't care about their neighbours or nothing as long as they're doing what they want to
4 do. And it seems that's what things are today. That's what's broken -- boiled down to,
5 is that people don't care as long as they get to do what they want to do. Just like the --
6 today, now, go to the groceries stores and that and they were cleaning them places
7 right out. But what -- what's going to happen when the real thing comes, you know?
8 And it's coming, you know. It's just a matter of when. Yeah.

9 **MR. LEO ARTALEJO:** I know you have some notes there and you
10 have some notes there and you have some comments to ---

11 **MR. RICHARD ELLISON:** Well, I just -- okay. Yeah.

12 **MR. LEO ARTALEJO:** I'd like to hear ---

13 **MR. RICHARD ELLISON:** Something I'd like to see happen, I'd
14 like to see the -- down where I'm at here, that should be a no-fly zone for the aircraft
15 coming from Debert 'cause they're -- they're flying around my place all -- every day
16 they're flying around. And I -- you know, if it was the police or RCMP or realtors, you
17 know, having to like take pictures of lots of land down there that people want to put up
18 for sale, then, you know -- but these ones are just flying around just to be nosy, you
19 know, sticking their nose in my backyard. You know, I don't really appreciate that, eh.
20 Yeah.

21 And I would like to see -- that's one recommendation I think
22 wouldn't hurt, you know, 'cause the rest of the families down there are all gone, you
23 know. Like wiped out just like what could happen over in Ukraine, type of thing. You
24 know, terrible. Just lots of -- like I say, it's almost unbelievable, you know.

25 **MR. LEO ARTALEJO:** Yeah, it must be hard ---

26 **MR. RICHARD ELLISON:** Well, it is. It's ---

27 **MR. LEO ARTALEJO:** --- for someone that's still in the
28 community.

1 **MR. RICHARD ELLISON:** Yeah. But there's nothing I can do. I
2 can't help Corrie any more. I wish he was still with me, but you know, 'cause I do miss
3 him, you know, terrible. Yeah. And that's why I can't even think say it 'cause then I
4 start to -- yeah. 'Cause it can come back just bang, you know. Like Clinton's phone call
5 to me when he told me Corrie was dead, so I was -- and that's the only way I found out
6 that Corrie was dead, was that Clinton called me. He said, "Corrie's dead. Call the
7 police".

8 So I did. I called 9-1-1 and at one -- one of my calls from 9-1-1 was
9 the person on the other end picked up the phone and said, "Hello". And I thought I had
10 the wrong number at first, and I said, "Is this 9-1-1?". "Oh, yeah. Yeah".

11 But very -- not very professional. Just like somebody, you know -- it
12 was like dialling ---

13 **MR. LEO ARTALEJO:** [indiscernible]

14 **MR. RICHARD ELLISON:** --- like dialling 9-1-1 and getting
15 Layton's Taxi instead, type of thing, you know.

16 **MR. LEO ARTALEJO:** So that would be helpful, especially in
17 times of ---

18 **MR. RICHARD ELLISON:** Well, yeah, it's -- it's necessary. Today
19 it's unfortunate 'cause, you know, years ago there was no 9-1-1. You know, years ago,
20 the police didn't carry guns, you know. Just it shows you -- people can't see, you know,
21 these different degradations where mankind is going today, it's -- you know. And they
22 can't, really, 'cause there's -- there's a person there that doesn't want them to see that.

23 And these are things that they are written down and I know you'd
24 know the Book, right. It's in the Bible. Yeah.

25 **MR. LEO ARTALEJO:** I wanted just to move on to round three.
26 Are there other things that would be important for the Commission to understand when
27 it comes to your experience seeking information and getting support during and after the
28 mass casualty? Anything else you'd like to share with the Commission before we ---

1 **MR. RICHARD ELLISON:** Well, the only thing I could say is just
2 pray that it never happens to you. You know, if you had grandchildren or children, that's
3 the last thing you want to have happen to them. You know, bad enough to be, you
4 know, motorcycle accident or drownings and stuff like that. You can almost kind of not
5 expect it, but it's there. The hazard's there that, you know, if they're boating and
6 waterskiing or, you know, anything. You know, motorcycles, they're inherently
7 dangerous, especially if they're not driven properly. But to have your child or whoever
8 shot out from -- I say shot out from underneath you, but you know, it sounds like you're
9 talking about a horse, but it's just -- you know, if that's part of your family that, you know,
10 you love and, you know, nurture and that and then, all of a sudden, they're taken away
11 from you by that means there, it's just -- it is. It's very hard to deal with. Yeah. Yeah.

12 That's -- I almost feel -- I feel bad for the other ones, you know, not
13 knowing what I know. Without that -- like without the hope, there's -- you know, what is
14 there? You know, it's as simple as that. And you're just going to keep going on and on
15 in misery the rest of your life, which we are 'cause they're not going to come back until -
16 - like I say, God will set things straight eventually when his time comes, but right now,
17 see, we don't know. Somebody is saying, you know, he's going to use nuclear
18 weapons and then you got climate change. We got a hurricane coming.

19 And people just -- they're at their wits' ends almost. Like they --
20 you know, and there's nothing they can do about it, really. Just try to -- but you got to --
21 like if people treated each other with decency and respect and the good qualities that,
22 you know, we should have, then things would be a whole lot better, you know. There
23 wouldn't be any Gabriel Wortmans 'cause he wasn't like that, eh. He was -- he had a
24 mean streak in him. I seen that, the way he -- more like he owned Lisa like a dog or
25 something, Lisa Banfield. Oh, yeah, just -- yeah, you're my, you know, possession, type
26 of thing.

27 There's a lot of that today in maybe marriages or common-law type
28 things. Oh, yes. You don't know what -- what's going on behind closed doors, eh, that -

1 - yeah. You know, no more respect for people and treat them like dogs.

2 You know, you look at everything, too, what happened to that
3 woman over in Iran there. See, that -- that should -- makes you sick.

4 And one of the best exemplars of women or **C1** women was Jesus
5 Christ. There was a woman that first went to his tomb, eh, and then Jesus talked to her
6 and then Mary, Mary Magdalene, you know. And those were the women that attended
7 to the disciples, just treated like gold. Yeah.

8 And without that, then unfortunately, you see -- you know, it's sad,
9 too, like 'cause women are really -- in a lot of places, they're taking a back seat big time.
10 You know, over in Afghanistan they're only allowed a Grade 6 education. You know,
11 just strange. Like it's -- but then that's -- that's the work of the devil. It has to be.

12 You know, like the Taliban and what other religions there, I don't
13 want to start trashing religion, but it's -- it is what it is. You know, it's ---

14 **MR. LEO ARTALEJO:** So I'm hearing you say gender-based
15 violence is a contributor.

16 **MR. RICHARD ELLISON:** It is.

17 **MR. LEO ARTALEJO:** You would -- you would see that ---

18 **MR. RICHARD ELLISON:** Yeah.

19 **MR. LEO ARTALEJO:** --- the relationship between the event that
20 you saw.

21 **MR. RICHARD ELLISON:** Yeah. Yeah. Well, now, I wasn't the
22 best father in the world, but I wasn't a violent person towards my wife or my children. I
23 was just an idiot, eh, you might say, you know, 'cause I used to party a lot and I thought
24 more about partying than I did my family, kind of thing. And that's just without -- without
25 the knowledge of good and bad, well, chances are you're going to do what's wrong in
26 this -- the way things are now, yeah. Yeah.

27 So -- but as far as this Commission goes, hopefully they're -- there
28 can be some steadfast changes. But it -- you know, it has to be put right in Parliament.

1 You know, it has to be right in our *Constitution*. Like when it comes to terrorists -- and
2 that's what -- like I say, when people were smuggling guns into the country, yeah,
3 they're terrorists. Nothing else. And they got to be treated that way. Treat them
4 harshly, too, eh, and don't give them any much of a quarter type, you know.

5 **MR. LEO ARTALEJO:** Well, that's one of the reasons we are
6 working very hard to get the recommendations finalized.

7 **MR. RICHARD ELLISON:** Yeah.

8 **MR. LEO ARTALEJO:** Implementation is something that the
9 Commission is very focused on.

10 **MR. RICHARD ELLISON:** Yeah.

11 **MR. LEO ARTALEJO:** So I'll turn to the Commissioners and see if
12 they have any questions or comments for you.

13 **COMMISSIONER MacDONALD:** Thank you very much, Mr.
14 Ellison.

15 This is our last -- our last session with family members, and so
16 we're honoured to have it with you. You've been with us throughout. You've testified
17 for us. There's a statement ---

18 **MR. RICHARD ELLISON:** Well, I'll do anything I can to see justice
19 done or -- you know.

20 **COMMISSIONER MacDONALD:** And you did. Yeah, you've
21 stepped up always. And last Saturday, you stepped up and helped us and here you are
22 today, so I just wanted to thank you for that.

23 I also wanted to express -- this is an opportunity just to express my
24 heartfelt sympathy for your loss.

25 **MR. RICHARD ELLISON:** I appreciate that. Yeah.

26 **COMMISSIONER MacDONALD:** And I -- you deserve to be
27 treated with decency and respect and kindness, sir. So, thank you.

28 **MR. RICHARD ELLISON:** I appreciate that, but you have to set

1 the example for people right in front of them, too. Don't hold nothing back, you know,
2 like thank you, please, thank you. Talk, you know, with a mild voice and, you know, you
3 get people's attention, too, eh. It's quite phenomenal. You know, I find it, you know,
4 like really uplifting to -- you know, when you are having a conversation with -- you know,
5 at the bank or wherever and you say the right things to the people that you're supposed
6 to say, then they'll really -- you know, it helps them, too, 'cause everybody's struggling
7 today. It's -- you know, if it isn't one thing, it's something else, eh, in people's lives, you
8 know.

9 **COMMISSIONER MacDONALD:** You're right, and so thank you.
10 Thank you for your sharing and thank you for your wisdom, and it's much appreciated.
11 You've helped us, so we appreciate it.

12 **MR. RICHARD ELLISON:** I appreciate the -- you helping us, too,
13 'cause we sure need it. Yeah.

14 **COMMISSIONER FITCH:** I'm going to say much the same as
15 Commissioner MacDonald. It's quite remarkable how -- how you've continued to help
16 us out. It's -- you know, we've -- we can't imagine what you and your family have gone
17 through and -- and it's -- it's uplifting to know that you still have the hope and the faith
18 that you have and -- and the kindness that you showed others, and I think that that's --
19 that's a gift for -- that you have to give to other people, so thank you for that.

20 **MR. RICHARD ELLISON:** Yeah. Well, it is. It's just too bad the
21 governments weren't like that, but they -- you know, everything's so by the book and,
22 you know, they can't -- they got no room to -- you know, to be that way, maybe. I just --
23 you know, it's just -- or they're not expected to so they don't. They don't go there, you
24 know, type of, you know. But that's the heart of the matter.

25 **COMMISSIONER FITCH:** Thank you very much for sharing
26 everything with us that you have.

27 **MR. RICHARD ELLISON:** Yeah. Well, I -- like I say, I really
28 appreciate and just, you know, hopefully something good comes of this for everybody

1 involved, that it does make changes, but we got a long ladder up -- going up to get to
2 the top of all the problems that we have. And even in this country, too. Like Canada's a
3 beautiful, rich country, but it's -- you know, we have a lot of -- lot of trouble here to deal
4 with, you know, let alone you see lot of -- you know, I guess we have to be thankful that
5 we don't live in -- well, right now like Puerto Rico. Them people are up to their waists in
6 water everywhere.

7 **COMMISSIONER STATON:** That may be us tomorrow.

8 --- Laughter

9 Mr. Ellison, I wanted to let you know you've been a model of generosity before the
10 Commission and what you're talking about in terms of the need for more kindness and
11 care of others, you've really shown here. And it's -- I know it's touched all of us and
12 we're very grateful that you've ---

13 **MR. RICHARD ELLISON:** Well, I appreciate -- I appreciate that.

14 **COMMISSIONER STANTON:** Thank you so much.

15 **MR. RICHARD ELLISON:** And -- but see, when -- when those kind
16 of traits are brought out, then there's no room for the things that -- the reason why we're
17 here. There's no room for that, eh, if -- you know, you're too busy treating people the
18 way they want to be treated or deserve, you know, respect and -- you know, that's the
19 way it has to be to make real changes, but -- and that's -- that's another thing that all the
20 law enforcement agencies in Canada, you know, municipality [sic] police forces, what
21 they have to deal with, you know, drugs and, you know, crime and the whole bit, eh.

22 **MR. LEO ARTALEJO:** Yeah. I think, you know, the hope for the
23 Commission is just to try to tune those systems so they can work better, as you expect.

24 **MR. RICHARD ELLISON:** Yeah. Yeah.

25 **MR. LEO ARTALEJO:** So thank you. We'll close the session, and
26 really appreciate you being here.


